Joint Discubilon between Nor-ton and Manesch.

Late on last Saturday afternoon it became known that Hon. John Hancock, demgreeley candidate for Congress for this district, had arrived in this city. It was understood that he was to address a meeting of the sore-heads and straits at Piremen's Hall. As preparations had been made for a mass meeting of Republicans on the Alame Plana to be addressed by Hon. A. B. Norton, a friend of Judge Forton deemed it a proper occasion to procure an arrangement whereby the Democracy might have an opportunity to hear a little sound Republican doctrine. After some little trouble and skirmishing, a fair arrangement was made, and a joint discus

Judge Norton opened the ball with an able and dignified speech of one hour's length. The assemb lage was one of the largest ever witnessed in San Antonio. Many were there who never witnessed a poli-tical meeting. The effect of Judge Norton's speech was visable. It was calm, persussive and eloquent. The large multitude were put into a thinking humor, and at the close the most of the audience were disposed to say, he is right. It is, of course, impossible to afford space in our columns, for, anything like a report of his speeds. We shall not even attempt to give the line of ar-

gument pursued, Judge Hancock replied for an hour and a half like an infuriated Jersey bull. He informed the color ed people that they had not intelli-

wish them: that if he were by any shance to be elected by their votes he would refuse to take a seat in Congress. He said moreover that this, of course, gratified the "niggars," and they are supposed to have immediately resolved to vote for Hancock and Greeley to a man.

It was the most overwhelming appeal for the colored votes we ever heard, and settled the question in this county. If there be a single one of them who will now vote for the dem-greeley ticket we would like to know his name. In the main, Hancock's speech was the same he made here a year ago, with a little more of the gall of bitterness and oil of vitriol thrown in. The burden of his attack was the State administration. He accused it of having committed almost every crime in the calender, and among others of having robbed the people of over \$6,000,000. If one tithe of wrongs charged by him were true there would have long ago been a revolution in this State. The very vio lence of the charges rendered them harmless, and disgusted many men who had previously been disposed

for an equal amount of abuse. He charged that bundreds of millions were stolen annually by the officeholders under Grant. However after our teacher had turned from her vacation, we learned hat the Principal had been reinstated nd many thought that to have been the hief result of the school convention at istin.) The member of the board here nd the school patrons having settled erything to their minds in relation to present year, in came the Principal and unless Mrs. H. would take his brothe istant she would not have the school had taken so much pride in building

any assistant. 
