The Post Office Department.
The Philadelphia North American,
in an article on the postal service,
says:
"The deficit, which was \$7,000,000
in 1850, and which disappeared en-
tirely during the war, reappeared in
its old proportions so soon as the
South was restored, but in 1871 had
been reduced to \$3,053,000, show-
ing that some decided progress has
been made by the Department at
the South, owing to the extension of
the railway system and the general
recovery of property. All this has
been done during Grant's adminis-
tration, for in 1868—the last year
of Johnson—the deficit was nearly
as large as in 1850. It is prob-
able that much of this deficit was
owing to the fact that the free-delivery
system by carriers had not yet
been begun to produce its natural re-
sult in increased business. To the
South it was entirely new. Much
more of the reduction, however, is
owing to the severe economy and
close management introduced under
Grant."

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San Juan Boundary.

The official dispatch from our Minister to Germany, Mr. Bancroft, fully confirms the report that Emperor William has decided the San Juan boundary question in exact accordance with the American claim.

The controversy thus brought to a close really began when the Pacific coast first attracted the attention of the two Governments, and long before we had acquired the territory ceded to us by Mexico at the close of the Mexican war. It was admitted that the United States had a strip of territory on the coast, but the exact northern boundary was in dispute. We claimed as far north as parallel 54 degrees 40 minutes. At one time the watchword of the Democracy was "44-0, or fight." By the treaty of Oregon, 1846, the forty-ninth parallel was made the boundary line. That was looked upon by both nations as a grand triumph of American diplomacy. It was supposed that the northwestern boundary question was settled, once for all. There was, however, one point left in dispute, as is proved. The treaty provided that the boundary should run on the forty-ninth parallel to the Straits of Juan de Fuca, and thence follow the main channel to the ocean. In the imperfect knowledge of the country, that was supposed to be sufficiently explicit to prevent all misunderstanding. There is evidence from the royal chart, which we shall presently mention more specifically, that the British Government at the time had no thought of disputing the American claim. About midway between Vancouver's island and the main land is the island of San Juan. Which is the main channel, the northern fork of the straits or the southern? Around this particular point the contest raged. At one time the two nations came very near going to war for the possession of that insignificant island. Its value lies almost wholly in its importance in case of war. It commands the entrance to the Gulf of Georgia, and thus the defenses of the southern portion of British Columbia and the northern portion of Washington Territory. For many years its occupancy has been joint by the two nations. After the official promulgation of the decision of the imperial arbitrator our possession will be absolute and single.

The royal chart referred to was made at about the time the treaty was ratified. Through the northern channel was a red line, drawn by a pen, and along it, in the King's own handwriting, these words: "This is the boundary." This chart was suppressed, the lines of claiming such a chart existed, or had existed, but our Government could not get hold of a copy of it. Finally, some ten years ago, our present Secretary of Legation at the Court of St. James, Mr. Morin, then Assistant Secretary, stumbled by a lucky accident upon three copies of this chart in a second-hand book store in London. The owner had no idea of their value, nor the British Government of their existence. Mr. Morin at once bought them. Had the owner only known their value, he could have made his fortune out of them. In the final settlement these charts must have played a prominent part. They were probably decisive of the controversy. England's latest King was thus compelled to accept England's latest humiliation.

The Herald admits that the effort to demoralize the colored vote by the Greycliffes has proven a failure in this part of the world. It says to its friends: "The negroes never fail to vote, rain or shine, and their vote goes solidly against you and your property." How their vote goes against "your property" it would be hard for anybody to explain—unless it is meant that the property owners will, under Republican government, have to pay a tax for the education of the poor of all races. He who is not willing under a Democratic Government to contribute from his abundance for such a purpose, does not understand the first requisite of a free government. With the masses kept in ignorance his property will become valueless, and, in time, his life a burden for want of security.

The State Gazette of the 26th says: "Upon the subject of going to prison, we learn that Col. Robertson, of Bell county, is no longer a candidate for the Senate against General Sherman, believing with us in the Navy."

FOUR CLARK, OAK 29th, 1872. It will come out; you can't keep the spirit down.—The leaders of the Republican party have considered it policy not to work things publicly here. The opposition was too strong; but we have identified and slowly undermined the Democratic building.—The colored people, however, could keep quiet no longer; they had to give vent to their feelings. Without any formal notice or announcement they met in force last night at the establishment of Mr. Fonton. Harris, James Brown Esq. was unanimously elected Chairman.

Every body had something to say. One white man took the stand and told the colored citizens that he was a northern man, that he was a friend of the colored people, that Greeley also was their friend, etc. etc. The assembly quietly let him and his harangues, when Mr. John Holt, colored, arose to explain his ideas to the assembly. Holt is not a literary man, but he has practical common sense.

From the stand-point of a colored man he represented fairly the political issues of the day, and made an earnest appeal to his race to stand by their old party. You cannot, Mr. Editor, induce the colored man to break their allegiance with the Republican party; you cannot make them believe that those men are their friends who have always abused them, had no use for the "damned nigger" who fought to keep him in bondage, and who opposed equal rights to the last moment, and who now, because the colored men have a vote, come to them with sweet words and ask them for their support. The colored man will stand by the party that stood by them when they were not able to stand by themselves, the party which sacrificed a half million lives and noble boys to free them, the party which gave them the rights to which all men are entitled.

Three cheers for Grant, Wilson, and Greeley. Respectfully, "LISTENING TO MR. GREELEY."

A New-English System.

The new policy, if rightly appreciated, proposes to deal with the Indians as men, and with all the passions and passions, as well as virtues, that are native to humanity. He will be dealt with on the same principle as a man in a civilized community, giving punishment for his misdeeds, and protection for his industries. The policy of expelling is to be abandoned, and the tribal relation is to be broken up so far as concerns the possession of lands and property, each family having its own tract of land, being defined in a written contract from its own labor.

The Indian is to be dealt with as a man, and in person and property, but if he must take his chances. No white intruder is to be tolerated on a reservation though it would not be profitable to tolerate the Indian from small settlements about its limits. The Indian will be given a good education, and the military will be on every reservation, but in subordination to the civil power.

"RECONCILIATION" is making rapid progress in New York. A Greeley Club in the Sixth Ward, and one in the Eighth, have declared for Grant and Wilson. In the Seventeenth Ward one Greeley Club has dissolved, and another consolidated with the Grant Club. The general Greeley headquarters at the Glenham, St. Nicholas and Springer Hotels are to be consolidated, to save expense, and the organization is only kept up in order to give the confusion Democracy a respectable funeral in November.

NATIONAL POLITICS AT YALE COLLEGE.—A vote has been taken at Yale College on the Presidential question, and the result is announced in the Yale Register. There were 578 votes cast, of which Grant received 446, Greeley 126, O'Connor 1, Douglas 1, Black 1. Of the minors, Grant had 276 and Greeley 54. The voting was conducted with care, each voter writing his name and age upon his ballot, and in counting the names were compared with the catalogue.

Assistance in Virginia. A special dispatch from Washington says the advanced guard of a large body of emigrants from France and Lorraine, who are to settle in the neighborhood of Alexandria, have reached that city and are now engaged in prospecting for favorable sites wherein to settle. They desire four thousand acres in a body. The colony numbers two hundred families, skilled in arts, manufactures and farming, and proposes to form a joint stock company, to locate a town, lay out farms, etc. If they can be settled in Virginia on good terms they say they can induce their colony to two thousand families.
