BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STARES OF AMERICA. A RPOCLAMATION.

ARTICLE XI.

Consuls, vice-consuls, or consular agents, shall have the exclusive charge of the internal order of the merchant vessels of their nation. They shall have therefore the exclusive power to take cognisance of and to settle all differences which may arise at sea or in port between captains, officers, and crews, in reference to wages and the execution of mutual contracts, subject in each case to the laws of their

own nation.

The local authorities shall in no way interfere, except in cases where the differ-cuces on board ship are of a nature to disturb the peace and public order in port or on shore, or when persons other than the officers and crew of the vessel are parties to the disturbance; except as aforesaid the local authorities shall confine themselves to the rendering of forcible assistance if required by the consuls, vice con-suls, or consular agents, and shall cause the arrest, temporary imprisonment, and removal on board his own vessel, of every person whose name is found on the mus-ter-rolls or register of the ship or list of

ARTICLE XII. ARTICLE XII.

Consula-general, consula, vice-consula, or consular agents, shall have the power to cause the arrest of all sailers or all other persons belonging to the crews of vassels of their nation who may be guilty of having deserted on the respective territories of the high contracting powers, and to have them sent on board or back to their native country.

To that end they shall make a written application to the competent local author-application to the competent local author-

To that end they shall make a wristen application to the competent local authority, supporting it by the exhibition of the ship's register and list of the crew, or else, should the vessel have sailed previously, by producing an authenticated copy of these documents, shewing that the persons claimed really do belong to the ship's crew.

Upon such request the surrender of the deserter shall not be refused. Every aid and assistance shall, moreover, be granted to the said consular authorities for the detection and arrest of deserters, and the latter shall be taken to the prisons of the country and there detained at the request

ARTICLE XIII.

In all cases where no other agreement to In all cases where no other agreement to the contrary exists between owners, freighters, and insurers, all damages suf-fered as sea by the vessels of the two countries, whether they enter the respec-tive ports—voluntarily or by stress of weather, shall be settled by the consular general, consuls, vice-consuls, or consular agents of their respective nation, provid-ed no interests of citizens of the country where the said functionaries reside, nor of citizens of a third power, are concerned. In that case, and in the absence of a friendly compromise between all parties interested, the adjudication shall take place under supervision of the local authorities.

ARTICLE XIV. Central Railroad!

In the event of a vessel belonging to the government, or owned by a citizen of one of the two contracting States, being wreeked or east on shore upon the coast of the other, the local anthorities shall inform the consuls general, consuls, vice consuls, or consular agents of the district of the occurrence; or if such consular agency does not exist, they shall communicate with the consul general, consul, vice-consul, or consular agent of the nearest dis-


