GENERAL NATURE-No. 114. AN ACT to authorize the appeintment of shipping-commissioners by the several circuit courts of the United States, to superintend the shipping and discharge of seamen engaged in merchant ships belonging to the United States, and for the Sec. 8. That in the case of any place or

Sec. 8. That in the case of any place or port in which no shipping commissioner shall have been appointed, then the whole or any part of the business of a shipping commissioner shall be conducted by the spilector or deputy collector of such place or port; and in respect of such business such custom-bouse shall be deemed a shipping office, and the collector or deputy collector of customs to whom such husiness shall be considered. lector of customs to whom such husiness shall be committed shall for all purposes be deemed a shipping-commissioner within the meaning of this act; and any person other than a commissioner under this act who shall perform, or attempt to perform, either directly or indirectly, the duties which are by this act set forth as pertaining to a "shipping commissioner," shall incur a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars: Provided, This nothing in this act whall be construed as to prevent the owner, or consignee, or master of any ship, except such as are described in section twelve of this act, from performing himself, so far as the said ships are conhimself, so far as the said ships are concerned, the duties of shipping-commissione

under this act.

Sec. 9. That every shipping-commissioner appointed under this act shall, if applied to for the purpose of apprenticing hops to the sea-service by any masters or owners of ships, or by any purson or persons legally qualified, give such assistance as in their power for facilitating the making of such apprenticeships; but the shipping-commissioner shall ascertain that the boy has voluntarily consented to be bound, and that the parents or guardian of said boy have consented to said apprenticeship, and has attained the age of twelve years, and under this act. has attained the age of twelve years, and is of sufficient health and strength, and that the master to whom the Boy is to be that the master to whom the Boy is to be bound is a proper person for the purpose: Provided, That said apprenticeable had terminate when the apprentice becomes sighteen years of age. And the shipping-tommissioner may receive from the persons availing themselves of such assistance the fees contained in table "C" in the schedule hereto annexed. And the shipping commissioner shall keep a register of all indentures of apprenticeahip made before him.

That the master of every foreigngoing ship shall, before the carrying any apprentice to sea from any place in the United States, cause such apprentice to United States, cause such apprentice to appear before the shipping-commissioner before whom the crew is engaged, and shall produce to him the indeuture, by which such apprentice is bound, and the assignment or assignmentsthereof, (if any,) and the name of said apprentice, with the date of the indenture and the assignment or assignments thereof (if any) shall be entered on the agreement; and no such assignment shall be made without the approval of a commissioner, the apprentice, his parents, or his guardists. And for any default in obeying the provisions of this section, the master shall, for each offense, incur a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars.

That whenev er the mastes of any vessel shall engage his crew, or any part of the same, in any customs district where no shipping-com-missioner shall have been appointed under section one of this act, he may perform for himself the duties of such commissioner to like manner as is provided by the proviso of section eight of this set: Provided fur-ther. That this section shall not apply to masters of resselt where the seaton are masters of vessels where the sension are by custom or agreement outified to parti-cipate in the profits or result of a crissopr voyage, nor to masters of lake going ves-sels that souch at foreign ports; but seasels that some at foreign ports; suresemen may, by agreement, serve on board such vessels a definite time, or on the returnfof any vessel to a port in the United States may reship and sail in the same vessel on another voyage without the payment of additional fees to the shipping-commissioner by either the scamen or the visater.

Sec. 15. That every master of a mer chant ship of the United States who en-gages any seaman at a place out of the United States, in which there is a consular officer or commercial agent, shall, before carrying such seaman to sea, procure the sanction of such officer, and shall engage seamen before such officer; and the same rules as are hereinbefore contained with respect to the engagement of seamen be-fore a shipping-commissioner in the Unit-ed States shall apply to such engagements made before consular officer or commercial agent; and upon every such engagement the consular officer or commercial agent shall endorse upon the agreement his ametion thereof, and an attestation to the effect that the same has been signed in his presence, and otherwise made as here-by required; and every master who en-gages any seaman in any place in which there is a consular officer or commercial there is a coussiar officer or commercial agent otherwise than as hereinbefore required shall incur a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, for which penalty the ship shall be held liable; and all such agreements so made shall be void, and the seamen so engaged shall be entitled to recover the highest rate of wages of the port from which the seamen was ship-

That if any advance of wages is made or advance security given to any acaman in any such manner as to constitute a breach of any of the above provisions, the wages of such seaman shall be recoverable by him as if no such advance had been made or promised; and in the case of any advance security so given no person shall be sued thereon unless he was party to anch breach.

SEC. 19. That whenever any advance security is discounted for any seaman, such seaman shall sign or set his mark to a receipt indorsed on the security, stating the sum actually paid or accounted for to the sum actually paid or eccounted for to him by the person discounting the same; and if he sails in the ship from the port of departure mentioned in the security, and is then duly earning his wages, or is previously discharged with the consent of the master, but not otherwise, the person discounting the security may, ten days after the final departure of the ship from the said port of departure mentioned in the security, sue for and recover the amount promised by the security, with costs, either from the owner or from any agent, who has drawn or authorized the drawing of the security, in any justice's or other competent court; and in any such proceeding it shall be sufficient for such person to prove the scenrity was given by

A Postmaster is required to give no tice by letter (returning a paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken; and a neglect to do do so makes the Postmaster responsible to the publishers for the payments.

2. Any person who takes a puper from the Postellies, shether directed to his name or auction, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.

3. If a person orders his paper discon-tinued, he must pay all arrearages or the publisher may continue to seed it until the payment is made.

To this beneficent and vitally needed Reform, The Tribung will devote ita best energies, regardless of personal interests or party predilections, esteeming the choice of honest and faith-

ful men to office as of all New Departures the most essential and auspleieus. The virtual surrender by the Democratic arty of its hostility to Equal Rights regardless of Color has divested our current politics of half their bygone intensity. However parties may henceforth rise or fall, it is clear that the fundamental principles which have hitherto honorably dis ciples which have hitherto honorably dis-tinguished the Republicans are henceforth to be regarded as practically accepted by the whole country.
