tion of this State, that at the first general election after the acceptance of the Constitution by the Congress of the United States, an election shall be helden to set the permanently the seat of government of the Biasts of Texas.

Now, therefore, I, EDMUND J. DAVIS, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this State, do hereby order and direct that said election for the permanent settlement of the seat of government of this State be held at the same time and places for voting as at the next general election, viz: at the county seat of sach county, and commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1872, and continuing four consetutive days, viz: the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth days of November, A. D. 1872

The returns of said election shall be transmitted to the Governor and other returning officers in accordance with law.

Newspaper Laws.

We would sail the apsaid attention of Postmasiers and subscribers to the following aymopsis of the newspaper laws:

1. A Postmaster is required to give no time by letter (returning a paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken; and a neglect to do do so makes the Postmaster responsible to the publishers for the payment.

mess.

1. Any person who takes a paper from
the Festoffice, whether directed to his same
or another, or whether he has subscribed or
not, is responsible for the pay.

3. If a person evders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arrearages or the
publisher may continue to send it until the
payment is made.

4. If the subscriber orders his paper to
he stepped at a nortein time, and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is
bound to pay for it if he takes it from the
Postoffice. The law proceeds upon the
ground that a man must pay for what he
asses.

The courts have decided that refusing ake newspapers and periodicals from the toffice, or removing and leaving them alled for, is prima facia evidence of in local fraud.




