Newspaper Laws

We would call the special attention of Postmasters and subscribers to the following synopsis of the newspaper laws.

1. A Postmaster's required 4a give no tice by letter (returning a paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken; and a neglect to de do so makes the Postmaster responsible to the publishers for the payment.

ment.

2. Any person who takes a paper from
the Postoffine, whether directed to his name
or another, or whether he has subscribed or
not, is responsible for the pay.

3. If a person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arreatages or the
publisher may continue to send it sutil the
payment is made.

4. If he subscriber erders his paper to
be stopped at a certain time, and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is
beaut to pay for it if he takes it from the
Postoffice. The law proceeds upon the
ground that a man must pay for what he
use.

5. The courts have decided that refusing to take mempapers and periodicals from the Postoffice, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, in prima tacip, ovidence of intentional fraud.
