## OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

Passed at the Second Session of the Forty-Second Congress.

[CONTINUED.]

[GENERAL NATURE NO. 111.]

AN ACT to reduce duties on imports, and to reduce internal taxes, and for other purposes.

That section forty-three be amended by inserting after the word "brand," the second time it occurs, the words "and the Commissioner of Internal Revenue may make such change in stamps and may prescribe such instruments, or other means for attaching, protecting, and cancelling stamps for tobacco, snuff, cigars, distilled spirits, and fermented liquors, or either of them, as he and the Secretary of the Treasury shall approve, such instruments to be furnished by the United States to the persons using the stamps to be affixed thereon, under such regulations as the Commissioner of Internal Revenue may prescribe."

That section forty-four be amended by striking out the word "distiller" where it first occurs therein.

That section forty-seven be amended by inserting after the words "original package" the words "or in case such spirits shall have been rectified, the name of the rectifier and the serial number of the rectification."

That section forty-eight be amended by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "That on all wines, liquors, or compounds brewed or fermented, or either of them, in imitation of sparkling wine or champagne, but not made from grapes grown in the United States, and on all liquors, not made from grapes, currants, rhubarb, or berries grown in the United States, but produced by being rectified or mixed with distilled spirits, or by the infusion of any matter in spirits, to be sold as wine, or as a substitute for wine, there shall be levied and collected a tax of ten cents per bottle or package containing not more than one pint, or of twenty cents per bottle or package containing more than one pint and not more than one quart, and at the same rate for any larger quantity of such merchandise, however the same may be put up, or whatever may be the package, and the Commissioner of Internal Revenue shall cause to be prepared suitable and special stamps denoting the tax herein imposed, to be affixed to each bottle or package containing such merchandise, by the person manufacturing, compounding, or putting up the same, before removal from the place of manufacture, compounding, or putting up; said stamps to be affixed and cancelled in such manner as the Commissioner of Internal Revenue may prescribe; and the absence of such stamp from any bottle or package containing such merchandise shall be prima facie evidence that the tax thereon has not been paid, and such merchandise shall be forfeited to the United States. Any person counterfeiting, altering, or re-using said stamps shall be subject to the same penalties as are imposed for the same offenses in relation to proprietary stamps."

That section forty-nine be amended by striking out the word "twenty-five" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "ten," also by striking out the words "the Secretary of the Treasury, on the recommendation of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, may appoint, and inserting in lieu thereof the words "the President may nominate, and, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, may appoint, and by striking out the words "shall be assigned to a designated territorial district, to be composed of one or more judicial districts and territories, and shall keep his office at some convenient place in his district to be designated by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, and inserting in lieu thereof the words "shall be assigned by the Secretary of the Treasury, on the recommendation of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, to such territory, and may be transferred from place to place, according to the exigencies of the public service," and strike out "within his district" wherever it occurs.

That section fifty be amended by striking out the words "and the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, may appoint, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "distiller" also, by striking out the word "distilleries" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "agents."

That section fifty-three be amended by striking out all from and including the words "for the purpose of" down to and including the words "producer of such articles."

That section fifty-four be amended by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "That distilled spirits upon which all taxes have been paid may be exported, with the privilege of drawback, in quantities not less than one thousand gallons, and in distillers' original casks, containing not less than twenty wine-gallons each, on application of the owner thereof to the collector of customs at any port of entry, under such rules and regulations and a few making such entry as may be prescribed by law and by the Secretary of the Treasury. The entry for such exportation shall be in triplicate, and shall contain the name of the person applying to export, the name of the distiller, and the district in which the spirits were distilled, and the name of the vessel by which, and the name of the port to which, they are to be exported; and the form of the entry shall be as follows:

 "And the entry shall specify the whole number of casks or packages, the marks and serial numbers thereon, the quality or kind of spirits as known in commerce, the number of gallons or wine gallons and proof gallons, and the amount of tax on such spirits shall be verified by the oath of affirmation of the owner of the spirits, and that the tax has been paid thereon, and that they are truly intended to be exported to the district and port to be related within the limits of the United States. One bill of lading, duly signed by the master of the vessel, shall be deposited with said collector, to be filed at his office, and the other copy of the bill of lading, and said entries shall be, when the shipment is completed, transmitted to the Secretary of the Treasury to be recorded and filed in his office. The lading on board said vessel shall be only after the receipt on an order or permit signed by the collector of customs, and a few such each of such packages shall have been distinctly marked, as provided by said collector, as follows: "For export from U. S. A., and the last-paid number of the bill of lading, and the name of the vessel, shall be inscribed on each package as follows, namely: "As follows, namely: "That section fifty-eight be amended by striking out the words "more than" before the words "five gallons," and inserting the words "or more" after the words "five gallons."

designated by said collector, under such rules and regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe; and, on application of the said collector, it shall be the duty of the surveyor of the port to designate and direct one of the custom-house inspectors to superintend such shipment. And the master of the vessel shall make a full return of such inspection and gauging in form as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury, showing by whom each cask of such spirits was distilled, the serial number of the cask, and of the last-paid stamp attached thereto, the proof and quantity of such spirits as per the original gauge-mark on each cask, and the quantity in proof and wine gallons as per the gauge then made by him. And said gauger shall verify on such return the amount of such spirits as per the original gauge-mark on each cask, and the quantity in proof and wine gallons as per the gauge then made by him. And the master of the vessel, on his presence, on board the vessel named in the entry for export, which return shall be endorsed by said custom-house inspector certifying that the casks or packages have been opened under his supervision, and said vessel, and the last-paid stamp obliterated; and the said inspector shall make a similar certificate to the surveyor of the port, in duplicate, one to be attached to the entry, in possession of the customs collector, and the other to be allowed upon distilled spirits on which the tax has been paid and exported to foreign countries, under the provisions of this act, when exported as herein provided for. The drawback on such spirits may be withdrawn from distillery bonded warehouses, at the instance of the owner of the spirits, for exportation in the original casks in quantities of not less than one thousand gallons, without the payment of tax, under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by such entries and executed and filed with the collector of the district from which the removal is to be made such bills and bills of lading, and giving such other additional security as may be prescribed by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, with the Secretary of the Treasury; That bonds given under this section shall be canceled under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury said prescribe.

"All distilled spirits intended for export, as aforesaid, before being removed from the distillery warehouse shall be marked by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue with an engraving stamp indicative of such intention, to be provided and furnished by the several collectors as in the case of other stamps, and to be charged to and accounted for in the same manner, and for the expense attending the providing and affixing such stamps, twenty-five cents for each package so stamped shall be paid to the collector on making the entry for such transportation. When the owner of the spirits shall have the proper certificate of the collector of the port to which the spirits are to be transported, the name of the collector or to whom the spirits are to be consigned, and the route or route over which they are to be sent to the port of destination, and the amount of tax to be made, over bonded routes whenever practicable. The collector of the port shall receive such spirits, and permit the exportation thereof under the same rules and regulations as are provided for the exportation of spirits upon which the tax has been paid. And if any person shall fraudulently claim, or seek, or obtain an allowance of drawback on any distilled spirits, or shall knowingly claim any greater allowance or drawback than the tax actually paid thereon, such person shall forfeit any pay to the government of the United States triple the amount fraudulently and fraudulently sought to be obtained, and on conviction shall be imprisoned not more than ten years; and any other person, or master of any vessel or any other person who shall knowingly aid or abet in the fraudulent collection or fraudulent attempt to collect any drawback upon, or shall knowingly aid or permit any fraudulent change in the spirits so shipped, shall, on conviction, be fined not exceeding five thousand dollars and imprisoned not more than one year, and the proceeds of the sale of such spirits, or the amount of the tax which the same were related within the jurisdiction of the United States, and all boats, vehicles, horses, or other animals used in relanding and removing such distilled spirits, shall be forfeited to the United States."

That section fifty-seven be amended by striking out the words "more than" before the words "five gallons," and inserting the words "or more" after the words "five gallons."

ing the words, "Provided further, That in case of distilleries sold at judicial and other sales in favor of the United States, a bond may be taken at the discretion of the Commissioner of the Internal Revenue in lieu of the written consent required by such section, and the person giving such bond may be allowed to operate such distillery during the existence of the right of redemption from such sale, on complying with all the other provisions of law."

Centralization.

constitute the political stock in

delude the people into the belief

that the formers of this government

are being diverged from their con-

stitutional channels, and that popu-

lar rights are in danger. This

charge has not even the mint of

honest origin. It is an unqualified

deception, and it seeks to create a

false alarm.

By what means is centralization

to be secured without the consent

of the people? Are not the rights

of local government subjects of con-

stitutional guarantee? Is not consti-

tution the supreme law of the land?

Are there no courts which may be

invoked to stay the execution of

unconstitutional acts; if such be

passed? The almost absolute im-

possibility of any encroachment

of one department of our govern-

ment upon another, furnishes a strong

presumption that none has taken

place; and in order to rebut this

presumption we must have some-

Centralization. Horace Greeley

was an loud mouthed for as he

never was for accession, but he is

now equally anxious to repudiate it.

He proclaimed the necessity and de-

manded the constitutionality of the

Kuklux registration for which the

republican party is now arraigned.

Edmund Burke eloquently and

proudly declared that, though the

winds and rain might penetrate an

Englishman's cottage, the king

could not enter it unbidden. The

Republican party would make the

humblest American home equally

safe from violence, and for this the

people are asked to pronounce its im-

peachment! It would assure to all

men the equal protection of the

laws, and for this it is summoned

to answer the charge of centraliza-

tion.

If this be centralization, then is

the party guilty. But if by the

charge of centralization it is meant

to be insisted that the Republican

party has seized unconstitutional

powers, or violated National or

State rights under the Constitution,

then is the charge a pure fabrica-

tion without shadow of warrant.

Schurz and Greeley on Civil Service

Reform—Schurz wants more

Light—Greeley supplies the Defi-

ciency.

WASHINGTON, D. C.

July 29, 1872.

It was some time ago that Senator

Schurz admitted himself driven into

the support of the "second Franklin,"

but from that hour to the late meeting at

St. Louis, "Iago" opened his mouth.

Before that august occasion should be

celebrated which was to witness the redem-

ptation of Senator Wheel fairly and squarely

into line, he must have one little explana-

tion, one more conference. So the men of many

words reproachfully address Mr. Gree-

ley, saying:

"In your letter of acceptance you promise

a thorough reform in the Civil Service

in general terms. I would suggest, if

it be consistent with your views of pro-

priety, that you give me such explanation

as will put your intentions in this respect

in a clear light." Mr. Schurz wants more

light.

After nine days of incubation an answer

is hatched. It seems to have proved en-

tirely satisfactory to the Senator, and per-

haps, therefore, it ought to be equally so

to the public. "A most difficult matter,

signor, a most perplexing question," an-

swers the worthy sage. Strange that so

plain a truth should so late have been dis-

covered by so wise a man! A very diffi-

cult problem! "Under our system," says

Mr. Greeley, "there is an alliance between

the executive and legislative branches of

our Federal Government" This is true.

Our ancestors who are believed to have

been gifted with some degree of wisdom,

made it so, and simple people have thought

it worked very well, but some of the

wise ones have long guessed that there was

a mistake somewhere, and now the great

philosopher is sure of it. No doubt about

it now. This unholy alliance must be

disrupted. Where is the remedy? Mr.

Greeley has it: "Turn out Grant." That

will be the next best thing to a Consti-

tutional amendment forever divorcing

the members of this unholy alliance to

which Mr. Greeley refers.

There is another and a greater cause of

difficulty. It is the eligibility of the Pres-

ident to re-election. This is a great evil,

and so plain that the wonder is that even

our short sighted forefathers could not

comprehend it. To be sure, Hamilton and

Madison thought it a good feature, but

then they were not philosophers. What

did they know about the Presidency? It

is admitted that our Presidents who have

been re-elected have been our best men;

but what does that signify to a philoso-

pher? Don't he know? Has not been ap-

plied his touchstone to this matter, and

don't that settle it?

Grant has tried the scheme, and Mr.

Greeley has said he appointed good com-

missioners, but the thing has failed, ac-

cording to his decision. And this brings

us back to Mr. Greeley's original state-

ment, namely, that the whole matter of

Civil Service is exceedingly difficult and

complicated. From the stand point of the

philosopher there seems to be no possible

remedy except to put Grant out and

Greeley in. A most appropriate begin-

ning. Command us to that reform!

So we have Mr. Greeley's idea, "the

particulars which the Senator called for,

and indeed they do make the whole thing

exceedingly clear! They have made it so

clear that a blind man can see through it.

Now is it possible that any portion of the

readers of the EXPRESS, or of the people

generally, are hood-winked by this Trem-

bul-Schurz-Greeley trash about Civil Ser-

vice Reform? Since Mr. Greeley himself

has picked the bubble, we trust not.

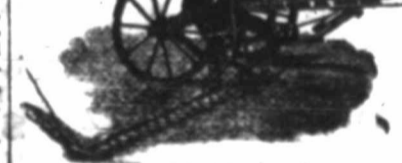

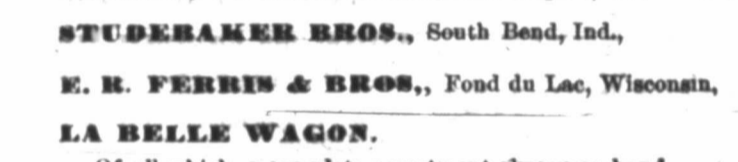
