

Doalers in leaf tobacco who have paid a special tax as such. 2. Manufacturers of tobacco, snuff, or cigars. Manufacturers of tobacco, snuff, or cigars.

3. Persons who purchase in original packages for export. The payment of any other special tax will not exempt a person who sells leaf tobacco as hereinbefore stated from the payment of the specia tax as a retail dealer in leaf tobacco.

PROCLAMATION

By the Governor of the State of Texas TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRES-

L ente shall come:
WHERMAN, By a joint resolution of the
Twelfth Legislature of the State of Texas,
passed May 17th, 1871, it was resolved, "that section six, article ten of the consti-tution of the State of Texas be so amend ed as hereafter to read and be as follows: SEC. 6. The Legislature chall not hereaf-ter grant lands, except for purposes of in-

ter grant lands, except for purposes of in-ternal improvement, to any person or per-sons, nor shall any certificate for land be sold at the Land Office, except to actual settlers upon the same, and in lots not ex-ceeding one hundred and sixty acrea, pro-vided that the Lagislature shall not grant-out of the public domain more than twon-ty acctions of land for each mile of com-pleted work in aid of the construction of which, land may be granted; and provid-

pleted work in aid of the construction of which, land may be graved; and provided further, that nothing in the foregoing provise shall effect any rights, granted or secured by laws passed prior to the final adoption of this amoudment."

Now, therefore, I, EDMUND J. DAVIS, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of this State, do hereby order and direct that the said effection to vote on the said proposed amendment to the constitusaid proposed amendment to the constitu-tion of this State be held at the same time and places for voting as at the next general election, viz: at the county seat o and places for voting as at the next general election, viz: at the county seat of each county, and commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. B. 1872, and continuing four consecutive days, viz: the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth day of November, A. D. 1872. The returning officers at said general election, shall open a poil for sed make a return to the Secretary of State of the names of all those voting for Representatives, who have voted on the proposed amendment to section 6 of article 10 of the constitution, in accordance with law, the ballots used by voters to have written or printed on them the words "for the amendment," or "against the amendment."

The attention of officers of the law, voters and others, is called to the provisions of the law of this State, and the United States, enacted to secure the five accretise of the rights of suffrage, and the purishment of those, who may in any manner attempt to interfere with this franchise.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto signed my name and have caused [L. s.] the great seal of the State to be affixed, at the city of Ametin, this 16th day of July, A. D. 1872.
