We are indebted to the courtesy of Mr. W. B. Friedlander, Post-Under at Fort Clark, for an official copy of a circular issued by the Post-Commander of that Post, Major A. P. Morrow, which copy took Mr. F. is just down from that Post, and reports everything seemingly quiet on that frontier.

Our company of the 9th Cavalry, under command of Lt. V. Adams, stationed at once to San Felipe to protect the settlers. From such information as we have been able to gain of a positive character, we conclude that many of the persons concerning the attack of La Concepcion de San Felipe, were aggressors.

In a day's issue we give a communication handed to us by the Mexican Consul, Mr. Morandi, of this city, which gives the Mexican version of the disturbances alluded to. Comments upon the matter is postponed until some information can be obtained, which we shall shortly expect from the officers of the United States Army authorized and instructed to investigate. Meanwhile, all persons upon the frontier who may be interested in knowing the contents of the circular given below will do well to take notice and act accordingly.

[CIRCULAR.] HEADQUARTERS, FORT CLARK, TEX., October 31st, 1872. It having come to the knowledge of the Commanding officer that an individual in the Republic of Mexico is contemplating certain citizens on the frontier. Notice is hereby given that the neutrality laws will be strictly enforced, and all persons who take part in any movement in violation of the neutrality laws, will be arrested and dealt with according to law. upon, they had to fight on account of being fired at from the house of the alcalde, to which they had directed themselves for the purpose of making explanations upon the object of their visit. It is ascertained that the public officer Felipe was threatened by Mexicans, who in large number appeared on the banks of the river, without stating whether on the Mexican, or Texas side, because, probably the author, feared to lie in such a barefaced manner about the scandalous event, which occurred at the Resurrection, at day break on the 27th ult., and witnessed by almost all the inhabitants of the neighboring frontier.

I congratulate myself, that the writer of such news confesses, so smoothly and plainly, that it was a band of atrociously wicked men from the other side, who have insulted our territory and trampled on our international treaties, in passing over to this side, without a permission from the proper authority; but it is my duty to re- peal, with all the force of my capacity, the imputations made upon us, Mexicans, by him, who availing himself of an anonymous script, tries to present us, before the world, as a horde of bandits.

As Chief of this District, I have all the documents, of all the investigations practiced in regard to the horrible murder, committed by the bandit M. Weber and his crew, in the persons of the honorable Maximilian Francisco Aguilera, and also of the insults offered by his unfortunate family through them it is plainly proved, that the aggressors, numbering fifteen or twenty, crossed the Bravo at 2 P. M. in the night, and without molesting any other person, they directed themselves to that of America, who then slumbered in tranquility beside his children, giving him death, after his resisting one hour the victims were killed in flames, and as the inhabitants of the neighborhood were preparing themselves to chastise the boldness of the assassins, they (the murderers) crossed into Texas, where, even to-day, they promenade in sight of all, bragging of their crime, notwithstanding the information given to the authorities of that State, by Mr. Schuchardt, consular agent of the U. S. at this place, who is thoroughly informed of the affair, and of the note which, to that effect, I sent to the Post-Commander at Fort Duncan.

Well known to this vicinity is Weber's depraved conduct, who lived at the Resurrection, some time, entering countless evils to the peaceable and laborious inhabitants; thence he was expelled to San Antonio, where he has accomplished such crimes as the authorities, who do not consent to such class of rogues. M. Weber came here from Texas, after having murdered an officer of the American army, and notwithstanding that, still he is tolerated here, a fact that truly surprises us, who know the friendly terms that to day exist between our Government and that of the U. S.

By the above it is clearly seen, that Mr. Weber and his gang, crossed over to this side with the executive object of murdering Mr. Francisco Aguilera, and of burning his properties; that it was a premeditated and treacherous act, that the authors succeeded in committing it, because the laws, of the crossing over of the rogues, did not arrive at this office until after the crime had been committed, and our territory insulted; that it is a lie, that which has been published in the "Herald" about having sent an armed force, with the intent to threaten San Felipe, also that deceased exercised the functions of authority, at the time the murder and arson were committed; and lastly that the murderers committed with them the streams and horses belonging to the victim, the family of whom today weeps the orphanage and the misery consequent upon its misfortune.
