UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Forty-Second Congress.

GENERAL NATURE No. 118. AN ACT to revise, consolidate, and amend the statutes relating to the Post-Office Department.

Sec. 210. That the Postmaster G See 210. That the Postmaster General shall arrange the railway routes on which the mail is carried, including those in which the service is partly by railway and partly by steamboat, into three classes, according to the size of the mails, the speed at which they are carried, and the frequency and importance of the service, so that each railway company shall receive, as far as practicable, a proportionate and just rate of compensation, according to the service performed.

sec. 211. That the pay for carrying the mail on any ratiway of the first class shall not exceed three hundred dollars per mile per annum; on any railway of the second lars per mile per annum; and on any rail-way of the third class it shall not exceed fifty dellars per mile per annum; but if-one half the service on any railway is re-quired to be performed in the night-sime, the Postmaster General may pay twenty five per centum in addition to the above

Sec. 212. That if the Postmaster Gene ral is unable to contract for carrying the mail on any railway-route at a compensation not exceeding the maximum rates herein provided, or for which he may deem a reasonable and fair compensation, he may separate the letter-mail from the other mail, and contract, either with or without advertising, for carrying such letter-mail by horse express or otherwise, at the greatest speed that can reasonably be obtained, and for carrying the other mail in wagment or otherwise, it allows
