GENERAL NATURE-No. 112.) AN ACT making appropriations for the support of the army for the year ending.

June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-three and for other purposes. For hire of quarters for officers on mili-

tary duty, hire of quarters for troops, of atore-houses for the safe-keeping of millitary stores, of offices, and of grounds for camps, and for summer cantonments, and for temporary frontier stations; for the construction of temporary huts and stables; and for repairing public buildings at es-beblished posts, one million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars

For construction and repairs of hospitals, one hundred thousand dollars. For heating and cooking stoves, ten thousand dollars

For purchase and manufacture of clothing, camp and garrison equipage, and for preserving and repacking stock of cloth-ing, camp, and garrison equipage, and ma-terials on hand at the Schuylkili areenal and other depots, seven hundred and seventy thousand dollars.

For the necessary expenses of such sales of stores or material belonging to the army establishment as may be authorized by law, ten thousand dollars. For establishing and maintaining national military cometeries, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

For army contingencies, namely, such expenses as are not previded for by other estimates, embracing all branches of the military service, seventy-five thousand

For purchase of medical and hospital supplies, pay of private physiciaus em-ployed in emergencies, hire of hospital at tendants, expenses of purveying depots, of medical examining boards, and incidental expenses of the Medical department, three

hundred thousand dollars.

For providing surgical apparatus or appliances for the relief of persons disabled in the military and naval service of the United States, and not included within the terms of any law granting artificial limbs, or other special relief, ten thousand dollars, to be expended under the direction of the Sacretary of War: Provided, That a report shall be made to Congress at its next annual session, showing the name and residence of each person relieved, and the nature and cost of the apparatus pro-

ical and other necessary works for the li-brary of the Surgeon General's Office, ten thousand dollars.

GENERAL NATURE-No. 114.

AN ACT to authorize the appointment of shipping-commissioners by the several circuit courts of the United States, to superintend the shripping and discharge of seamen engaged in merchant ships belonging to the United States, and for the further protection of seamen.

He is enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the several circuit courts of the United States, in which circuits there is a sea port States, in which circuits there is a sca-port or sea-ports or in which there is a collector of customs, or in which there is a port of entry, shall appoint a commissioner for such sea-port within their respective circuits as in their judgment may require the same, and which shall also be ports of ocean navigation; such commissioners to be termed "shipping-commissioners;" and may, from time to time, remove from office say of the said commissioners whom it may have reason to believe does not properly perform his duties; and shall provid erly perform his duties; and shall provide for the proper performance of such duties antil smother person is duly appointed in his place; shall regulate the mode of con-ducting business in the shipping-offices to be established by the shipping-commis-sioners hereinafter provided; and shall have full and complete control over the same, subject to the provisions herein con-tained.

tained. Sec. 2. That every shipping-commissioner so appointed shall enter into bonds to the United States, conditional for the faithful performance of the duties requird in his office, for a sum, in the discretion of the circuit judge, of not less than five thousand dollars, with two good and suffi-sient securities therefor, to be approved by said judge; and shall take and subscribe the following oath before entering upon the duties of his office: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be) that I will support the Constitution of the Uni-ted States; and that I will truly said faithfully discharge the duties of a shiping commissioner to the best of my ahi ity, and according to law." Said oath certificate of appointment, and signed by him, and certified by the officer before whom such oath or affirmation shall have been taken.

SEC. 3. That any shipping commissioner may engage a clerk or clerks to assist trim in the transaction of the business of the shipping-office, at his own proper cost, and may, in case of necessity, depute such clerk or clerks to act for him in his official case of its but the shipping-commissioner. capacity; but the shipping-commissioner shall be held responsible for the acts of every such clerk or deputy, may incur by the violation of any of the provisions of this act; and all acts shall be as valid and the state of the provision of the section of the se this act; and all acts shall be as valid and binding as if done by the shipping-com-missioner. Each shipping-commissioner shall provide a seal with which he shall authenticate all his official acts, on which a seal shall be engraved with the arms of the United States and the name of the sea-pert or district for which he is commissioned. Any instrument, either printed or written, purporting to be the official act of a shipping-commissioner, and purport-

SEC. 4. That every shipping-commis-sioner shall lease, rent, or procure at his own cost, suitable premises for the transof business and for the wearers tion of the books and other documents connected therewith, and which premises connected the estipping-commissioner's office." And the general business of a shipping-commissioner shall be, first, office for engaging seamen by keeping register of thier names and chakeeping register of thier names and characters; secondly, to superintend their engagement and discharge, in manner hereinafter mentioned; thirdly, to provide means for securing the presence on board at the proper times of men who are so engaged; fourthly, to facilitate the making of apprenticeships to the sea-service; and to perform such other duties relating to merchant seamen and merchant ships as

are bereby or may hereafter, under the powers herein contained, be committed to him. SEC. 5. That such fees, not exceeding the spins specified in the table marked
"A" in the schedule hereto annexed, shall be payable upon all engagements and dis-charges effected before shipping-commis-sioners as begsinafter mentioned, and such singers as negiminates mentioned, and such shipping commissioners shall cause a scale of the fees payable to be prepared, and to be conspicuously placed in the shipping-office; and the shipping commissioner may refuse to proceed with any engagement or discharge unless the fees payable thereon

are first paid. SEC. 6. That every owner, consignee, SEC. 6. That every owner, consignee, agent, or master of a ship engaging or discharging any seamen or seaman in a shipping-office, or before a shipping-commissioner. shall pay to the shipping-commissioner the whole of the fees hereby made payable in respect of such engagement or discharge, and may, for the put pose of in part reimbursing himself, deduct in respect of each such engagement or discharge, from the wages of all persons (except apprentices) so engaged or discharged; and retain any sums not exceeding the sums specified in that behalf in the table marked "B" in the schedule thereto an-

SEC. 7. That any chipping commission-er, or any cierk or employee in any shipp-ing-office, who shall demand or receive any remuneration whatever, either directly or supplying any seaman for any merchant ships, excepting the lawful fees payable under this act, shall, for every such offense, incur a penalty not exceeding two hundred

He furthermore tested blood from these cows, and found the same filthy organism, and upon mixing some of the water with milk discovered that these organisms multiplied almost indefinately. This fact being established beyond question, it is certainly reasonable to suppose that parbecome inoculate with disease.

ties partaking of this kind of milk must be liable to have their blood filled with organisms, and thereby The cows from which the milk was taken were found, upon thermomet rical tests, to be hot and feverish. Is it not possible that malignant fe vers and epidemics may arise from this fact? The accuracy with which the tests have been made at least warrants the supposition, and dairy-men should give the matter their earnest attention.
