GENERAL NATURE No. 99.] AN ACT making appropriations for the service of the Post Office Department for the year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-three.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That the following sums be, and the same are bereby, appropriated for the service of the Post Office Department for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, out of any moneys in the treasury arising from the revenues of said Department, in conformity to the act of July second, sighteen hundred and thirty-six, as follows:
