REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION. CHANGE OF TIME ORDERED.

A Delegate Convention of the Republican party of Texas is hereby called to assemble in the city of Houston on the second Tuesday of May, 1872, for the purpose of nominating Presidential Electors, and sending Delegates to the Philadelphia National Convention, for a thorough re-organization of the party, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the body.

The date of representation is fixed at one Delegate and one Alternate for every five hundred votes in each county. County meetings called by the chairmen of committees are authorized to elect Delegates where regular conventions are impracticable.

The undersigned, who was duly elected President of this mass meeting of the Republicans of Bexar county at its assembling last Saturday night, owing to disturbances which rendered it impossible to preserve order, or to transmit any business, adjourned the mass meeting until next Saturday evening, April 27th inst., to meet at the Turner's Hall at 8 o'clock, P. M. — Genuine Republicans from all parts of the county are urged to be present, and to take part in the proceedings. Measures have been taken to preserve peace and good order, and it is hoped and expected that a free and fair expression of the opinions and wishes of the party in this county may be had; and that delegates may be selected to represent the county in the State Republican Convention to be held at Houston on the 2nd Tuesday of May next, who will truly represent the majority of the Republican voters of the county.
