PROCLAMATION

By the Governor of the State of Texas

ents shall come : WHEREAS, By a Joint resolution of the

Twelfth Legislature of the State of Texas, passed May 17th, 1871, it was resolved, that section six, article ten of the consti-tution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read and be as follows SEC. 6. The Legislature shall not hereaf ter grant lands, except for purposes of in-ternal improvement, to any person or per-sons, nor shall any certificate for land be sold at the Land Office, except to actual soil as the Land Omee, except to actual settlers upon the same, and in lots not exceeding one hundred and sixty acres, provided that the Legislature shall not grant out of the public domain more than wenty sections of land for each mile of completed work in aid of the construction of pleted work in aid of the construction of which, land may be grawted; and provided further, that nothing in the foregoing provise shall effect any rights, granted or secured by laws passed prior to the final adoption of this amendment."

Now, therefore, I, EDMUND J. DAVIS, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of this State, do hereby order and direct that the said election to vote on the

direct that the said election to vote on the said proposed amendment to the constitu-tion of this State be held at the same time and places for voting as at the next gene ral election, viz: at the county seat of each county, and commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in Novem-Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1872, and continuing four consecutive days, viz: the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth day of November, A. D. 1872. The returning officers at said general election, shall open a pell for and make a raturn to the Secretary of State of the names of all those voting for Representatives, who have voted on the proposed amondment to section 6 of article 10 of the constitution, in accordance with law, the ballots used by voters to have written or printed on them the words "for the amend-

rinted on them the words "for the amend-nent," or "against the amendment."

The attention of officers of the law, vot-rs and others, is called to the previsions of the law of this State and the United States, enacted to secure the free exercise of the rights of suffrage, and the punish ment of those, who may in any manner at tempt to interfere with this franchise.

In testimony whereof I have hereunte-signed my name and have easised [to 8.] she great seal of the State to be af-flied, at the city of Austin, this 16th day of July, A. D. 1872.

4. If the subscriber orders his paper to
be stepped at a certain time, and the publisher southings to send it, this subscriber is




