**CLIMATE AND MAN.**

Some Comparison Between  
Great New Great Cities and Countries  
and their Climate  
and their Climate  
Have appeared.

Dr. J. W. Draper, in his History of the American Civil War, discusses the effect of climate in producing political differences between the North and South, and allows large results to this one subtle, all-pervading and little understood influence. "The differentiation of separation of the American people, though it had its beginning in English life and in pre-colonial times, may, without much error, be considered as having been substantially produced by the climate of this continent." This is one of Dr. Draper's postulates. By climate he understands the aggregate of all the conditions, natural and artificial, in which we live—such as latitude, topographical elevation, vicinity of mountains and bodies of water, nature of the soil, ocean currents, forests. The fact that the rigorous changes of Northern climate force the Northern man to do-day what the Southern man, in his less exacting latitude, may put off until tomorrow, exercises influence in producing the more thrifty habits of the North and in shortening foresight and restricting energy in the South.

But Dr. Draper believes that the wonderful variety of climatic conditions in the United States, taken in connection with the varieties of people who find a home here, tends rather to unity than diversity. If in the conditions resulting from the difference between white and black men, the scale turned in favor of the Union, there is reason to believe that the differences of a less extreme and positive nature will be reconciled on the same principle.

We make these remarks as preparatory to the announcement that Dr. L. Cummings proposes a series of lectures in Houston upon the influence of climate and other material forces in the production of centers of intelligence and enterprise. These lectures will, we judge, be especially interesting in their dealing with our history, by pointing out the material conditions in which the rulership of our past has been nurtured. And, no doubt, an attempt will be made to point out the climate centers from which our future development is to proceed. In a communication from the lecturer, we have this interesting passage:

**VIRGINIA A CENTER OF POWER.**

"The grand old State of Virginia may well be proud of the great and powerful mind she has generated and reared, who have swayed the masses with their power, charmed thousands with their eloquence and gladdened millions with their philanthropy. But Virginia sleeps in childish ignorance of the true source of her mental greatness, which lies buried within the bosom of her mountains. The chemistry of her geology germinating subtle forces which support the highest degree of animal life, is the secret of her success."

This suggests a theme of thought and investigation which promises to be as fruitful in results as it is limitless in extent. There is a truth in the general position taken, everyone who is gifted with ordinary powers of observation and combination will readily admit.

**THE MATERIAL POWER OF TEXAS.**

In the same communication above quoted it is said "The question of the performance, completeness and harmony of her geological organization, her possibilities for expansion to many and equal with any State in the Union. Hence, the future greatness of her people may be confidently predicted. Nor is it through any fortuitous combination of circumstances that Houston stands pre-eminent as a railroad and commercial center. The city is located not far from the electro-chemical reservoir which controls the action of vital forces for a radius of many miles. These elements are not widely diffused but you, carefully as the kind itself, but with mathematical certainty, under the government of established polarities of attraction or repulsion. With a finely-adjusted instrument a gradation of degrees in density of power can be demonstrated.

CHICAGO STANDS ABOVE.

By from three to seven degrees, in electro-magnetic power, any city within a radius of several hundred miles, it has, therefore, killed or controlled nearly every city within the radius of its electro-magnetic superiority. Her people walk more rapidly, drive faster, calculate more shrewdly, think with more quickness and clearness and are generally more active and energetic men than those of its staid, plodding neighbor, St. Louis, whose life forces correspond with her lack of energy, being about eleven degrees less than in Chicago.

Leavenworth, Kansas, was for many years, from necessity, the great city of the West, until Kansas City, Mo., springing up among her hills and with giant strides has left her sister city far behind in industrial and intellectual enterprise. Leavenworth can never be great, because her life forces are weak, while Kansas City cannot help being great, as the very ground beneath the feet of her population teems with electro-magnetic forces at least seventeen degrees more powerful than similar forces are at Leavenworth.

There are hundreds of towns and cities in America which substantiate this principle. Why, for example, are the people of Houston rearing monuments which exhibit the highest grade of intellectual industry, exhibiting not only great enterprise, but remarkable intuitive conception? The Houston Ship Canal, the mammoth market house, the number and magnitude of printing establishments, the 40 miles of perfect sidewalk upon which the people soon expect to pedestrianize—these aspirations of the human mind, embodied in physical form, are the evidences of a high grade of executive genius intuitively grasping the demands and necessities of humanity in the not far distant future, when hundreds of thousands of intelligent human beings will occupy this city and vicinity. These evidences of civilization are the direct result of popular zeal, activity, industry and intelligence. But the great sustaining fountain of this magnificent structure of material and mental greatness is buried in the generative and formative bosom of Mother earth. All parts of the world are favored with these subtle, life-supporting elements; but due part has more than another."

**PHILANTHROPY.**—Portland has a treasure in the shape of a cow whose milk of human kindness is so full of the cream of philanthropy that she exports herself in the cause of morality and public decency to an extent that might put many a human being to the blush. It would seem that two dogs, having evidently read the kind permission given them by Dr. Watts of hymn-writing memory, to be left to bark and bite, took advantage of it to quarrel over a bone in the principal street of Portland. They attracted the attention of our cow, who was quietly sitting some turnip in a field into which she had penetrated without having obtained the owner's consent. Pausing for a moment to chew the cud of reflection, she looked her head, charged upon the dogs and separated them, and by making a threatening dis-

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play of her horns caused them to scatter in the double-quick in opposite directions. This is the question of color, and should it ever be brought by the Society for the Extension of Credit to Animals, as a notable example of the justice of their principles and the support given to their theories by the animals themselves. Why would it not be well to perpetuate this breed of cows for the sake of their milk? Who knows what wild and human sentiments a cow, freely partaker of, would cause to dominate in the heart of man?
