Newspaper Laws. We would call the special attention of

restantions and subscribers to the following synopsis of the newspaper laws:

1. A Postmaster is required to give no tice by letter (returning a paper does not answer the law) when subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken; and a neglect to do do so makes the Postmaster responsible to the publishers for the payment.

the Postoffice, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.

3. If a person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arrearages or the publisher may continue to send it until the name it made.

publisher may continue to send it until the payment is made.

4. If the subscriber orders his paper to be stepped at a certain time, and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it if he takes it from the Postoffice. The law proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he
