tice by letter (returning a paper does not
answer the law) when a subscriber does not
take his paper out of the office, and state
the reasons for its not being taken; and a
neglect to de do so makes the Postmaster
responsible to the publishers for the payment.

ment.

2. Any person who takes a paper from
the Postellies, whether directed to his passe
or another, or whether he has subscribed or
not, is responsible for the pay.

3. It's person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arrearages or the
publisher may continue to send it until the
payment is made.

4. If the subscriber orders his paper to
be stopped at a certain time, and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is
bound to pay for it if he takes it from the
Postellies. The law proceeds apon the
ground that a man must pay for what he
uses.

5. The courts have decided that refusing

5. The courts have decided that refusing to take decreases and periodicals from the Postoffice, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prime facis avidence of intentional fraid.
