...the...debated...masses who are always ready to escape honest toil by following any disappointed adventurer who promises them a share of the spoils. Perhaps the outside world would have no just right to interfere so long as their own rights were not affected; but when, as along our frontier, these continued harrows extend their baneful influences into our own borders, the question of the right and duty of active interference becomes a serious one. Certainly the right and duty to protect our own citizens will not be questioned; and if in order to accomplish this end, it shall appear necessary to force upon the frontier States of Mexico peace, order and good government, why is not that also a duty? We are not advocates of filibustering, but we think our government might conclude such a treaty with Mexico as would surrender the protection of the people and property of the Mexican frontier States into the hands of the United States, giving equal privileges to citizens of both countries. These States would soon become the receptacle of an immense number of immigrants; their mines would be re-opened and worked with profit; their agricultural resources would be developed; railroads would hasten towards the centers of its productive regions, and robbers, murderers, thieves and revolutionary bandits would soon find their occupations gone. Such an arrangement would be quite as advantageous to the people of Mexico as to our own. Let the wise heads then, of both countries, come together for the purpose, not of crimination and reprimand, but to endeavor to secure a peaceful adjustment of all difficulties in the manner we have but imperfectly suggested, and which do now threaten serious complications, if not war, and we shall have another triumph under the leadership of Grant, equal to that achieved by the peaceful settlement of the Alabama question. But to the notes of our friend which are as follows: The number of "Revolutionists" which broke out in Mexico from 1837 to 1841, that is, within four years, according to the following statement, was thirty-five. August 9th, 1837: Revolution at San Louis Potosi, headed by Col. Hugartey, who inaugurated it by robbing the mint of that city of thirty-one thousand dollars and private individuals of two hundred thousand dollars more. He was abetted by the so-called Gen. Montezuma. Pronouncements for God and Liberty—Modern Liberalism. August 9th, 1837: Revolution in the interior of New Mexico, by one Jose Guadalupe. The cause assigned, American influence. October 9th, 1837: Rising in Puebla, headed by one Col. Don Jose de Jesus Gonzalez, and a Sergeant by the name of Frita, it was quelled by Gov. Cordillas. The object was plunder and assassination. October 21st: Uprising in Sonora, headed by Gen. Urrutia, the murderer of Fama and his men. Pronouncements in favor of God and Liberty. October 26th: Revolution of Oajaca under the leadership of one Miguel Carrasco, a Captain who had sacked that city a year previously. This revolution was suppressed. February 22nd, 1838: Revolution in Tepic, but suppressed by Maj. Negrete. Assigned cause, God and Liberty. March 30th: Rising in Turpan. Cause, God and Liberty. April 23rd: Revolution in Yucatan by its Ex-Governor, Jose Miguel Gutierrez. May 19th: Revolution of Aguan Calcutan, by Don Santiago Gonzalez, and Pablo N. Sanchez, cause, God and Liberty. August 23rd: New Revolution of Oajaca and Monaca, headed by Lieut. Col. Gordiano Guzman and others, cause, God and Liberty. January 16th 1839: Revolution of Morelos headed by Severo Ruiz, cause, God and Liberty. May 3d: Revolution in Durango headed by Capt. Rana and others, cause, God and Liberty. May 25th: Rising in Saltillo attacked and the Conchales capitulated, the pillage of the garrison to the extent of sixty thousand dollars. Gen. Lemores led the outbreak, as not assigned. March 19th 1840: Revolution in Vera Cruz, headed by Las Casanovas. July: Revolution in Yucatan and capitulation of Campeche headed by a Sergeant named Jash. July: Revolution of Tabasco headed by Don Nicolas Maldonado. Revolution of the Indians in the State of Guanajuato. August 1841: Revolution in Guadalupe in favor of conservatism, headed by Gen. Parades. August 31st: Revolution inaugurated in the Ciudad de Mexico against President Bustamante, by the troops. September 30th: Gen. Bustamante pronounced in this capital for God and Liberty.

Shropshire Sheep.—A correspondent of the Irish Farmer's Gazette says of the Shropshire breed of sheep: "I beg to give the results of my experience. At they will rear two and sometimes three lambs better than a new Leicester one. Truly, their lambs are much harder. Truly, when fat, the mutton is worth 1 d. per lb. more than the Leicester, as there is always plenty of lean of a superior quality with the fat; and my rams out from 9 to 11 lbs. wool each. I put 90 Shropshire ewes to the ram last season, 8 of which brought me 3 lambs each, 4 brought 4 each, and one brought me 5 lambs; all live, healthy lambs, very few brought single lambs."
