POLICY OF THE Administration.

In conclusion, it seems to me that the policy of the Administration is to have a fair enforcement of every law—a faithful collection of every tax provided for, economy in the disbursement of the public money, prompt payment of every debt of the nation, a reduction of taxation, and finally, in securing the wants of the country will admit, the reduction of taxation and tariff so as to arrange as to afford the greatest relief to the great manufacturing interests, to those not engaged in all manufacturing enterprises, may be availed of, but without unmindfulness, any right or obligation due to us, a reform in the treatment of Indians and in the whole set aside the wants of the country, and finally in securing a pure, honest, and upright administration was destined to make one may do as much as at each election, without regard of political faith, activity, or color.

Newspaper Laws.

We wish still the greater attention of Postmasters and subscribers to the following extracts of the newspaper laws:

1. A Postmaster is required to give notice by letter (returning a paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not desire to receive a newspaper, and the reasons for his not being taken; and a neglect to do so makes the Postmaster responsible to the publishers for the paper.

2. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, or from a newsboy, or other, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.

3. If a person orders a paper discontinued, he may pay all arrears or the price of the paper up to the time of the pay ment to make.

4. If the subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time, and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is liable for the pay ment.

5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post office and from persons who are entitled to, is prima facie evidence of intent to defraud.
