The Measles Peddler.
George A. Townsend has been gathering legends of the "Long Island Pilgrim Fishers," and adds this bit to the common stock of tradition lore:
"Twas only 'bout seventy years ago" said the driver who carried us, "that the Easthampton folks undertook to git the better of a peddler that come among 'em with the measles. He was as smart as a fish-hook, and meale or no meale, he would go to meetin' next day, being Sunday, in order 't hev it understood that he had arriv. Everybody knowed him! A correspondent of the New York Times, writing from New Haven, says:
"The concurrent opinion of the most intelligent men of both parties whom I have met is that the Greeley movement is not as strong here as a month ago, and that it is losing ground daily. The number of Greeley Republicans in New Haven is very small, and is more than balanced by the prominent Democrats who have declared their uncompromising hostility to the Baltimore nominees. To-day I conversed with two of the ablest Republican politicians in the State, and found them coinciding with my previously formed views. They think the Greeley Republicans, already few, will decrease in numbers, while the disaffection in the Democratic ranks will constantly increase, and that the State may be considered secure. They both were of the opinion that the visit of Gratz Brown to this city and his foolish speeches here lost him votes. One of them, who knew the men, said: 'Gratz Brown is another Frank Blair, with less ability than Frank.'"
The sentiments of commercial men on the subject of the presidency were shown yesterday on "Change" by 129 members of the Board of Trade voting, of whom 96 were for Grant, and 24 for Greeley. The membership of the board is about 1,300. It is proposed to continue the balloting, on occasion offers, until all have recorded their votes.—Chicago Inter-Ocean.

The Teachers' Convention. The Teachers' Convention met at Representative Hall this morning at 10 o'clock. There were about 150 delegates present, from different parts of the State, which is considered a fair attendance.
