A MADRID dispatch announces that the proper committee of the Spanish Cortes has agreed to make a favorable report on the resolution to abolish capital punishment for political offenses which was defeated last week in the Senate. In the same breath we are told that the sections of the Cortes have authorized the introduction of a resolution for the impeachment of Senor Sagasta and the members of his Ministry. The French Government proposes to arrest and try for treason the Imperial Ministry which began the Prussian war. It is almost impossible for any branch of the Latin race to discriminate between a blunder and a crime in political matters.

MYSTIFYING THE MAN.—While Hendricks was speaking at Quincy, Ill., on the 26th ult., a drunken fellow disturbed him by driving a team rather fast over the rocky streets, when Hendricks used the following incendiary language: "My friends, I think that man is trying to disturb this meeting; I wish some stout man would go and whip him; while him like a dog." Some forty or fifty at once started to obey the unwise request for a fight, and the only fact that they found he was a Democrat prevented their carrying it out. This from the Governor-elect of the great State of Indiana! "Let us have peace."

The United States to Emperor William.

BREITLIN, Oct. 27.—Hon. Bancroft Davis has addressed a letter of acknowledgment in behalf of the government and people of the United States, to Emperor William for his exertion in deciding the San Juan boundary arbitration case, and for communicating the judgment with such friendly promptitude to the American Ministerial representative in this city for transmission to the President and Cabinet in Washington.

Mr. Davis says—"I am charged by the President of the United States, speaking in the name and behalf of the American people, to thank Your Imperial Majesty for the great pains and attention which Your Majesty has devoted to the settlement of the San Juan boundary case by arbitration."

The letter closes with a reiteration of assurances of the existence and perpetuation of international friendship and good will between the people of America and the people of the German nation.

THE Missouri Democrat says:—We are reliably informed that the New York Free Trade League has actively interested itself in the contest in the First District, and is sending material aid to its former agent and secretary, Mr. Grosvenor, in order that it may have an active attorney on the floor of the House at Washington—and in the pay of the government, instead of having him in the lobby merely and in the pay of the League. Mr. Grosvenor has spent two winters in Washington in the employment and pay of the League; and if the managers of that concern can pension him on the Federal Treasury by the expenditure of a sum for election purposes, which would soon be paid to him in salary anyhow, they would be making a good investment. But the people of the First District will not be apt to take kindly to the idea. They prefer sending to Congress a man who will represent them and their interest, rather than a man who will be the agent and mouth-piece of an institution at war with the best interests of American labor and progress. Hence they will elect Mr. Stanard, and permit Mr. Grosvenor to go to Washington, if at all, in his former capacity of agent and lobbyist.

A Question for Grammarians.

The Hudson Register deals humorously with a question of grammar as follows: A searcher after truths writes to ask us which is grammatically correct, to say "the house is building," or "the house is being built," or "the street is paving," or "the street is being paved"? There is a wide diversity of opinion upon this subject; but we incline to favor "is being built" for the following reasons: Suppose you wish to express another kind of an idea, would you say, for instance, "Johnny is speaking," or "Johnny is being spanked"? The difference to you may seem immaterial, but it would be a matter of considerable importance to Johnny; and it is probable that, if any choice were given him, he would suddenly select the former alternative. You say again that the "missionary is eating." Certainly this expresses a very different and much pleasanter idea than the form: "The missionary is being eaten." And the sensation is very different for the missionary, missionary about it, and they all seem to think that the two things are somehow not the same, no matter what the grammarians say.

But it is to be confessed that there are occasions when the difference in the form is not so marked. You assert, we say, that "Hannah is hugging"—which, by the way, would be a very improper thing for Hannah to do; it would be positively scandalous, indeed. Precisely a similar idea is conveyed if you say, "Hannah is being hugged," because it is a peculiarity of the act that it is hardly ever one-sided; there is no selfishness about it. And it is the same with kissing. "Jane is kissing," and her mother ought to know it if she is—is just exactly as if we should say, "Jane is being kissed," and the sensation is the same, although none of the grammars, by a single inadvertence, mention the fact. It will not be necessary, however, for our correspondent to attempt to prove these last mentioned facts by practice. He must take our word for them. Unless he does so, we shall answer no more questions in syntax for him or anyone else. Our duty is to conserve the morals of the community, not to start people to playing private games of Copenhagen.

Germany claims that she will soon be independent of America as regards petroleum. The crude material has been recently discovered in Galicia in great abundance, and extensive preparations are making to fit it for market. In one single village twenty refineries are in operation. As yet all the production has been from surface boring, but when the wells are sunk to the depths of those in this country, the production, it is estimated, will be sufficient for the supply of a large part of Europe.

Mr. Greeley's newspaper professes itself certain of carrying New York because it is "a State that in 1868 gave Seymour 10,000 majority, and in 1870 gave Hoffman 33,000 majority." That is to say, because the State is a Democratic State, it may be trusted to go this year for a candidate who professes to be just "as much a Republican as ever." This indiscreet boasting is a good deal of light upon Mr. Greeley's real character, and upon the composition of his party.

A sort of insurance company was started in Austria, a year or two ago, to pay policy holders a certain sum of money when they got married. The premiums were arranged on a regularly graduated scale, according to age and the temptations likely to beset the insured. The company did a flourishing business for some time, when a matrimonial episode broke out among the directors, each of whom was heavily insured, and these all getting married at once absorbed the assets and swamped the concern.

A Washington City correspondent of the Cincinnati Gazette writes as follows: In conversation with a gentleman upon the political situation, Gen. Grant said that one good result, at least, accomplished by the defection in the party was to slough off some very disagreeable material which, until now, like barnacles, had drawn a subsistence from its life. Some of the most persistent seekers after personal favors had been, he said, the loudest shriekers for civil service reform and purification. The President said the fun and noise made by the Liberals reminded him very much of the coyotes, or prairie wolves that make night hideous with their frightful notes, giving one an idea that the country for miles is full of them. He related an incident in his own experience, which he thought a good illustration of this comparison. While riding across the prairies for the first time, in company with a gentleman who had lived in Indiana in the early history of the State, when the wolves roared at will over it, he heard for the first time this fearful note—the howling of what seemed to him to be at least a hundred of the coyotes. His companion said to him, "How many animals do you suppose there are making that noise?" The President said that from the manner of asking this question he knew at once that he had greatly overestimated the number, so he said, "I thought I would keep within bounds, and answer what I supposed was much below the number, and instead of a hundred I said, perhaps twenty. In an instant there crossed the road, just in front of us, two of these animals, and my friend assured me that they had made all the noise that had so filled the air with sounds and fury."

This happy comparison is worthy to be told, and it holds good, not only regarding the noise and bluster of the hour, but its peculiar character and habits in other respects render it very apt and appropriate. This is one of the most cowardly and ignominious animals in existence. They burrow in holes in the earth, stealthily crawling out of them if there is one in sight, to set up their most unearthly notes, but never attacking man or beast, unless their own array of numbers is formidable rendering their victims an easy prey.

THE Houston Daily News comes to us enlarged, and is now the largest daily in the State. The matter it contains is quite equal to its size, and we think it is now the best daily newspaper in the State. The Union deserves its success. Although we are not personally acquainted with any of its conductors or editors, the snap of the live newspaper speaks louder through its columns than does the long list of the wagoner's whip which disturbs our nostrils, and the second Republican newspaper, and is doing good service in the cause of good government. May its success increase, and its life be forever prolonged, say we.

A PROPHETIC RAILROAD.—The Central Railroad Company proposes to construct a branch road east from the northern part of Navarro county to Red River, on the line of Lamar or Red River county, provided the several counties interested will come down with a subsidy of a hundred thousand cash, or a little more. This route was dreamed out, so they say, and that by a man no less wide awake than Paul Beaumont, or rather, as he says, it was "suggested by the spirits," which is such the same thing. Anyhow, it is a good one, and its construction will be in the highest degree conducive to the interests of our State.—Waco Examiner.

TEXAS CATTLE DISEASE.—A Kansas farmer professes to have treated with invincible success, cattle affected with Spanish fever, according to the following recipe: When the animal loses its appetite and becomes stupid, take several gallons of tepid water, for soft green peas, and inject it from a large syringe; and in about twelve hours give him a half pint of a pint of lissed oil, to move the bowels, and they will get well. He claims that the above recipe produces a reaction, softens the parts, and restores the normal action of the system.

RAILROAD EXTENSION.—Mr. Plumb, representative of the Texas International railroad, is about to lay before Congress a plan for the construction of a line from Rio Grande down to Mexico, which, at its northern extremity, will join with the Texas International railroad, actually in construction, and so effect a direct communication from New York to Mexico.
