A BELLIGERENT HERD of horses from Callahan County turned a busy highway into a race track last Thursday afternoon in Brownwood.

The horses, belonging to members of Callahan County Sheriff's Posse, were being unloaded in Riverside Park at Brownwood in preparation for the rodeo parade held there Thursday afternoon.

But the seven animals were "spooked" during the process, and took off down the highway at full speed. Falling into quick pursuit was the pickup truck from which they bolted, and a Brownwood police car.

The chase lasted for more than a mile down the busy four-lane highway -- with considerable scattering of motorists along the way. Finally the seven horses were cornered on the parking lot of a drive-in restaurant in north Brownwood.

Said Brownwood Police Chief W. B. Donahoo -- who happened to be in the police car which gave chase -- "My main concern was that one of those horses running full speed would hit a car."

The same thought probably occurred to the horses.

Although one of the horses slipped on the pavement during the race, all were calm enough to participate in the parade opening the Brown County rodeo.

WE COULDN'T HELP overhearing the other afternoon when a couple of four-year-olds in our neighborhood got involved in a rather loud disagreement.

Finally, one climaxed the argument with the traditional "I'm gonna tell my mother." And she flounced away to do just that.

About 60 seconds later she returned to the battleground and, just before settling herself to resume playing, declared in a voice full of righteous revenge, "I told!"

## New Social Security Law to Add \$45,810 in Extra Benefit Checks

First noticeable effect in Callahan County of the 1965 amendments to the Social Security Act, signed into law on July 30 by President Johnson, will be the receipt of some \$45,810 in extra benefit checks, due about the middle of September, according to R. R. Tuley Jr., District Manager of Social Security in Abilene.

Checks arriving October 3 will be in the new amounts, totalling some \$90,157 for Callahan County.

"That sum represents the 7 percent increase in benefits for the months of January-August," he added, "and will go to some 1,522 residents of Callahan County who are now receiving monthly social security checks

by reason of age, disability, or the death of a parent or spouse."

Present beneficiaries will get that increase automatically, and need not write or contact their social security office.

The Health Insurance Benefits (Hospitalization and Medical) will go into effect in July of 1966, and will affect some 1396 residents of this county who are past age 65. They, too, need take no immediate action; in fact Tuley hopes they'll wait a few weeks so that the claims of students may be taken.

## Rev. Littleton Services Held

Funeral for the Rev. John Henry Littleton, 76, a former Callahan County pastor, was at 4 p. m. Monday in First Baptist Church of Eastland, with burial in Eastland Cemetery.

Rev. Littleton, who had been connected with Lueders Baptist Campground for more than 25 years prior to his retirement, served as pastor of church in Clyde and Cross Plains during the early 1920s. He was born May 26, 1891 in Eastland County.

Surviving in addition to his wife are two sisters, Mrs. Van Garrett of Dublin and Mrs. W. A. Stephenson of Abilene; a brother, Carney of Corpus Christi; a grandchild and three great-grandchildren. A son preceded him in death.

### Beat Bangs

Baird won the right to enter the state tournament with convincing twin wins over Bangs last weekend. The Bears took the

Thursday night game, 8-2, then came back for a 9-3 decision on Friday night to end the series at two games.

The state tournament-bound Baird senior teenage baseball team will host Stamford for a practice game Saturday night. The game will begin at 8 p. m. at the Baird field.

A third game, had it been necessary, would have been played Saturday night.

Richard Windham went the route for Baird in the Thursday tilt, fanning 14 and walking only two. He was touched for two hits, both doubles. Clinton White was the loser, giving up seven hits and striking out only two.

### Harris Homers

Baird tallied one run in the first inning after Richie Crow walked, then iced the game away with six big runs in the second. The six runs came on only two hits, but one was a grand-slam homer by shortstop Wally Harris. Four walks in that inning also helped the Baird cause considerably.

Crow scored the final Baird

run in the fourth after he had doubled to open the inning.

Bangs got its two runs in the seventh on a walk and a double by Travis Halford, aided by two Baird errors.

Tim Warren and Danny Blanks, both pickup players for Baird, combined in the Friday night game, with Warren getting credit for the win during his six-inning stint. Warren fanned 13 and Blanks two, with each giving up only one hit.

Grady Ripley was the loser, yielding 10 hits and walking four.

### Quick Start

Baird scored three times in the first frame with the help of only one hit, getting an assist from two walks and an error, then added a single tally in the fifth.

The hosts then iced the game away in the seventh with an outburst good for five runs, coming on five hits and two walks.

Bangs' rally came in the seventh inning also as the team parlayed a walk, a hit batsman, a single and a rash of Baird errors into three runs. But the effort came too late.

## Three Die In Callahan Crash

Three persons were killed and another seriously injured in a two-car collision near Putnam on Highway 80 late Tuesday.

Terry Scarborough of Abilene remained in serious condition Thursday at Graham Hospital in Cisco, from head and other injuries he suffered in the head-on crash.

Killed were Mr. and Mrs. Donald Lee Coleman and their eight-year-old son of Odessa. The Coleman's two small daughters were not seriously hurt.

Scarborough, who operates a landscaping firm in Abilene, was en route home from a job in Eastland. The Coleman family was on a vacation trip to Hot Springs, Ark.

The accident was just inside the Callahan County line, near an overpass construction job.

More than 300 veterans of World War I and their families are expected in Baird Aug. 12 for the seventh annual reunion sponsored by Barrack 1573 and its auxiliary.

The group will begin gathering about noon Thursday at the American Legion building in Baird. Picnic baskets, brought by those attending, will be spread for the evening meal.

Planned for the afternoon are informal games and group singing. Supper will begin about 6 p. m.

Three prizes will be awarded during the program. They will go to the veteran coming the greatest distance to attend, the oldest WW I veteran present, and the veteran with the largest number of members of his family present.

The reunion is open to all World War I veterans or widows and their families, whether they are member of the WW I organization or not.

Paul Shanks is general chairman of arrangements for the program, assisted by James Asbury.

The reunion was started in

1959 on the Sharks farm near Clyde, and was originally designed only for veterans of World War I from Callahan County. But word about the meeting spread quickly, and others asked to be allowed to attend.

The reunion soon outgrew its original site and was moved to the Legion building in Baird to provide additional facilities. And each year's meeting seems to draw more veterans and their families than the previous ones.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Section 51, Article III, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III, of the Constitution.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches  
Sul Ross State College at Alpine

Angelo State College at San Angelo.  
"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.  
"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institution to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

"(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

semester of the tenth year. All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of this Section; provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment, but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as allocated to any such institution.  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:  
"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

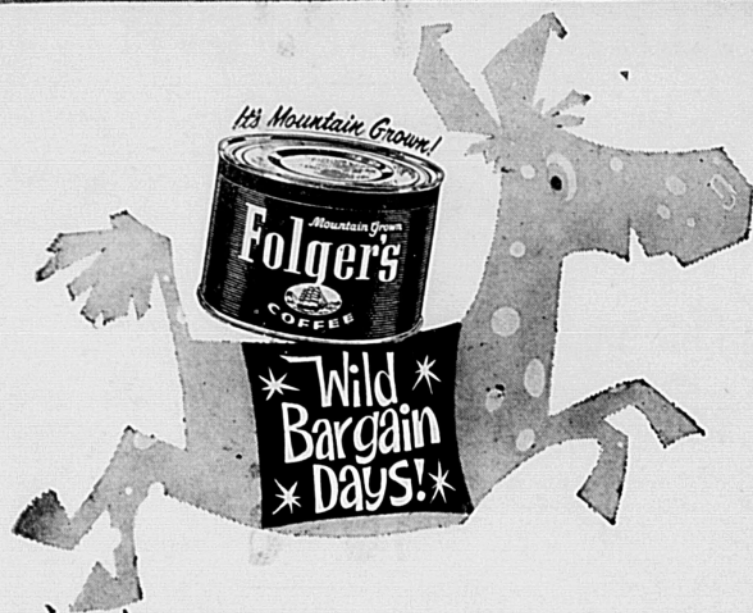
