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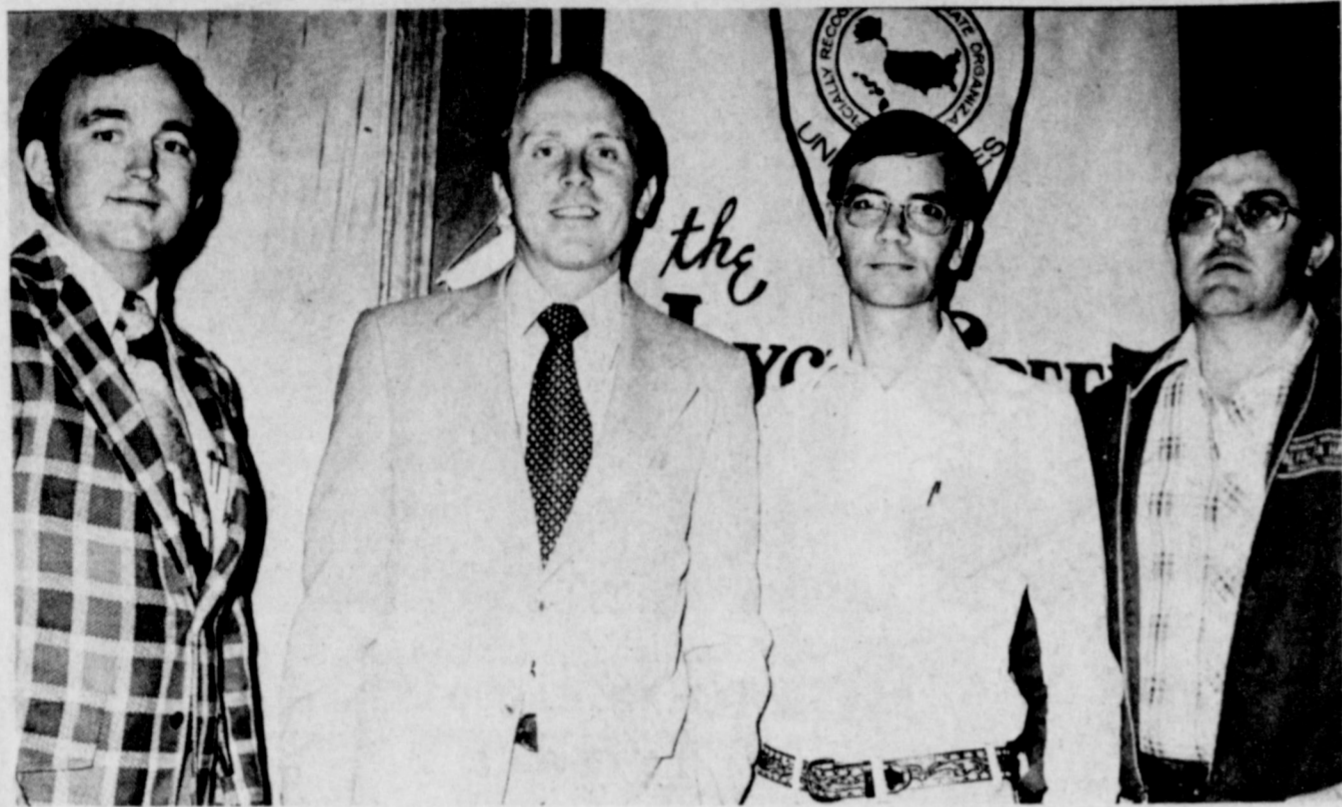

Four Mules Qualified For Regional Competition

Muleshoe's Mules went into the running events at the district track meet at Olton last Friday leading the competition due to two disqualifications of Olton competitors due to grades. Mule track coach Gary Goodin said this gave the team more motivation for the team championship. It also moved up all of the shot, discus, and long jump places giving the local team much needed points, he added.

For the Mules to have a run at the championship, the team had to qualify individuals in all events and score high with the relay teams.

Coach Goodin said, "The first

event of the day was the 120 high hurdles. Mike Northcutt and Terry Shafer both qualified for the finals after turning in their best performances of the year. The next event was the 100 yard dash.

Tammie Smith, who won the regional Class B 800 meter dash last Saturday with a new regional record, will compete at State in Austin on May 6.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Smith, and a senior at Lazbuddie High School. She is the defending state champion in the 880 yard dash.

The mile relay team, including Terri Clark, Judy Lust, Sherrie Seaton and Tammie Smith placed sixth in the finals at regional and Judy Lust was sixth in the regional high jump competition.

"We needed to qualify two more Mules, but fate was to catch up with the team. Charles Briscoe was disqualified for jumping the gun twice. This seemed to take the fire out of the team and the Mules didn't fare well with qualifiers."

He added that Terry Shafer was the only other person to qualify for the finals with his best performance in the 330 intermediate hurdles.

Local Golf Pro Has 69-68 On PGA Test

Jeff Smith, pro at the Muleshoe Country Club, played his PGA player's test at Hogan Park Golf Course in Midland on Monday.

He said the course rating is 70, so the target score was 155. He shot rounds of 69-68 for a 36 hole total of 137 and completed his PGA requirement. Smith commented that this was the first time his fiance, Cathy Chambers had watched him play in tournament golf. Not a golfer herself, she said she "thought he had a pretty good day."

In order to qualify for membership in the PGA, a golfer must meet several requirements, explained Smith. One requirement is time worked, which usually is three years. Another requirement is passing two PGA business school, pass an oral interview before the board in the section, and finally, to pass a player ability test.

To pass the player ability test, a player must shoot a score of 15 strokes above the course rating or less, for 36 holes.

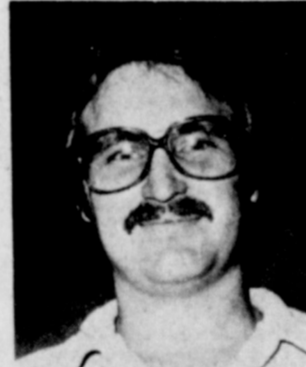

Senior Citizen Group Asks For Apartment Complex

Senator Speaks To Local Jaycees

In an effort to host all the candidates for the Congressional seat to be vacated by Congressman George Mahon, the Muleshoe Jaycees hosted another candidate during the regular Monday meeting.

Guest Monday was Texas Senator Kent Hance of Lubbock, who spoke to the Jaycees on his candidacy. He is a native of Dimmitt, and a graduate of Texas Tech University and the University of Texas Law School. Following that, he gave some of his background on qualifications, including the present time, where he gave his views on being a state senator.

He said one of the prerequisites to being an effective member of legislature is "To be there, case your vote and do not dodge controversial issues."

"I sponsored the local fund assignment change for schools, which would lower local taxes," Senator Hance also told of other legislation he had sponsored to help Texas citizens.

He said too often candidates are trying to make an issue out of something which is not an issue at all at this time. "The big issue for this area is agriculture legislation," he commented. He told of growing up on a farm and presently owning and operating a farm. "(President) Carter promised

farmers a fair shake, but has given anything but a fair shake to farmers."

The candidate suggested holding hearings within the district when bills come up for consideration concerning agriculture. He also said he thought the greatest thing the American Agriculture Movement has done has been to wake up the producer. He also predicted that producers will also be actively

Preliminary Studies For Project Begin

Monday night, Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr was mildly surprised when a good representation of local citizens appeared at a public hearing at the Muleshoe City Hall. Marr and assistant city manager, Jack Eades, are rather accustomed to no one appearing for hearings.

More than 20 interested and concerned citizens attended the meeting, with most of those present being in the "senior citizen" class.

Acting as spokesman before the hearing, which was conducted by the Muleshoe City Planning Commission, was Mrs. Buck Creamer. She spoke initially for the group, and asked that a senior citizen housing complex to be constructed in Muleshoe.

Mrs. Creamer told the planning commission that successful projects of that type had been constructed in numerous other cities, including many much smaller in population than Muleshoe.

According to the speaker, senior citizens, especially those on fixed incomes, such as Social Security, are finding themselves hard pressed to maintain their homes. She told of maintenance, repairs and yard work which many seniors citizens are no longer physically capable of handling. She also told of increased taxes and insurance, which seriously affect the minimal income from Social Security.

Mrs. Creamer asked several persons to explain some of the advantages of such complexes which have been visited by various members of the group in such locations as Quanah, Borger, Tahoka, Snyder, and

other locations throughout the South Plains.

Others, including W.E. Young, Mrs. Willie Strong, Buck Creamer, Mrs. Doc Jones, and Wayne Taylor, spoke concerning the increased need for such housing in this area.

City Manager Marr explained that although it was beyond the powers authorized by the state of Texas for a city to construct and maintain such a facility, it would be within the scope and range of the Muleshoe Housing Authority.

He explained some of the types of funds possibly available to build the type facility sought, and said he would draw up a letter from the Muleshoe City Council to present the chairman of the Housing Authority, Harmon Elliott.

Also, on a unanimous vote, the Muleshoe City Planning Commission also asked for a letter from the Housing Authority, asking them to attempt to secure such housing for Muleshoe.

Apparently, grant funds would be available to construct low-cost housing for senior citizens. However, as no request had been formally made in the past for the housing, it would be possible that a survey would have to be made to determine how many persons would be interested in living in the senior

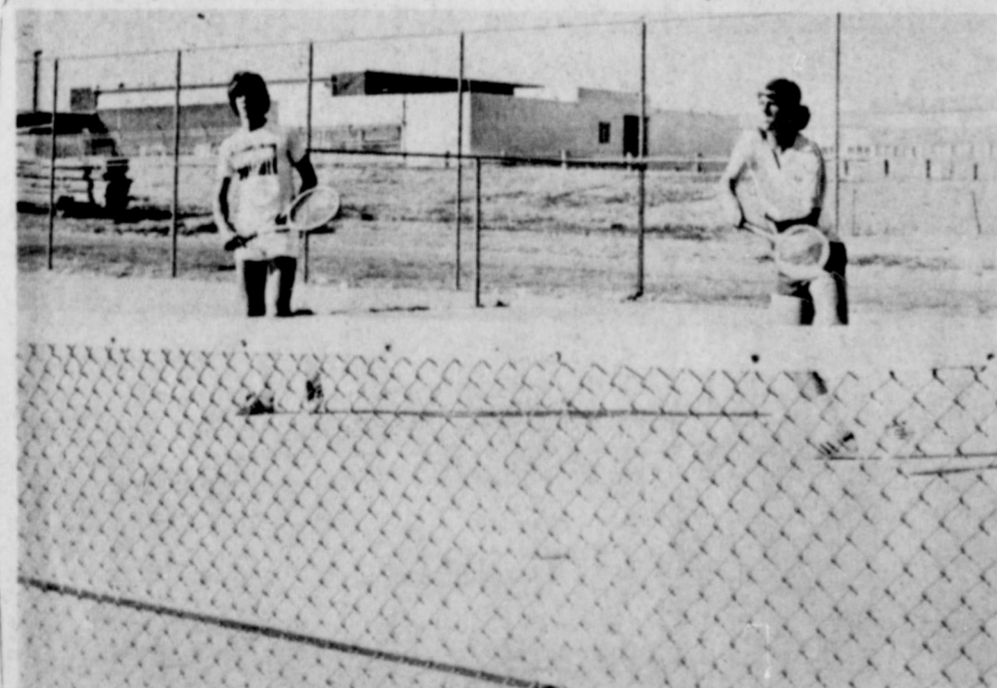

Brucellosis Vaccination Will Begin

Texas cattlemen may now have their heifer calves vaccinated with Strain-19 brucellosis vaccine free of charge, points out Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The vaccination program is voluntary and will be conducted through participating, accredited veterinarians. These veterinarians will be able to obtain the brucellosis vaccine free and will be reimbursed for their services from state and federal funds on completing a vaccination chart. Only eligible female calves will be vaccinated and will be identified by an ear tag and tattoo. Female calves of dairy breeds from two through six months of age and beef breeds two through ten months are considered eligible.

According to Tanksley, all the cattlemen has to do is call his local veterinarian and schedule a time for the vaccinations. Of course, the calves should be confined. This new vaccination program does not include vaccinating calves at livestock markets.

There are several benefits from the vaccination program, including these:

1. Properly immunized heifers will be more resistant to the organism causing brucellosis.
 2. Officially vaccinated calves should sell for higher prices if purchased for replacements.
 3. The more animals that are vaccinated, the quicker the spread of brucellosis can be controlled, thereby minimizing the threat of quarantine.
- To reimburse participating veterinarians, some \$450,000 of state and federal monies has been made available for this vaccination program for fiscal year 1978, and additional funds are expected for the fiscal year beginning Sept. 1.

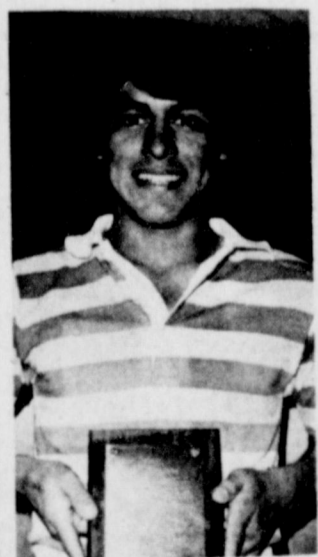

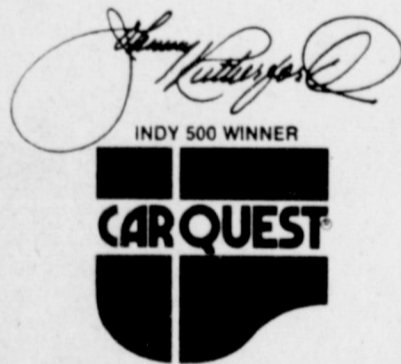
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Whats' Washin' In Washington

Brezinski's New World Order
"It was spelled out in Brezinski's book *Between Two Ages: America's Role in the Technetronic Era* (1970) and sharply refined in subsequent monographs, *Foreign Affairs* articles, and Trilateral Commission reports that...the Western peoples, since their identifiable beginnings in the feudal era, have advanced through three great stages and are now entering a fourth and culminating stage. "analyzes presidential advisor Richard Gardner in an April 1974 issue of *Foreign Affairs*, official journal of the Council on Foreign Relations.

"The first stage was that of religion...The second stage was that of nationalism...In the wake of Western nationalism has come Marxism, which, says Brezinski, 'represents a further vital and creative stage in the maturing of man's universal vision.' But progress by no means stops there. Beyond religion, nationalism, and Marxism, we now have, he tells us, his emerging technetronic ideal of rational humanism on a global scale.

"Rational Humanism as Brezinski represents it is to be the result of evolutionary transformations in the U.S. and the U.S.S.R...."

This is the old Marxist dialectic of these, antitheses, and synthesis. The U.S. and the Soviet Union are to be

synthesized in a New World Order. In *Foreign Policy* for Winter 1975-1976, Brezinski stated: "It is clear that both an institutional, as well as a political, reorganization is required."

Indeed, which is what Jimmy Carter's demand for a total "reorganization" of the U.S. Government is all about. The Carter "reorganization" scheme was planned by Zbigniew Brzezinski long before Carter became a Presidential candidate. As early as 1970, Brezinski called openly for the destruction of the U.S. Constitution. In his book *Between Two Ages* he forecast the April 1976 Philadelphia meeting to write a new U.S. Constitution. The Trilateral director wrote: "The approaching two-hundredth anniversary of the Declaration of Independence could justify the call for a national constitutional convention to reexamine the nation's formal institutional framework. Either 1976 or 1989--the two hundredth anniversary of the Constitution--could serve as a suitable target date for culminating a national dialogue on the relevance of existing arrangements, the workings of the representative process...and of streamlining the administrative structure."

Brezinski said 1976 or 1989 "would provide a suitable occasion for redefining the meaning of modern democracy" for the purpose of "setting ambitious and concrete social goals."

All of this is to be related to the international scheme.

Brezinski admitted in *Foreign Policy* magazine for Summer 1976 that any such 'new economic order' seriously threatens 'the traditional American values of individualism, free enterprise, the work ethic, and efficiency.' But the Trilateral and Council on Foreign Relations director stated that "the desire for a 'new economic order' is symptomatic of the new global mood."

The *New York Times* for August 1, 1976, reported that Carter "would give priority to international economic questions, particularly between poor and industrialized states, sharing the resources of the seas, food and natural resources." This news report correctly sums up the Carter-Trilateral objective of stripping America of food and resources for shipment to the Third World nations and the Soviet Union. Brezinski observed that it is too bad many Americans still see this "as a claim on their resources and as portending the confiscation of the fruits of their labor..."

Which, of course, it is. The *Times* also says that, advised by Zbigniew Brzezinski, Jimmy Carter "has established a consistent theme in his foreign policy statements: 'We must replace balance of power politics with world order politics.'"

Since Brezinski holds that the "Nation-state as a fundamental unit of man's organized life has ceased to be the principal creative force," what will replace it? He gives us a hint when he states: "International banks and multi-national corporations are acting and planning in terms that are far in advance of the political concepts

of the nation-state." You can see why David likes Ziggy. The Rockefeller and their fellow Insiders want to replace the nation-state, including our own, with a New World Order dominated by international banks and multi-national corporations.

Once the industrialized nations of the West have been successfully chained together, the next move anticipated by the C.F.R. (Council on Foreign Relations)-Trilateral crowd involves bringing in the Communists.

Trilateralism: Partnership For What?

Princeton's Professor Richard Ullman, director of the C.F.R.'s "1980's Project," states in his article "Trilateralism: Partnership For What?" in the October 1976 issue of *Foreign Affairs*: "...over the next decade, as the shared characteristics which set the trilateral states off from the

other members of the community of nation-states become less distinct...the ranks of the industrialized countries will include not merely the democratic, market-economy nations on the one hand and the Soviet Union and its East European allies on the other..."

Meanwhile, until the Great Merger can be made in the 1980's, Brezinski wants to do everything possible to aid the Communists so they can be brought into the New World Order on a more equal basis.

The Big Z has been playing this tune for a long time. In *New Republic* for August 31, 1963, he wrote: "The aim should be to improve the standard of living and the way of life in the Communist states..." He justifies this by denying that the Communists have any aggressive intentions. As far back as 1967, Brezinski wrote: "Communism, the principal and until recently the most militant revolutionary ideology of our day is dead." Since he pronounced Communism a corpse, the Reds have taken Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, Angola, and Mozambique. Brezinski's reaction is to want to improve their standard of living. You get the picture on Zbigniew when you read in the December 17, 1976 issue of the *Los Angeles Times*: "Asked his views on Detente with the Soviet Union, he said he favored 'accommodation' with the Russians." Accommodation through merger.

treaties that President Carter signed publicly at the U.N. on October 5, 1977 are worse, far worse than the two Panama Canal treaties he already signed. The Panama Canal treaties can gut us from without; the U.N. treaties can gut us from within.

Why? The United Nations Covenant on Civil and Political Rights and the United Nations Convention on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights--both signed by President Carter and subject to ratification by the U.S. Senate now--specifically exclude private property, as a human right. Both U.N. treaties exclude our right to own private property individually or in

association with others. Both U.N. so-called 'human rights' treaties permit government seizure of property without any kind of compensation. The U.N. so-called Human Rights Treaties are in violation of our Constitution. It specifically protects our property rights. The Fifth Amendment states: "...nor shall any person...be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation." The Fourteenth Amendment states: "...nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law."
