PROCLAMATION
TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRES-
ents shall come:
WHEREAS, by a joint resolution of the
Twelfth Legislature of the State of Texas,
passed May 17th, 1871, it was resolved,
"that section six, article ten of the constitu-
tion of the State of Texas be so amend-
ed as hereinafter set forth:
SEC. 6. The Legislature shall not hereafter
grant lands, except for purposes of in-
ternal improvement, to any person or
persons, nor shall any certificate for land be
sold at the Land Office, except to actual
settlers upon the same, and in lots not ex-
ceeding one hundred and sixty acres, pro-
vided that the Legislature shall not grant
out of the public domain more than forty
sections of land for each mile of com-
pleted work in aid of the construction of
any railroad, and no certificate for land
previously shall effect an rights granted or
secured by laws passed prior to the final
completion of the amendment."
Now, therefore, I, EDWARD J. DAVIS,
Governor of Texas, by virtue of the author-
ity vested in me by the Constitution and
Laws of this State, do hereby order and
direct that the said election to vote on the
said proposed amendment to the constitu-
tion of this State be held at the same time
and place for voting as at the next gene-
ral election, viz: at the county seat of
each county, and commencing on the first
Tuesday after the first Monday in Novem-
ber, A. D. 1872, and continuing four consecu-
tive days, viz: the fifth, sixth, seventh
and eighth day of November, A. D. 1872.
The returns of the votes on the proposed
amendment, shall open a poll for and make a
return to the Secretary of State of the
names of all those voting for Representatives,
and who have voted on the proposed
amendment to section 6 of article 10 of the
constitution, in accordance with law, the
ballots used by voters to have written or
printed on the reverse the words "for the
amendment," or "against the amendment."
The attention of officers of the law, voters
and others, is called to the provisions
of the law of this State, and the United
States, enacted to secure the free exercise
of the rights of suffrage, and the pre-
vention of those who may in any manner at-
tempt to interfere with this franchise.
We cordially recommend that every citizen
sign his name and have caused
[L. S.] the great seal of the State to be af-
fixed, as the city of Austin, this 15th
day of July, 1872.
