Reduction of Streams.

The Baltimore Sun notes the re-markable decrease of the volume of the vicinity of that city, and says: the respectable proportions of a large creek, with a strong flow of water, equal formerly to 10,000,000 gallons, to an insignificant little brook, hardly three teet wide; and at present, after two months season of dry weather, equal only to a supply of 3,000,000 gallons per day."

It is a common remark of old residents of this vicinity that Rock creek and othe streams with which they have been tamiliar from boyhood have diminished at least onehalf in the last twenty-five or thiry years. At this rate we may anticipate that in a not distant future

we shall have no streams at all. This is no nevel experience. Syra, once fertile and fruitful, is now an abandoned desert: and from the same cause, which is, it is hardly necesary to say, the total destruction of forest trees.


