Article XXIV. The United States of America and the Kingdom of Italy mutually engage not to grant any particular favor to either nation, in respect to commerce and navigation, which shall not immediately become common to the other party, who shall not enjoy the same freely, if the concession was freely made, or on allowing the same to be made, if the concession was conditional.

Dr. Newman's Testimony.

I have dined at his house and he at mine, I have been with him at private and public dinners. I have just spent a week at his cottage at Long Branch, where we had family prayer twice a day. And therefore, having these opportunities to know him so well, I assure you that he is a sober, honest, true man, fearing God, loving the church, and devoted to his country's good. While at Long Branch I

went over carefully all the instances of intoxication which have been published, and in every instance the facts proved the stories false."

The following synopsis of the naturalization laws will be found of interest to those who are about to take out naturalization papers, in view of the coming election:

Aliens who arrived in the United States before they were eighteen years of age, and who have continued to reside here, are not required to take out any "first papers" or certificate of declaration, but may receive their "full papers" after having resided five years in the United States and having become twenty-one years of age.

Soldiers who have enlisted in the regular or volunteer army of the United States and been honorably discharged do not require any certificate of declaration.

All other persons must procure a certificate of declaration of their full papers or certificate of naturalization, and no length of time or residence will obviate the necessity of procuring the first papers.

First papers may be obtained at any time by an alien of the age of twenty-one years or upward, and no testimony other than that of the applicant is required.

To obtain full papers the applicant must have resided at least two years in the United States after receiving his first papers, and the whole term of his residence in the United States must have been not less than five years, and one in the state where the first application was made.

Upon making application for full papers, the applicant must bring into court his first papers, and have with him a witness who has been acquainted with him five years, who can testify his good character, and that he is attached to the principles of the Constitution of the United States, and well disposed to the good order and happiness of the same.

If first papers have been lost, copies may be obtained by writing to the clerk of the court from which they were issued.

When a father receives his full papers, his children who are under the age of twenty-one years and whose residence is then in the United States, are considered citizens.

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ARTICLE IX.
The arbitrators shall keep an accurate
record of their proceedings, and may ap-
point and employ the necessary officers to
assist them.
ARTICLE X.
In case the tribunal finds that Great
Britain has failed to fulfill any duty or
duties as aforesaid, and does not award a
sum in gross, the high contracting parties
agree that a board of assessors shall be ap-
pointed to ascertain and determine what
claims are valid, and what amount or
amounts shall be paid by Great Britain to
the United States on account of the liabil-
ity arising from such failure, as to each
claim, according to the extent of such liabil-
ity as decided by the arbitrators.
The board of assessors shall be consti-
tuted as follows: One member thereof
shall be appointed by the President of the
United States, one member thereof shall be
named by her Britannic Majesty, and one
member thereof shall be named by the
representative of Washington of his Ma-
jesty the King of Italy, and in case of a
vacancy happening from any cause, it
shall be filled in the same manner in which
the original appointment was made.
As soon as possible after such nomi-
nation the members of the board shall meet
in Washington, with power to hold their
sittings there, or in New York, or in
Boston. The members thereof shall severally
subscribe a solemn declaration that they
will impartially and conscientiously perform
their duties, to the best of their ability,
and according to justice and equity, and
all matters submitted to them, and shall
forthwith proceed, under such rules and
regulations as they may determine, to the
investigation of the claims which shall be
presented to them by the government of the
United States, and shall examine and
decide upon them in each order and man-
ner, and in such manner as they may think
proper, and shall furnish to the govern-
ment of the United States, and to Great
Britain, respectively, a report of the
result of their proceedings, and of the
amount of claims decided by them, and
of the date of such report; if further
claims remain undecided, they shall
make a further report at or before the ex-
piration of one year from the date of their
first meeting; and in case any claims re-
main undecided at that time, they shall
make a final report within a further
period of six months.
The report or reports shall be made in
duplicate, and one copy thereof shall be
delivered to the secretary of state of the
United States, and one copy thereof to the
representative of her Britannic Majesty at
Washington.
All sums of money which may be award-
ed under this article shall be payable at
Washington, in coin, within twelve months
after the delivery of each report.
The board of assessors may employ such
clerks as they shall think necessary.
The expenses of the board of assessors
shall be borne equally by the two govern-
ments, and paid from time to time, as
and by the order of the board, on the pre-
sentation of accounts certified by the board.
The remuneration of the assessors shall also be
paid by the two governments in equal
proportions in a similar manner.

ARTICLE XI.
The high contracting parties agree to
consider the result of the proceedings of
the tribunal arbitral and of the board
of assessors, should such board be appointed,
as a full, perfect, and final settlement of
all the claims hereinbefore referred to;
and further agree that every such claim,
whether the same may or may not have
been presented to the notice of, made, pre-
sented or laid before the tribunal or board,
shall, from and after the conclusion of the
proceedings of the tribunal or board, be
considered and treated as finally settled,
barred, and therefor inadmissible.
ARTICLE XII.
The high contracting parties agree that
all claims on the part of corporations, com-
panies, or private individuals, citizens of
the United States, upon the government of
Great Britain, and all claims on the part of
individuals, subjects of her Britannic Ma-
jesty, upon the government of the United
States, arising out of acts committed
against the persons or property of subjects
of her Britannic Majesty arising from the
time specified in Article XIV. of this treat-
y, shall be referred to three commissioners
to be appointed in the following man-
ner: It is to say: One commissioner
shall be named by the President of the
United States, one by her Britannic Ma-
jesty, and by the President of the United
States and her Britannic Majesty conjointly;
and in case the third commissioner
shall not have been so named within a
period of three months from the date of
the exchange of the ratifications of this
treaty, then the third commissioner shall
be named by the Representative of Wash-
ington of his Majesty the King of Spain,
in the absence of the Representative of
any commissioner, or in the event of
any commissioner omitting or ceasing to
act, the vacancy shall be filled in the
manner hereinbefore provided; for making
the original appointment the period of
three months in case of such substitution
being calculated from the date of the hap-
pening of the vacancy.

ARTICLE XIII.
The President of the United States and
the German Emperor, Respecting Decem-
ber 11, 1871; Each from April 29, 1872;
Proclaimed June 1, 1872.
ARTICLE XIV.
Whereas a convention between the United
States of America and the German Em-
pire, relative to the rights and immunities
of consular agents, and duties of Consuls,
and of the protection of trade mark, was
signed at Berlin on the 11th day of December,
in the year of our Lord one thousand eight
hundred and seventy-one, and the period
therein specified for their ratification has
expired; and whereas the said convention
has not been ratified by the United States,
and whereas a protocol thereto was
signed by the said plenipotentiaries on the
25th day of April last, which convention
and protocol, in the English and German
languages, are, word for word, as follow:
The President of the United States of
America, and his Majesty the Emperor of
Germany, King of Prussia, in the name
of the German Empire, led by the wish to
facilitate the relations of commerce, and
justice of the respective consular agents,
have agreed upon the conclusion of a con-
sular convention, and for that purpose
have appointed their plenipotentiaries, to

ARTICLE XV.
Consuls-general, consuls, vice-consuls,
and consular agents shall have the right to
apply to the authorities of the respective
countries, whether federal or local, judicial
or executive, within the extent of their
consular district, for the execution of any in-
fraction of the treaties and conventions ex-
isting between the two countries, or of
international law; to ask information of
said authorities, and to address said au-
thorities in the absence of the consular
agents of their country, and especially
in case of the absence of the latter;
in which cases such consuls, etc., shall be
presumed to be their legal representatives.
If, in case of the absence of the consular
agents of the country, the consular agents
of the other country are present, they shall
in the absence of a diplomatic agent of
their country, may apply directly to the
government of the country where they re-
side.
ARTICLE XVI.
Consuls-general, consuls, vice-consuls,
or consular agents of the two countries, or
their plenipotentiaries, shall have the right,
conformably to the laws and regulations
of their country—
1. To take at the office, or on board of
vessels of their own nation, the deposits
of the papers and documents of persons em-
ployed on board of them, or any other
citizens of their own country.
2. To receive and verify unilateral acts,
wills, and bequests of their countrymen,
and to receive and verify unilateral acts,
wills, and bequests of their countrymen,
and to also all contracts between the latter,
provided they relate to property situated
in business, to be transacted in the ter-
ritory of the nation to which the said con-
sular officers are appointed.
All such acts of appointment and other in-
struments, and also copies and transla-
tions thereof, when duly authenticated by
such consular general, consular, vice-con-
sular agent, or consular official, shall be
received by judicial authorities and in courts
of justice, or by the authorities of the
United States, as the case may be, and
shall have the same force and effect as if
drawn up or authenticated by competent
public officers of one or the other of the
two countries.

ARTICLE XVII.
Consuls-general and consuls may, with
the approbation of their respective govern-
ments, appoint vice-consuls and consular
agents in the absence of the consular
agents of their country, and such officers
shall be citizens of the country of the
United States, or of any other country. They
shall be furnished with commission by the
consular agent of the country where they
order their duty to be done, or by the
government of the country which he repre-
sents. They shall enjoy the privileges
stipulated for consular officers in this con-
vention, in so far as they do not conflict
with Article III.
ARTICLE XVIII.
Consuls-general, consuls, vice-consuls,
and consular agents shall have the right to
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or executive, within the extent of their
consular district, for the execution of any in-
fraction of the treaties and conventions ex-
isting between the two countries, or of
international law; to ask information of
said authorities, and to address said au-
thorities in the absence of the consular
agents of their country, and especially
