TWENTY-SEVENTH YEAR.

For 1872.Amendments to the Constitu
tution.

ARTICLE XIII.

1. Neither...nor involuntary servitude
shall be permitted, and no person shall be
subject to the party of any kind except
by due process of law.2. No person shall be deprived of
any of his rights without due process of
law.3. The right of the people to
