The Institution for the Blind.

The Institution for the Blind is that one of the three public charities of Texas which show a recognition on the part of the State of the claims of that afflicted class of our population who are deprived of sight. It is not an asylum proper, nor an infirmary for the restoration of vision, still less a hospital or almshouse, but an educational and industrial home, whose central principle is to render the blind self-dependent and self-supporting. It claims to be a school, like other schools having its course of study and its system of discipline, but unlike other schools in general, it embraces a mechanical department for the training of its pupils in industrial work.

Experience has decisively shown that under proper training, the education of the blind has borne good fruit in the formation of teachers, mechanics, manufacturers, music teachers, chorists, organists, piano tuners, etc. No individuals have their early advantages to better account, and in all parts of our State can be found those who once were received as helpless, visionless and friendless children into this institution, and are at this moment well trained in their respective trades, with minds enlarged and manners softened by scholastic discipline, receiving constant employment, and supporting themselves in comfort from the proceeds of their labor.

The age of twenty-four is fixed as the limit for admission, for the reason that the training of the blind requires much time, and the docile impressibility of youth, in order to lay the solid foundation of an industrial and intellectual education. No charge is made for instruction, board or medical services, and the pupils are called upon for no outlay beyond their traveling expenses and the providing of a suitable amount of good and comfortable clothing. Every indulgence is allowed consistent with habits of order, kindness is made the rule of government, and so seldom are punishments invoked that it may be said they do not exist.

State; the census tables are consulted, and information sought of strangers and visitors; whenever a case of blindness is made known, a correspondence is at once opened. In aid therefore the Superintendent now appeals to all persons who, in the exercise of their professional duties, have become advised of the existence of cases of blindness, to send him information. Ministers of the gospel, editors, physicians and teachers are earnestly asked to extend the sphere of the usefulness of this State charity, by calling the attention of the Superintendent to any blind children who may come under their notice. Such information will receive prompt attention and will afford the means of communicating with those who are still in ignorance of the advantages, or terms, or even the existence of an institution for their benefit.

The Rockport Transcript thus cruelly impales our next Governor, Hamilton, (when Greeley is elected): "I notice that many interior presses are advocating the election of their best men, stating that their intelligence and influence will be needed in the impeachment of Davis. The measure is demanded as one of vital necessity to the State at large, as it is conceded that it will not do to have his dead weight hung around the neck of Texas in her march to empire. Hamilton will undoubtedly be put in his place. I don't know that the State will be benefited much by the change. I do not admire Hamilton's character at all, and esteem him more of a demagogue than a statesman. To see him as I have staggering about the streets in a state of beastly intoxication, haranguing motley crowds of street loafers, is not apt to impress a man very favorably regarding his habits. He is now an enthusiastic supporter of Greeley.

A BABY OF DICKENS' MODEL.—It was a peculiarity of this baby to be always cutting teeth. Whether they never came or whether they came and went again is not in evidence, but it had certainly out enough on the showing of its mother to make a handsome dental provision for the sign of the Bull and Mouth. All sorts of objects were impressed for the rubbing of its gums, notwithstanding that it always carried dangling at its waist (which was immediately under its chin) a bone ring large enough to have young men. Knife handles, umbrellas tops, the heads of walking sticks selected from the stock, the fingers of the family, nutmeg graters, crusts, the handles of doors and the cool knobs on the tops of pokers were among the commonest instruments indiscriminately applied for the baby's relief. The amount of electricity that must have been rubbed out of it in a week is not calculated. Still its mother always said, "It was coming through, and then the child would be herself, and still it never did come through, and the child continued to be somebody else.

BUSINESS.—If Grant is re-elected Cortina will be brought to justice, our Mexican troubles will be satisfactorily settled, large indemnity will be paid to our citizens who have been robbed on the Rio Grande frontier, and we shall gain a desirable acquisition of territory in Northern Mexico. We shall then be able to run two Pacific railroads through Texas besides the Texas Pacific, viz: the International and the Great Northern extension via Columbia on the Brazos. If Greeley is elected, though the case is not supposable, we should be able to accomplish nothing in any of these directions. The only thing necessary to secure all that Texas needs and desires in relation to these things is, that her electoral vote should be cast for Grant. Texas needs so much from the General Government, and would be so much benefited by the friendship of that government that she will play the fool if she opposes Grant and his administration.

In answer to a correspondent, the New York Journal of Commerce sets down the entire cost of the railroads up to the 1st of September, 1872, at \$8,100,000,000 in the United States. Very much of the original capital invested in railroads was altogether sunk, and only later creditors came into possession. How much of the present capital is represented by foreign holders it is impossible to say.

COLUMBIA, Oct. 16.—The State election was held to-day for Governor, State officers and five Congressmen. The only opposition offered by the Democrats was in the Fourth District, where the Hon. B. F. Perry, ex-Provisional Governor under Johnson's administration, was nominated for Congress, and it is thought he has been elected, being Wallace, the present Representative from that district. It is generally conceded that the regular Republican State ticket, with Moses for Governor, is elected, defeating what is known as the bolters' ticket, with Tomlinson as a candidate for Governor.

INDIAN.—We heard from Mr. Poindexter of Denton that the Indians were down in an Hickory creek seven miles from the town of Denton one day lately, and stole one hundred head of horses belonging to Crow Wright, who lives near Denton.—Deatur Guard.
