By letter received from a prominent citizen of this city, now up the country, writing under date of the sixth says, "there is considerable excitement among the Mexicans in this vicinity in relation to the claims submitted to the Border Commissioners. They feel very bitter towards all who have filed claims, and especially towards their own countrymen who have given testimony favorable to the claimants. They expect a riot to be held on the border side all who have in any way been connected with the Claim Commission.

CAL DOUGLASS of the Herald who has been returned from Chappagna and other border water places of the north, assures his readers that it is his conviction that there is not the slightest ground for despondency, showing promising that all lovers of their country turn out and defend their rights. That's just what's the matter. These same "lovers" will turn out and do their duty, and they are all either for or against it. If you won't vote, don't vote. If you won't vote, don't vote.

The Statesman is lugubrious over the condition of Austin, and thinks if the citizens of that city had voted \$500,000 to the Indiana Railroad they would not be so at the present juncture.

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The Interests of the People of Western Texas in the coming election!

Are they with the Republican or with the Democratic party? This is a question which it is well to solve now, and when solved to respect. It is one of easy solution. We propose to demonstrate a single proposition to-day—others will be demonstrated in due time.

It is now a conceded fact, by all except the deluded aspirants for office and position, that Grant will be elected. The result of the elections in five States, the unmistakable tone of the leading newspapers all over the country, which to a greater or less extent reflect public opinion, the apparent despondency of Greeley himself as indicated in the columns of the *Tribune*, show that he, even as well as a host of his backers are giving up the contest. Grant then will be elected. Shall we help to elect him and perpetuate a Republican government? If so, it is well known that the limited government favors which Congress allows to Western Texas will be increased and may be secured for San Antonio and its tributary counties.

We can secure the military depot at this place; we can secure a proper share of appropriations for the improvement of the harbors of the Western coast of Texas; we can secure appropriations from Congress for the protection of our frontiers from Indian raids; we can secure active governmental measures to prevent the inroads upon our Territory of Mexican robbers and plunderers.

Will a Republican Congress listen to our appeals if we continue to show ourselves hostile to the administration of general government? It must be remembered that Congress regulates this business—that the constitution gives no authority to the President to act independently. He can only act in accordance with law. His duty is simply to execute the laws.

Now the voters of Western Texas have presented to them two candidates for Congress. The one, John Hancock, represents—what? The interests of Austin merely, which means the interests of John Hancock, in consequence of his large properties there. The other is W. O. Hutchinson, who has no local interest, but who will exert his influence for the benefit of the whole West, without regard to section, but will see to it that San Antonio shall receive her dues. In ability, integrity and patriotism, suppose we admit invidious comparisons; still, who is the real, genuine representative of Western Texas and her interests? The man must be blind to facts who does not at once know his true friend.

For illustration, Mr. Hancock succeeded in defeating the bill which would have secured for San Antonio the erection of a government depot here. Many thousands of dollars would have been immediately expended by the government in this city for the erection of a government depot. This would have secured a completion of railroads, without subsidy, at an early day. Mr. Hutchinson would have pursued a course just the contrary to that of Mr. Hancock, and in the interests of this frontier. There would be activity now in all business here had we been truly represented, and the farmers and country people generally would have a better market for all which they produce. Now, trade is languishing; every class of business is dull; and instead of the railroads pushing forward from all points, vying with each other as to which shall reach San Antonio first, the sole effort made is, which shall bleed us the most. Like the revolutionary chiefs of Mexico their representatives visit us only to issue their intolerable *prescriptions*.

Adherence to party may be very well in its place; but a people blind to its own interests must suffer for the consequences. Those who propose to support the Democratic or reform ticket, as it is sometimes called, seemingly in jest, are simply voting away their common sense and reason, and their own best interests, "to spite the radicals." They might as well snip their noses to spite their own faces.

But if our people shall support the present administration, as well as the party which is in accord with it, the evidence will be ample to the government that we are a sensible, law-abiding and loyal people, and there will be no more hesitation on the part of Congress or the executive in appropriating and ex-

pending the means necessary for our frontier protection, and for making this city the permanent depot of Western Texas. The pecuniary, as well as every other interest, of every man in this district lies in his voting for the Republican ticket.

Upon this subject we shall hereafter have more to say.

Proceedings
of a Convention of the Republicans of the 29th Senatorial District for the purpose of nominating a Senator and four Representatives for the next Legislature, held at Kotela's Hall, San Antonio, Sept. 13th 1872.

The Convention was called to order by Hon. W. J. Locke of Bexar, member of the State Executive Committee for 29th District.

Col. S. G. Newton of Bexar was elected permanent Chairman, and W. H. Huston Secretary.

Credentials of delegates from Bexar, Comal, Wilson, Kendall, and Blanco were then presented, and upon motion referred to a committee for examination, which reported the credentials in order, and recommended the admission of the delegates from the above named counties to seats in the convention.

Upon motion the report of the committee was adopted and the delegates admitted.

Upon motion of Hon. E. Degeuer the following ratio of representatives in the convention was adopted: Bexar 14, Wilson 2, Comal 4, Kendall 2, and Blanco 2.

Upon motion of Mr. Gross the Convention adjourned for one hour and a half, to await the arrival of the delegation from Gillespie reported to be on the way to the city.

Before the adjournment Hon. E. Degeuer moved that nominations for Senator and Representatives be made. Motion carried.

The following nominations were then made:

For the Senate—A. Dittmar of Bexar Co., J. W. Van Sljk of Bexar Co., Genl. Adolf Zoeller of Kendall Co.

For Representatives—J. W. Hermann of Blanco Co., J. M. Flores of Wilson Co., W. J. Locke of Bexar Co., Wm. Warhamund of Gillespie Co., Keilner of Blanco Co., Real of Burnett Co.

The nominations then closed, and the convention adjourned for one hour and a half.

Upon the reassembling of the convention Hon. E. Degeuer stated, that Mr. Dittmar having declined to run, he withdrew his name from before the convention.

Genl. A. Zoeller then withdrew his name also from before the convention.

On motion of Hon. E. Degeuer Mr. J. W. Van Sljk was unanimously declared the nominee of the convention for the office of Senator for the 29th Senatorial District.

Hon. E. Degeuer then nominated Gen. Zoeller as Representative, Gen. Zoeller declined and withdrew his name, and also withdrew the name of Mr. Keilner from nomination.

The convention then proceeded to vote for the following result:

Herrmann 25; Flores 24; Locke 17; Warhamund 24; Zell 7.

Messrs. J. W. Hermann, J. M. Flores, W. J. Locke, Wm. Warhamund were declared elected.

The convention then proceeded to elect an executive committee for the 29th Senatorial District.

The following persons were chosen as said committee, S. G. Newton of Bexar, M. C. Horrens of Wilson, A. Zoeller of Kendall, Geo. Weber of Comal, Dr. J. Odium of Blanco, A. M. Cox of Burnett, Llano vacant, F. Retzner of Mason, Wm. Warhamund Gillespie, C. Keilner of Kerr, D. Rugh of Bandera.

On motion of E. Degeuer, the executive committee was instructed, in case any of the persons nominated should fail to accept, to make a nomination to fill the vacancy thus occasioned, and that the preference of this convention be for Genl. A. Zoeller of Kendall.

Col. S. G. Newton of Bexar was then elected Chairman of the Senatorial Executive committee.

On motion the Secretary was directed to notify the nominees of their nomination. The Convention then adjourned.

He is not corrupt himself, but the cause of corruption in others.

and straw. The existence of such a man is miserable beyond measure, doomed as he is to perpetual hyperity, with a constant consciousness that his lumbago is detected. Even more miserable is the man who is owned by a horse, especially when that horse can just trot fast enough to be passed ignominiously by every butcher on the road.

In all this, however, there is much discomfort, but no actual crime. It is now our duty to consider the horse as a hotbed of corruption and a leaping source of iniquity. Take the horse-drover, the deacon and the jockey, and is not our assertion borne out, that the horse is the spring of woe unnumbered? Deacons have been known to sell blind horses even to the pre-riding elder of their circuit, and the enormity of their offense has hardly been expiated by the subsequent discovery that the elder's horse had sweened in the shoulder and was badly glandered. The horse-jockey is proverbial for ways that are dark, and long as a file holds out to rasp, the vilest aged horse will renew his youth like the eagle's. Place a horse in the shafts of a hack, and straightway along the lines which connect him with the driver will course an electric current of baseness, leading to over-charging, impudence and the wearing of white hats with black crape bands. Taken for all in all, the horse's influence on humanity has invariably been for evil; and the rural physician as soon as the corn shucking season is over and debates begin to ripen, need hardly pause a moment to decide on a ringing vote that the ox is the more useful animal.

The horse has played an important part in history. The times of David, some of which were traced to chariots and some in horses; and it is gratifying to know that those speculators in agricultural horsemanship of that early day invariably walked home. Calligai made his horse a general, while Cassius the Barbarian of the period to lecture on Civil Service Reform at two hundred dollars a night, cash in advance.

King Richard the Third offered his kingdom for a horse, but as the kingdom was already lost, he was clearly endeavoring to obtain a horse under false pretenses. Men have been hanged for less.
