THE STEAMSHIP AMERICA.
Recovery of a Portion of the Treasure from the Vessel.

LONDON, Saturday, Oct. 5.
A dispatch from Yokohama, dated Sept. 25, announces that two-thirds of the treasure lost by the burning of the steamship America, at that port, has been recovered.

THE TREATY OF WASHINGTON.
Time of Payment of the Amount of the Award—Decision in the San Juan Question soon to be Delivered.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.
It is anticipated in official circles that the award made by the Geneva Tribunal will be paid before the expiration of 12 months from the time of its announcement, this being the treaty limit. The money will be paid by the Department of State, and as there is no law concerning the disposal of it, legislation by Congress becomes necessary for purpose.

FOREIGN NEWS.
FRANCE.
Paris, Saturday, Oct. 5.
The journals in this city have opened subscriptions for the relief of the Afghans who have left their homes and retain their French citizenship.

LONDON, Saturday, Oct. 5.
The Paris correspondent of The London Times telegraphs that the Russian Ambassador in that city has received a note from Tatischev, the Secretary of the Emperor's Privy Council, withdrawing the congratulations which the Emperor had tendered to Mr. Thiers, and expressing the dissatisfaction of Russia at the aggressive attitude of the Radical party of France.

GREAT BRITAIN.
Flight of a Criminal to America—A Cabinet meeting.

LONDON, Saturday, Oct. 5.
One Collins, absconding with \$20,000 of stolen money, took passage on the steamer which left Southampton for Baltimore, on Monday last. The police authorities have been requested to arrest the culprit on his arrival at Baltimore. Mr. Gladstone has called for a meeting of the Cabinet, on Wednesday next, to transact important business, the nature of which is not reported.

SPAIN.
Denial of the Rumor Relating to Alleged Claims Against the United States.

MADRID, Saturday, Oct. 5.
The report which has been current in this city for some time, that the Spanish Government has resolved to submit to a council of the European Powers its claims against the United States for damages sustained by the burning of the steamer Cuba, is pronounced untrue.

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Telegraphic Notes.
Late advices from Bombay report that the cholera epidemic is disappearing.

The Government has taken no recent action under the Ku Klux law, no complaints which would have authorized it having been received.

A large number of miners have returned to San Francisco from the Arizona diamond fields, their expedition being unsuccessful. They denounce the diamond excitement as a fraud.

Advices from Auckland state that the Vogel Ministry had been defeated by a vote of want of confidence, the resolution being carried by the Opposition, after a protracted debate, by a majority of two.

The Cincinnati Exposition closed Saturday, the receipts having amounted to \$100,000. It is proposed to raise \$500,000 as a guarantee fund for the Exposition of 1873, for which \$125,000 has already been subscribed.

Acting Secretary Richardson has directed the Assistant Treasurer at New York to buy \$5,000,000 of bonds and sell \$2,000,000 of gold today, subject to the usual conditions of the monthly purchases of bonds and sale of gold.

The whaling schooner E. H. Hatfield of Provincetown arrived at Newport, Saturday night, with 140 barrels of oil. On Sept. 16 the mate, R. F. Craig, of South Boston, and George L. Stone of Athol, Mass., were killed by a whale.

The forty-second Semi-Annual Conference of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints began yesterday at Salt Lake City. The tabernacle was crowded with members of the Church from all parts of the Territory. President Smith and Apostles Pratt and Hyde delivered sermons in which there was nothing new or striking. The Conference continues until Friday.—N. Y. Tribune, Oct. 7.

Political Notes.
The hypocrisy of this man Greeley approaches sublimity.—A. Oakley Hall.

The Greeley movement has fallen stone dead, says the Sacramento Daily Union.

California indicates 8,000 majority for Grant, and it hasn't had even one earthquake since the canvass began.

Two men and two speecheel Grant—"I shall move immediately on your works," Greeley—"I have said very little about myself."

Precious poor encouragement to the coming generation of young men to rally round the flag in times of peril—the way that General Grant, the great chief of our armies, is abused, and the way it is proposed that our three hundred thousand loyal dead shall be dishonored.

It is becoming daily more evident that in order to have peace the Northern States, always free States, must re-elect Grant in November, with emphasis, and they will do so. The disturbances already begun down South render this a necessity.

The New York Tribune said of itself in 1870: "The Cincinnati movement will be good enough to inform its readers that there is no office in the universe that would be any inducement to Horace Greeley to prolong or postpone his advocacy of protection to home industry."

Wendell Phillips says: "I have known Horace Greeley for about forty years, and in about every six months of those forty years I have been horribly disappointed in him. With regard to General Grant, although I opposed his election four years ago, I must say I have been pleasantly surprised in him."

Senator Wilson spoke in Canton, Ohio, last week, to one of those peculiarly Western audiences, numbering fully fifteen thousand people, and some authorities estimate the number present at a much higher figure. A procession four miles in length escorted him to the grounds, and altogether it was one of the finest gatherings ever witnessed in that section.
