Artesian Wells.

Artesian wells take their name from a province anciently called Artesium, more recently Artois, in the Northern part of France, where they have been long used. But these deep borings were by no means first introduced there. They were long before made in Italy, and there is at least probable evidence that many centuries earlier still they were in use in Egypt. Yet earlier, there is hardly a doubt, they were known in Chins, where, to this day, they are more numerous and deeper that anywhere else in the world. A missionary speaks of one small province where "they may be counted by the tens of thousands, many of them sunk in remote ages."

On and after July 1, 1879, every perso the sells or offers for sale manufactured tobacco, snuff or cigars, except manufacown products at the place of production. will be required to pay a special tax at the rate of five dollars per annum, without regard to the amount of his annual sales.
