# Local Farmers, Ranchers **Lobbying For Parity Bill Telephone Reports** 'Favorable' For Bill

Texas farmers and ranchers Anderson. A.R. McGuire and have joined with others from across the nation in one of the largest drives on Washington, D.C. since the nation was

founded 200 years ago. The purpose of the drive is to restore prosperity, not only to rural America, but the nation as a whole, said Jerry Glover, who is presently in Washington, D.C. from Lazbuddie.

He estimates that as many as 100,000 farmers and ranchers are swarming into the hallowed halls of Congress telling of inequities that exist in the prices farmers are receiving for their products.

Jerry Glover reported by telephone Monday night that most congressmen are receiving the program as suggested by the American Agriculture Movement very favorably.

He said, "there are a few, however, who still fail to realize the importance of a fair price

for agricultural commodities. "Several Senators have promised to help write a bill to sponsor it and fight for its pasage in the Senate. Those who are assisting at this time are Senator John Tower, Texas; Senator Robert Dole, Kansas and Senator Adourezck from South Dakota."





In 1949 two researchers accidently discovered that small amounts of antibiotics when added to animal feed, proved to be a powerful growth stimulant. Ever since then, farmers and cattlemen have regularly fed pigs, cattle and poultry feed supplemented with the drugs. By slightly increasing the dosages of antibiotics a more healthy condition was created, enabling them to raise large herds in close confinement without disease epidemics. Farm experts estimate that for every \$1 spent on antibiotics, there is a payback of \$5 to \$10 due to better animal health and less feed required to get animals up to market weight.

But now the Food and Drug Administration is proposing sharp restrictions on the use of penicillin and tetracycline in animal feed. This is due to the existence of a growing pool of antibiotic-resistant baceteria. Pharmaceutical industry spokesmen admit that animal handlers, butchers, and even housewives run the risk of exposure to some of this resistent bacteria.

The disagreement begins over the point of whether such resistent bacteria will colonize in the human intestine and also transfer the antibiotic resistence to human bacteria. Even doctors and biologist do not agree.

Hard facts are missing from both sides of the controversy. The Animal Health Institute claims that animals which have received sub-therapeutic doses of antibiotics in feed still respond well to therapeutic doses of antibiotics when they are sick, which indicates that no dangerous resistence levels have been reached. ## **Demand Will Be Up In '78**

There shou'd be plenty of fed beef on hand to satisfy consumers during the year ahead, and consumer demand should also be up.

"This points to a somewhat better year for cattle producers." says Dr. Ed Uvacek. livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The amount of fed beef will generally be larger than in 1977, at least through the first half of the year, although the amount of "other" beef from cows and non-fed steers and heifers will be down from a year ago.

"Demand should also be boosted in 1978 due to increases in Social Security payments, proposed tax reductions, changes in the Food Stamp Program, a substantial gain in minimum wages, and continued growth in the general economic activity of the country," contends Uvacek. What should cattlemen expect in the new year?

"Fed cattle prices may weaken a bit during the first calendar quarter but should gather strength by the middle of the second quarter." believes the specialist. "Lowest prices could come by late March and highest prices in June or July. Feeder cattle should follow about this same price pattern. Plenty of rain this spring could cause producers to temporarily overprice feeder types."

Choice fed slaughter steers in Amarillo should average about \$41-\$43 per hundredweight during the first quarter, then push upward to about the \$43-\$45 level for the April-June period. Heavier feeders will be priced close to feds from January to March, but price premiums are almost certain by the second quarter.

"The picture is improving, therefore, for most cattlemen although we still have a long way to go," contends Uvacek.
