MEXICO.

We had a conversation yesterday with a young gentleman just arrived from Monterey and other points of Mexico.

"As we understand the condition of affairs as detailed by him the frontier States are in a pandemoniac condition. Our informant and his comrades were compelled to give up their arms to a squad of Arocha's soldiers, being told that they would ultimately get their pay for them from the government. A worthless receipt was given for them, and they were fortunate in getting off with their lives. The officer who took the arms seemed to be angry that his subjects of plunder were not mounted on horses instead of mules. Business everywhere was at a standstill."

"Mr. Ulrich, the U. S. Consul at Monterey had been compelled to respond to a prostrate demand of \$1500,—having previously responded to the amount of \$5000. "We demand it of you as a merchant, not as U. S. Consul," say the polite but inexorable robbers. The Federal troops at Monterey on the 10th inst. were about 6000 strong, and they were tolerably well armed and equipped."

The whole frontier of Mexico is in the most lamentable condition. Every industry is at a standstill, and the whole country is at the mercy of the ladrones, both official and otherwise. No peace, either for or against the Mexican frontier is possible until our government shall take possession of that country.

Policy, and the dictates of humanity demand it. It is due to ourselves, and it will prove an act of mercy to that distracted and afflicted people.

Let our government act promptly and decisively. There is no other course but a firm military occupation, and since that is inevitable, the sooner it is accomplished the better for both countries.

COPY OF ACT—RETAIL DEALER IN LEAF TOBACCO.

RETAIL dealers in leaf tobacco are required to pay a special tax of \$500, and if their annual sales exceed \$1000, they are made liable for an additional tax of fifty cents for every dollar in excess of \$1000 of their sales.

The retail dealer in leaf tobacco, as defined by the act of June 6, 1872 is any person whose business is to sell leaf tobacco in quantities less than an original hoghead, case or bale, or who sells to persons other than the following three classes of purchasers, viz: 1. Dealers in leaf tobacco who have paid a special tax, as such. 2. Manufacturers of tobacco, snuff, or cigars. 3. Persons who purchase in original packages for export. The payment of any other special tax will not exempt a person who sells leaf tobacco as hereinbefore stated, from the payment of the special tax as a retail dealer in leaf tobacco.

PROCLAMATION

By the Governor of the State of Texas, TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME: Whereas, it is provided by section thirty-seven (37) of article (3) of the constitution of this State, that at the first general election after the acceptance of the Constitution, an election shall be held to settle permanently the seat of government of the State of Texas.

Now, therefore, I, EDMUND J. DAVIS, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this State, do hereby order and direct that said election for the permanent settlement of the seat of government of this State be held at the same time and place for voting, as at the next general election, viz: at the county seat of each county, and commencing on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1872, and continuing four consecutive days, viz: the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth days of November, A. D. 1872.

The returns of said election shall be transmitted to the Governor and other returning officers in accordance with law.

The attention of officers of the law, voters and others is called to provisions of the law of this State and the United States, enacted to secure the free exercise of the rights of suffrage, and the punishment of those who may in any manner attempt to interfere with this franchise.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto signed my name and have caused to be affixed, at the city of Austin, this 16th day of July, A. D. 1872. EDMUND J. DAVIS, Governor.

PROCLAMATION

By the Governor of the State of Texas, TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

Whereas, By a joint resolution of the Twelfth Legislature of the State of Texas, passed May 17th, 1821, it was resolved, "that section six, article ten of the constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereinafter set forth, to wit: SEC. 6. The Legislature shall not hereafter grant lands, except for purposes of internal improvement, to any person or persons, nor shall any certificate for land be sold at the Land Office, except to actual settlers upon the same, and in lots not exceeding one hundred and sixty acres, provided that the Legislature shall not grant out of the public domain more than twenty sections of land for each mile of completed work in aid of the construction of which land may be granted; and provide further, that nothing in the foregoing proviso shall affect any rights granted or printed on the words 'for the amendment,' or 'against the amendment.'"

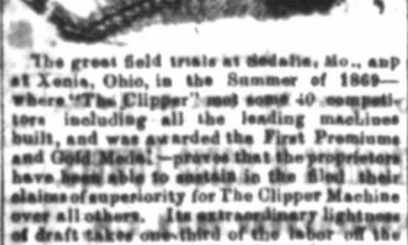

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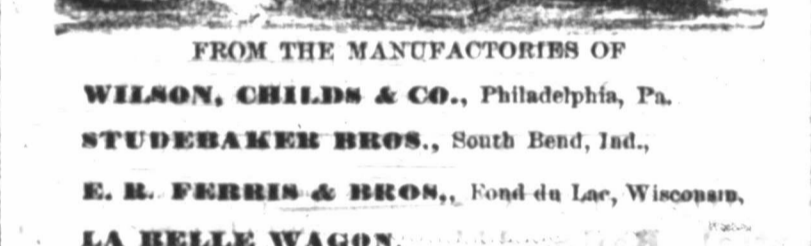
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
