MISSOURI.—We have good hopes of this State, though it is the home of Grant Democrats. The first there are rumors of the rebelling up of lucrative offices by the Americans and Germans, who have lost their only the inferior salaries in the apportionment. THREE remains not the shadow of a doubt that the fiat of the people next month will place U. S. Grant; for another term, in the honorable position which he now so ably fills. The indications pointing that way are increasing. Pennsylvania and Ohio have spoken; and even Delaware, which has been for twenty years a Democratic State, has seen its majority in the quite recent State election divide down to 82.

In 1868 Delaware gave Seymour 3357 majority. In 1872 it gave McClellan 612. In 1860—with four candidates in the field, it gave a majority of 333 votes to Breckinridge over Lincoln.

These figures give evidence of a great change in the political character and convictions of its people. They are beginning to realize that the administration against which they voted has deserted the cause of the country. And we may, if we don't count Delaware as won to Grant, put it down among the doubtful States.

We call the attention of our readers to the table that follows, which we have drawn up with care and which, leaving out all doubtful States, gives to the Republicans more electors than are necessary to carry the day in the approaching contest. There are 308 electors in all, 184 are necessary for a choice. The States in which the recent elections have revealed the superior strength of the Republican party, are:

Total 37 States 366 Electors. Our reason for placing Indiana, New York and Missouri among the doubtful, though we have well-based expectations that they will vote for Grant, is that we want to give our opponents the best possible show.

New York has been so terribly maligned by the Democratic Ring; such a strong public sentiment has been aroused there against Tweed, Sweeney, Connolly, Hall & Co.; and there is so much wrangling among the former leaders of the party and the present ones; that there is an excellent prospect ahead, which the recent election news will have a tendency to brighten.

Missouri is almost secure to us by the strong dissatisfaction of the Irish element which is there about as strong as the American and German combined.

Indiana, from recent appearances, so nicely balanced, will, very probably, under the stimulus which the example of Pennsylvania and Ohio must give it, declare for Grant. But since there remains the shadow of a doubt we prefer to leave it in the list of doubtful States, and not fall into the too common error of claiming too much.

Obituary Notices.
WILLIAM H. SEWARD, that eminent Statesman who so ably seconded Mr. Lincoln during his administration, died at his residence on the 10th inst. in the seventy-third year of his age.

Auburn, where he had long resided, and where he had hosts of friends and admirers; and in his death we lose one of the clearest, broadest and most cultivated minds in the country.

Mr. James Parton, better known by his pen name—Fanny Fern—is no more. She was a prolific writer of considerable merits in the order of unobjectionable light literature, and will be regretted by hosts of friends.

FRANCIS LEBER L. L. D., Professor of Constitutional History and Political Science in the Columbia Law School, and a very distinguished writer on civil law, died at 2nd inst. He was a native of Berlin, and was in his 73rd year.

The public debt has been reduced over \$247,000,000 during President Grant's administration; and in the meantime the taxation of the country has been reduced more than \$20,000,000 annually. Exclusive of the expenditures growing out of the war, the expense of the Government last year was \$73,564,116, against \$83,025,708 in 1869. The population was 31,000,000 against 26,000,000 now, giving \$1.50 per capita in 1869, against \$1.76 last year. The cost of collecting Custom-house duties in 1869 was \$5,350,000, against \$5,111,000 at the present time. These important facts are to be set down to the credit of General Grant's administration.—St. Louis Globe.

What is to come.
The re-election of President Grant is now conceded by the best informed politicians. This is something for the opponents of Republicanism to ponder over.

The most immediate result of the recent victories will be that our opponents will be unable to present a line of battle to the over-advancing, ever-victorious Grant Army of Republicanism. A change of base and a new plan for the campaign must now be adopted by the enemy if they wish to keep up the semblance of a contest. It will be difficult for the Democracy to keep their men in line. There will be much straggling and the most reliable portion of the Democracy will seek safety in the Republican camp, where they will be received with open arms.

The Democratic party has no claim on the young men of the South. No party has the right to expect political dishonesty in its adherents. If the Democracy has adopted the former views of Mr. Greeley, it has ceased to exist as a party. It has surrendered unconditionally. If the Democracy has not adopted the views of Mr. Greeley, then it is founded on treachery and mental reservation. In either case it has forfeited its right to demand the allegiance of men of principle. This will be the decision of hundreds of thousands of its conscientious adherents, and they will refuse to affiliate any longer with a party whose only hope of success is to be found in the duplicity of the refuse of Republicanism.

Reinforced by the men of principle who have until now adhered to the Democracy the Party of Progress will secure to every man of the South the enjoyment of those natural rights which are the glorious heritage of the American citizen.

Under the auspices of the Republican party a New South will spring up like a rose in the desert, and the advocates of ignorance and oppression will be silenced forever.

This at least is what we read in the figures of the recent State elections.

Correspondent San Antonio Express.

SPAN MARCOS, Aug. 9, 1872.
EDITOR EXPRESS:
Your correspondent arrived here about an hour since, and having satisfied the inner man, proceeds, as in duty bound, to tell you a few lines. Affairs are far from lively here, and the commercial horizon is somewhat clouded; but the remarkably hopeful temperament of the people enables them to bear up against adversities and to endure what cannot be helped. It is expected that as soon as the crop season gathered in, trade will improve again.

Political opinion throughout this section is assuming a curious aspect; almost every other man you chance to meet informs you he does not intend to vote at all; a few say they will vote for Greeley and some for Grant, as the least of two evils, while, by far, the majority announce their intention of voting for Grant in preference to the paragon of inconsistency, the champion wood chopper; we are bound, however, in truth, to own that there is very little enthusiasm for either candidate.

The weather is splendid and the planters feel sure of having a good crop. There is much talk of the projected railroad in this part of the country, every one expects to be benefited by it and all wish for its speedy advent. If one may judge from the number of buildings going up in all parts of this town, San Marcos is destined to be a city of some importance. The Court-house is a very pretty building, whilst the Coronal Institute, of which Mr. Balvin is principal, is an ornament to the neighborhood.

We have not yet determined on our future movements, we shall strike either for Seguin, Lockhart or San Antonio tomorrow morning—we shall not be able to determine till we have examined the contents of our exchange.

SPAIN.
THE MONASTERY OF ESCORIAL VELOCATED BY LIGHTNING AND BURSTING.—THE ROYAL PALACE IN FLAMES.

MADRID, Oct. 8.—A dispatch from the town of Escorial, twenty-four miles northwest of this city, announces that the celebrated monastery of the Escorial was struck by lightning this evening. The building was quickly on fire, and so rapid was the progress of the devouring element, that the dome and tower of the magnificent edifice have already fallen.

The Royal palace with its splendid library of books and paintings and rare and costly manuscripts, is now in flames, and at the date of this there is little prospect of saving from destruction the priceless treasures.

As well as the summer residences of the Spanish King. A brigade of engineers, fully equipped with material for use in such emergencies, had left for the Escorial.

MEXICO.
A FIGHT AT MAZATLAN—GEN FLORES CAPTURED.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—The steamer Montana has arrived here from Mazatlan with news from Mazatlan to September 29. On the 13th ultimo 1,500 pronunciamentos demanded the surrender of Mazatlan. Gen. Flores refused, and resolved to defend the post. He stationed 850 mounted men and two pieces of artillery three hundred yards in advance. The remainder of the garrison occupied the powder magazine and barracks.

At 11 o'clock the pronunciamentos attacked and drove the defenders in all directions. Gen. Flores jumped off his horse and ran towards the sea, but no boat being at hand he was captured. A colonel and a number of citizens were also captured. But few of the Government troops and none of the pronunciamentos were killed. Flores sat the custom house under a strong guard, and together with the colonel will be tried by court-martial for shooting nine wretches on the 10th of August last.

The Governor-elect of Sinaloa was taken prisoner from the house of the United States Consul Sison, where he was hid. Many acts of brutality had been committed by the victors since their entry. The whole State of Sinaloa is a wreck. Mazatlan and the most important ports are closed and the goods packed away. Less than a dozen mercantile houses have within one year lost over half a million dollars, which was forced from them under the name of loans.

The mines have all stopped working, except a few which were taken possession of by looters. A private letter from Zacatecas states that 2,000 Government troops are moving on Durango; that Picocho Vega, with 400 men, is advancing on Sonora, and that Porfirio Diaz and Generals Marquez, Palacios and others are at Chihuahua.
