In Schenectady N. Y. where there is a large manufactory of locomotives and steam-cars, a new locomotive, of pretensions size and strength was recently started upon the railroad track with great pride, display, and enthusiasm, named and labelled with due formalities "Horace Greely."

The noisy engine which, it was believed, would run all things in its peculiar line, sped with wonderful celerity a little over a mile when it shot off the track, "ran into the ground," and knocked itself into "smithereens."

This was decidedly ominous, and it is now stated as good authority that there is not a Greely man to be found in that whole section. Very likely—and there is another noisy engine Greely running himself in to the ground with alarming rapidity.

What Horace Greely says about our Indian Frontier.

We reproduce to-day a correspondence which took place in Feb. 1871 between Hon. E. Degener, then the Representative from this District in Congress, and the "N. Y. Tribune" which we commend to the perusal of our readers, and especially to those living on the Indian frontier.

The Tribune's reply bears the name of Mr. Greely himself, and was no doubt written with his own hand; but in any case, he, as the editor of that paper, was and still is responsible for the sentiments uttered. How do our frontiersmen like the idea of voting for a man for the Presidency who advocates the protection of the "gentle" savage to their own?

Editors Tribune.

Your daily issue of February 9th contains the following:

"The virtual defeat of the House of the Bill to organize a body of Texas rangers for the protection of the frontier against the Indians, will greatly gratify all interested in the success of the present peaceful Indian policy. If the Texas frontier is exposed, let the government troops defend it, but to organize a volunteer force there, is to begin an offensive campaign against the Indians in that quarter, and we have already had something too much of this kind of warfare for the general peace and good."

An influential paper with so extensive a circulation as the "Tribune" ought to show more care in its criticisms than the above article evinces. The bill alluded to has for its object the removal of obstacles which might eventually prove

the "Tribune" advocates. The remedies against the existing evils, which are embodied in the bill, are not merely endorsed by the frontier people themselves, but by all the authorities who can speak advisedly of the condition of our frontier, the military commanders of Texas, the Secretary of War, and the President himself. It is shown by sufficient evidence in the Congressional Committee of Indian Affairs that the present frontier defense is inadequate, not only numerically, but also because a regular is not, and in the nature of things cannot be educated to the peculiar warfare of frontier life, within a period so short as the term of enlistment of our private soldiers.

The want of action on the part of Congress forced the State of Texas to protect itself, and it mustered a regiment of rangers into its service at its own expense. These rangers have done splendid service. Five hundred men have of course not been able to perform the task of entirely protecting our extended frontier, but they have amply shown, that citizens born and raised on the frontier are a safer material for this peculiar kind of warfare than that which is at the disposal of our recruiting officers in the Atlantic cities, and that a combination of "Regular" and "Citizen Soldiers" can accomplish more than a greater number of the former alone.

It can not be denied that any "Army under State authority may easily lead to conflicts with the national authorities, and that the "material" of which rangers are composed, endangers the peace policy. In view of this danger, the rangers contrary to the one bellum usages were placed under the command of the General commanding the district of Texas, and no conflict of authorities has thus far arisen. To make the system still more perfect, and to reduce the expenses, the bill—the defeat of which the "Tribune" believes "will greatly gratify all interested in the success of the present peaceful Indian policy"—was offered by the Committee on Indian Affairs.

To substantiate my remark I respectfully refer to the bill itself, to my speech on the subject, and to the discussion which ended in the defeat of the bill. I am well aware that the enormous amount of printed matter daily flooding your "sanctum" almost precludes the possibility of a careful study of those documents. Some such examination, is, however, necessary to enable you to correct an error in which you have led millions, who look to your paper as their adviser, and thus destroy the disastrous influence which the indifference of Congress to our frontiersmen and its refusal to do anything for protection, must necessarily have upon the loyalty of those suffering citizens.

Washington, Feb. 11th, 1871. To this letter the "Tribune" gives the following reply, without however, reproducing the letter itself: "We haven't a doubt, since doubly assured of the fact by Representative Degener of Texas, that his frontier constituents approved his late bill authorizing their arming to fight the Indians on the border. But that is no particular recommendation to the rest of the country. We hear of Indian war innumerable, brought about by the aggressions of armed frontiersmen upon Indian tribes whom they have forced from the reservation guaranteed them by treaty. That policy has been sugared to afflict us long enough. The Indian on his reservation has rights which the government is bound to see that the frontiersmen respect, and arising there, we respectfully submit, is not the way to do this. Mr. Degener writes to us of "the peculiarities of frontier warfare" to which the regular army is not, and the nature of things cannot be educated, as if he had not heard that it has been the declared policy of the government ever since the 4th of March, 1869 to do away with that peculiar and unnatural and unjust warfare, which in disguise of frontier defense the settlers have for years past waged against the Indians. We ought not to have any more of it; the defeat of Mr. Degener's bill we accept as an assurance that there is to be no more of it."

On motion, the report of committee on permanent organization was adopted.

On motion, Convention adjourned until 4 o'clock, P. M.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment. All the delegates not being present, the Convention, on motion, adjourned until 7 o'clock, P. M.

Convention met at 7 o'clock, pursuant to adjournment.

Roll of counties called. All present—excepting Caldwell and Bastrop.

Minutes of preceding meeting read and adopted.

Nomination of candidates for Congress from the 4th Congressional District, was then declared in order.

Mr. Sternberg nominated Judge T. C. Barden, of Victoria.

Mr. Grothaus nominated W. O. Hutchinson, Esq., of San Marcos.

Mr. Shoemaker nominated Judge L. Lindsey, of Fayette county.

Mr. W. P. Newcomb, Col. J. L. Haynes, of Brownville.

Judge T. C. Barden nominated Hon. J. P. Newcomb, of Austin.

Nominations were then declared close at. Hon. J. P. Newcomb, in a few brief remarks declined the nomination, and withdrew his name.

The names of the candidates we then allowed a short time to place if he claims of their candidates before the Convention.

On motion, it was declared that a two-thirds majority be required for the choice of a candidate in this Convention.

The Convention then proceeded to an election, viva voce, by counties.

HEADQUARTERS FORT SELL, I. T., August 19th, 1872. To the Acting Assistant Adjutant General, Department of Texas, San Antonio, Texas:

Sir—I have the honor to report, for the information of the Department Commander, that two girls of the Lee family—captured by Kiowa near Fort Griffin, Texas, in June last—were brought in to the Agency here by Lone Wolf, Kiowa Chief, yesterday, and delivered up to the Agent, "Sun Boy," brother of Kicking Bird, and six or eight other Kiowas, came in with Lone Wolf. Kicking Bird himself stayed back at the Wichita Agency. Lone Wolf promises to bring in the boy (brother of these girls) in a short time, and Mr. Tatum thinks he will keep his promise. The girls are to be kept here (at their own request) awaiting the arrival of their brother. When he is brought in, or as soon as it is ascertained that he will not be brought in, it is intended to send the children to Fort Richardson. They have a brother, Robert Lee, living near Fort Griffin, and they can be sent to him from Richardson.

WHEREAS, on the 16th day of August, A. D. 1872, James P. Newcomb, a citizen of the County and State aforesaid, now residing in Travis County in said State, and John Gore Newcomb, formerly a resident citizen of said county of Bexar, and State of Texas, now a citizen of Atascosa County in said State, filed a petition for a writ of error, alleging that they are the plaintiffs in a certain suit, pending in the district court of Bexar county, styled No. 2933 J. P. & J. G. Newcomb vs. Eliza Newcomb et al., wherein Eliza Newcomb, J. C. Hall, C. A. Harper and J. H. Bonck were the defendants; that said J. C. Hall having died, his heirs, Wm. H. Hall, Theodore Ayers and Theodore Ayers, were under parties; and the said J. H. Bonck having also died, the heirs of said J. H. Bonck, that at the February term, A. D. 1872, of said district court on the 16th day of May, 1872, said cause came on for trial, and a judgment was rendered, whereby it was adjudged that the said plaintiffs recover nothing by their suit, and that the defendants recover of the plaintiffs and the surties on their cost bond all costs incurred in said suit for which execution could issue; that they believe themselves aggrieved by the said judgment, that the same is erroneous and that many errors appear upon the face of the record; that said Wm. Hall is a resident of Gifford county in said State, that said Mrs. Theodore Ayers and her husband Theodore Ayers are residents of Galveston county in said State; that N. O. Green, a resident of said county of Bexar and State of Texas, is the Attorney of record of said Wm. Hall and Theodore Ayers and their heirs and assigns, and C. A. Harper also a non-resident of this State, and that neither said Eliza Newcomb and C. A. Harper have any Attorney of record nor any other Attorney to represent them in said cause.

Petitioners having filed their obligation as required by law, pray that citation issue for said parties, resident in this State, commanding them to appear before our Supreme Court at its next term, and that said non-residents of the State be cited as may be directed, that a writ of superedeas issue and that in due time the record of this cause be transmitted to the Supreme Court.

And whereas, said plaintiffs in error have filed a supplement to the above described petition, alleging that neither said defendant Eliza Newcomb, nor C. A. Harper were ever represented by an Attorney of record or otherwise, nor have said parties any such Attorney at present, nor have they had, nor have they how any agent known to plaintiffs in error; that plaintiffs in error be used due diligence to ascertain the facts, and therefore pray that said parties be cited by publication in the manner provided by law for citation in the district court, which said supplemental allegations are verified by the affidavits of Wm. L. Leary, Attorney for the said plaintiffs in error.

And whereas, affidavits have been made before me that the said defendants Eliza Newcomb and C. A. Harper are not residents of this State of Texas, and that neither said Eliza Newcomb and C. A. Harper have filed a good and sufficient bond, approved by me and conditioned according to law. These are therefore to command you that you summon the said defendants, Eliza Newcomb and C. A. Harper, by publication of this writ in some regular printed newspaper, published in this county, for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, to be and appear before the Honorable Supreme Court of the State of Texas at the next term thereof, to be held at the city of Austin, beginning on the first Monday in December, A. D. 1872, then and there to do duty as aforesaid. Hereto I have put my hand and the seal of my office in San Antonio, this 24th day of August, A. D. 1872.
