**Gen. Banks' Inconsistency.**

Only two months ago General Banks signed his name to an address, from which the following is an extract:

"The Government during the past three and a half years has been administered by one of our comrades, who has shown wonderful civil capacity in aiding in the reduction of the public debt, in conducting our foreign affairs with great skill, and in preserving peace in the South."

The General's present opinion, or rather his opinion a few days ago, is as follows:

"The present policy of the Government is not to the advantage of the country, and it will not tend to establish its former peace and prosperity."

We are afraid that General Banks has been eating crabs and buttered water.

**Who is the Boss?**

We have read somewhere, and at some time, a story which went somewhat as follows, in substance: A fellow citizen who had been in daunting too freely in "soft-shell crabs"—or, in other words, had imbibed a little too freely of the old fashioned Democratic beverage known as whiskey, while staggering in the night an uncertain way towards home, found himself unable to accomplish all his various errands. Seizing the nearest object for support he commenced an energetic exercise of the muscles necessarily used in pumping up the contents of a dissatisfied stomach, but with limited results. The painful noise attracted the attention of a friend who approached, and observing his condition, advised him to thrust his finger down his throat. Exasperated already over his futile efforts, this intrusion was more than he could endure; and vainly endeavoring to lift his head, he indignantly remonstrated by inquiring, "Who's (hic) bossin' (hic) this here womit?"

Reading the mongrel newspapers engaged in the support of Greeley for the Presidency, one contending that he is a better Republican than Grant, another that he is in the hands of the Democracy, viewing the staggering, reeling, painfully sick condition of the coalition attempting in vain to boost the Chappanqua into a back window of the White House, it would seem to be pertinent inquiry, on the part of the

litical body, "Who's bossin' this boost?"

Everybody knows who is doing the "womit," the inebricated Democracy do not attempt to conceal its wrothful condition; and it cries out against the Greeley finger which the reformers (sic) are advising it to thrust down its throat. The indications are that the advice will not be followed—desperate as the case is. Whether it does or not will make little difference. There ~~is~~ are snakes in the gaiters all the same, a painful and disgusting sickness, and finally a horrible death. The Democracy is too old a benjaminist to survive this attack. Its vitals are eaten up by the poison it has been swallowing for a quarter of a century.

Even a good thorough "womit" will not save it. When it is dead and buried there will be found a sprightly young heir who may grow up to be a match to its neighbor across the way but at present there is nothing but disagreeable nursing, insane jibberish and odorous by the patient, and a coming odor of dissolution.

**The Effect on our National Credit.**

The overthrow of the Tammany Ring in New York in 1871, was followed by a marked improvement on the value of our national securities. From a leading financial journal of November 11, 1871, we clip the following:

"Market for Securities improved under the following influences: First the result of the New York election, imparting, as it has, a healthy stimulus throughout every department of commercial and industrial activity. Secondly, increased disposition of foreign capital to invest itself here. Since the election, the belief has been that the dividends payable to foreign creditors will be reinvested during the next two months to the extent of fifty per cent more than could otherwise have been expected. The amount of these dividends is estimated to be \$125,000,000."

Here we have cause and effect; the cause, the defeat of the Democratic party in a single State; the effect, the increase in the value of our securities throughout the world. Does any reasonable man believe that the triumph of the Democratic party would improve the value of our securities? On the contrary, can one intelligent man be found who does not believe that the defeat of the Republican party would be followed by a general depreciation of our bonds in the money markets of Europe and our own country! Our securities depend largely on the success of the party that framed the system on which they are founded. To elect men who are known to be opposed to this system, to bring into power a party that has fought for the past twelve years against it, would be an act of financial suicide.

**Chicago's Colored Voters.**

There are in Chicago between eight hundred and a thousand colored voters, and all these there are only two Greeley men—on the South Side and on the West Side—both called "scallawags" by the others—who have been bought up by the Democrats "for seed." We find, on conversing with the colored men, that Sumner's letters have been very generally read by them; but they reason, in the language of one of the more intelligent of their number, that "Greeley and Sumner have been the friends of the colored men by words, but General Grant and the Republican party have been their friends by acts. We know who gave us our freedom and the suffrage, and we stand by the regular Republican party." The colored men will go for Grant and Wilson unanimously—a fact that is not at all flattering to the influence of Charles Sumner and the Chicago Tribune.—Chic. Journal.

**BOITWELL ANNOUNCES THAT HE WILL BE ABLE TO REDUCE THE PRINCIPAL OF THE PUBLIC DEBT \$19,000,000 THIS MONTH.**

In the name of all the Greeley howlers, whose does Grant's rascally Secretary of the Treasury get the money to enable him to do this? If, as the Democrats say, the Dems are robbing the treasury, if \$250,000 of the people's cash was squandered in the North Carolina election, if all Grant's office-holders are stealing, and the taxes and tariff are lowered every year, by what sort of bogus power does Boitwell get several millions of dollars every month to apply to the reduction of the public debt? This deplorable state of things would not continue if Greeley and the Blairs were running the government.—Ms. Democrat.

**Notes from Washington.**

**The Presidential Contest—Lively Times all Round—Grant on the St. Lawrence—The North Carolina Election—A Great Republican Victory—Poor Sumner—Douglas on Greeley.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 8th, 1872.

The Presidential contest is growing lively. Speeches on both sides are now out in all the principal States, pressing the claims of their representative candidates for the White House. The feeling of the advocates of each toward the other is entirely destitute of malice, and if the Chappanqua could only forego their inveterate propensity to misrepresent the facts in reference to Grant and his Administration, the only objectionable feature in the campaign would be removed. Their false statements have been met and confuted again and again, and their receipts shown by the most unquestionable evidence. Still they are persevered in, and adhere to with a tenacity that will render, in their estimation, a falsehood as good as the truth.

**GRANT.**

The President is among the thousand Islands on the St. Lawrence river, and is censured therefore by the Chappanqua who say he should be in Washington attending to the thousand ills, under which, in their estimation, the country is suffering. How wretched these fellows have become, and how solicitous all at once, for the welfare of the country and the good of the dear people!

Among the ills described by the Tribune and the Democracy, is the hundred millions of gold in the Treasury, which should all be out, according to Greeley's oft repeated assertion, drawing interest. Put Greeley in the White House and his retainers of the Tammany stripe will put one hundred million out at interest where the people will never hear of principle or interest. Give Greeley and the Democracy control of the government, and before his one term expires the credit of the government will be where it was in 1860, when the Buchanan administration was borrowing money at twelve per cent interest. Boutwell has brought the credit of the government up again, and can now obtain all the loans required at five per cent, while propositions have been made by capitalists in Europe to take the 4 and 4 per cent bonds provided for in the funding bill, as soon as the Secretary of the Treasury is ready to issue them. They are not now required.

**THE OLD NORTH STATE ALL RIGHT.**

North Carolina is all right. The first intelligence after the election was merely guess work, prepared by the Democratic managers and manipulators of the ballot boxes, and they announced through the Associated Press a Liberal-Democratic victory with 10,000 majority. One hundred guns were fired in Judiciary Square, in the centre of the City of Washington, and the same thing was done in many of the principal cities of the Union.

Now the truth has come along, and it gives the Republicans a victory most thorough and complete. Caldwell is elected Governor by about 1900 majority. Nearly all the State offices have been filled by the Republican candidates. Five Democrats and three Republicans have been returned to Congress. A gain of one by the Republicans over last election. They have also made large gains in the State Legislature. The victory is complete. The vote last year was for a new State Constitution, and afforded no test of the relative strength of the political parties, as many Democrats, as well as Republicans, voted for it. But the election of 1870 was a fair test of strength. The Democrats had then a majority of very nearly 5,000. Now the Republicans have a majority of 1900, which throws the Democracy, with the "Liberal" vote added, over 6000 votes behind their strength in 1870! Before the election the New York Tribune announced that the 40,000 white majority was united in its opposition to the Administration, and would support the Greeley ticket. The result refutes the statement, and the same will be the case in nearly every State in the Union from Maine to Oregon.

Grant will be returned to the White House with a larger majority than he received at his first election.

**FOUR SUMMER.**

The soured Senator has made for himself an uneasy bed. By his own old life long friends he is repudiated, and most severely censured, for committing political heresies. By the colored people, almost to a man, he is denounced for his attempt to betray them into the power of their enemy. By the Liberals he is received under protest and with great jealousy, his object, they claim to be to become their leader; while the Democracy repudiates him in toto, and treat his assertion that they have been "regenerated" as unauthorized presumption on his part.

**FRED DOUGLASS ON GREELEY.**

Douglas' paper, the New National Era, and also the Colored Citizen, both owned, edited and published in Washington, by colored citizens, are out in strong condemnation of Sumner's course, in opposition to Greeley and in favor of Grant. Of Greeley, Douglas, in a speech at Richmond, Va., July 24th, said:

"I object to Mr. Greeley on the ground that he is ambiguous, a sort of amphibious animal, living on neither land nor water; neither a Republican nor a Democrat; neither a protectionist nor a free-trader; in favor of centralization and against it; in favor of centralization and against it; these opposed to Tammany and with it. Well, I said I was not going to say any harsh things about him, but let me tell you, my fellow citizens, speaking as a colored man, I regard the election of Horace Greeley as one of the worst calamities that could possibly befall the Republic!"

COPY OF ACT—RETAIL DEALER IN LEAF TOBACCO.

RETAIL dealers in leaf tobacco are required to pay a special tax of \$500, and if the annual sales exceed \$1000, they are made liable for an additional tax of fifty cents for every dollar in excess of \$1000 of their sales.

The retail dealer in leaf tobacco, as defined by the act of June 6, 1872 is any person whose business it is to sell leaf tobacco in quantities less than an original hogshead, case or bale, or who sells to persons other than the following three classes of purchasers, viz: 1. Dealers in leaf tobacco who have paid a special tax as such. 2. Manufacturers of tobacco, snuff, or cigars. 3. Persons who purchase in original packages for export. The payment of any other special tax will not exempt a person who sells leaf tobacco, except he has been exempted from the payment of the special tax as a retail dealer in leaf tobacco.
