

A. D. 1872, and continuing four consecutive days, viz: the fifth, sixth, seventh
and eighth days of November, A. D. 1872
The returns of said election shall be transmitted to the Governor and other return

ing officers in accordance with law.

The attention of officers of the law, voters and others is called to provisions of the law of this State and the United States, enacted to secure the free exercise of the rights of suffrage, and the punishment of those who may in any manner at tempt to interfere with this franchise. The Legislature shall not hereaf ter grant lands, except for purposes of inter grant lands, except for purposes of in-ternal improvement, to any person or per-sons, nor shall any certificate for land be sold at the Land Office, except to actual settlers upon the same, and in lots not ex-ceeding one hundred and sixty acres, pro-vided that the Legislature shall not grant out of the public domain more than twen-ty sections of land for each mile of com-pleted work in aid of the construction of leted work in aid of the construction of which, land may be granted; and provided further, that nothing in the foregoing

provise shall effect any rights, granted or secured by laws passed prior to the final adoption of this amendment." Now, therefore, I, EDMUND J.
