Moisture Boosts

Just in case you thought winter was over, and summer not too far away, weather reminded everyone that you don't predict too far ahead of time. If you looked out your window, were outside or in your car Wednessday morning, you

could see it snowing. Light intermittent snow fell throughout the early morning hours on Wednesday after heavy snowfalls blanketed most of New Mexico Tuesday. The snow in this county and area followed a full day of rain with some 1.80 in rain being reported in Muleshoe during the day Tuesday.

High wind, thunder and lightning heralded the approach of the storm early Tuesday morning, with rain starting to fall around 6:30 a.m. During the afternoon and evening, light rain continued although the wind had moved on out of the

Dryland farmer and wheat farmers smiled as they realized they would have time to plant crops, and enough moisture to put seeds in the ground after the soaking rain was through.

Irrigated farmers said they had turned off their wells, and would now have adequate moisture to

Regulations Are Listed For Ag-Youth

With the summer months fast approching, potential summer employers of agricultural youth should be aware of certain age and labor requirements which apply to them, points out

Spencer Tanksley, county agent Hance Outlines Qualifications For Congress

Kent Hance of Lubbock, a candidate for the Congressional seat being vacated by long time Congressman George Mahon, made a swing through Muleshoe Tuesday morning for a press conference at the XIT Restaurant.

When asked about his candidacy, he replied, "In my opinion, the main issue in the Democratic primary Saturday is simple: Who is the best qualified by experience, background and temperament to be the best Congressman for this West Texas district?"

"Government is a very serious business to me. As a State Senator, I learned that it takes more than just a persuasive voice to make government work. It takes cooperation, study, alliances, and a good plan of action based on reality to get things done.

"By working hard to build stature and influence early, I'm convinced that it is possible to be effective in Congress right away, without a long drawn-out training program. I intend to start my homework on Congress before I get of Washington, and save valuable time. It worked for me when I was elected to the Senate and I think Congress offers the same opportunity.

"When people go to the polls Saturday, I hope they think very seriously about qualifications, experience and their hopes for the future of West Texas. Extension Service. Under provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act, producers may employ minors 16 years of age and over at any time in any agricultural occupation. Youth 10 to 15 years of age may also be hired but with certain restrictions.

Youth under 16 may not be employed during school hours and may not be employed at any time in an agricultural occupation declared to be hazardous by the Secretary of Labor. Hazardous occupations include the handling or applying of anhydrous ammonia and certain hazardous pesticides; operating, driving or riding on a tractor over 20-belt horespower; opeating, riding or unclogging certain power-driven farm and fieldstead equipment; and working from a ladder or scaffold at a

height of over 20 feet. Examples of some permitted jobs for youth under 16 included operating a truck, auto or garden-type tractor on the farm proper; loading or unloading trucks; picking produce and placing them on conveyors or in containers; clearing small brush and trees; hand planting and cultivation; milking cows; raising and caring for poultry; picking cotton; cleaning barns and other buildings.

Tanksley explains that the only

exceptions to these provisions apply to employment of youth by their parents. Also, certain student learners enrolled in vocational agriculture education training programs and 4-H youth 14 and 15 years of age completing a tractor and machinery safety project may be certified to operate select, but

not all, hazardous equipment. Tanksley further notes that nonhazardous work may be performed with written parental consent by youth 12 and 13 years of age on any farm. Also, youth under 12 may work only on small farms having less than 500 mandays of labor during any quarter in the preceding calendar year.

Vollers Merits Election To Criminal Appeals Post

GUEST EDITORIAL

Once upon a time (in 1976) Texas voters, enraptured with a "familiar name" on their ballot, elected Don Yarbrough to the Supreme Court of Texas. Despite advance warnings sent up like rockets, the voters behaved like unthinking sheep, electing a man without qualifications and flaws both serious and obvious. It took time, trouble and humiliation to rectify the error. Ex-judge Yarbrough was convicted of perjury and sentenced to prison.

Please tell us the voters learned a lesson and won't do it again.

Because there are similar "familiar name" pitfalls in the May 6 primary elections. One case in point involves the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

Two men seek the Democratic nomination: Sam Houston Clinton and Jim Vollers. See the problem?

Everybody knows Sam Houston. Some may know Sam Houston Clinton. Everybody should know Jim Vollers. He is the kind of man who should be elected. He has everything but a familiar name. Mostly what he has is good qualification, experience and legal fairness.

The State Bar of Texas poll of lawyers' preference supports our opinion. Jim Vollers won their poll over Clinton by 5,154 to 3,562. But then lawyers bother to find out about people running for state judgeships. Average voters, lamentable, usually do not.

So, who is Jim Vollers? He is many things. Let's start with the fact that he was appointed last January 1 to the Criminal Appeals post he now seeks in public election. He has served well since selected by Governor Briscoe

when voters approved expansion of the court. Just before that he was state prosecuting attorney for nine years, 1969-77. Before that he was an assistant attorney general under Crawford Martin, 1967-69. Before that he was assistant district attorney in Jefferson County (Beaumont) for six years. Before that he was in private law practice four years in Beaumont. That was just after 1955-56 Army service as assistant to the Legal Assistance Office, Staff Judge Advocate. Before that, in 1954, he was graduated from the University of Texas Law School and got married. Before that he was born and reared in Goliad. As a matter of fact, his 47th birthday was April 20.

Jim Vollers has an uphill fight for name recognition, despite the fact that he currently sits on this most important state-wide Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, which is the criminal law equal of our

State Supreme Court. Selection for this judgeship is too important to risk electing the wrong man, just because one candidate with a familiar name has a knack for getting publicity, and the other candidate has a less familiar name and does an excellent job in the quiet and studious manner of being a judge.

The Reporter-News recommends Jim Vollers for the Democratic nomination to a full term on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. It'd help if Pa and Ma Vollers had named him "Jim Bowie" Vollers or "James Fannin" Vollers, but just plain Jim Vollers is making it on his own...with a little help from voters who look beyond the label.

WASHINGTON, D. C. --Two days before the President won a victory in the Senate, getting that body to give away the \$10 billion dollar canal, the zone and all its military installations and buildings, tough words were exchanged in a private top-level aides' session at Camp David.

The secret meeting was called to find out what could be done to check the slide in Mr. Carter's popularity. After a long session the decision was made to hire several new aides and shake up the White House staff, so that Mr. Carter's wishes would be carried out more efficiently and that he would get a greater spread of

This was supposed to offset what some as the Georgia Mafia handicap--wherein six of Carter's top seven aides are people he brought with him to Washington from Georgia. The firing of one or more Cabinet officers or other top officials might also help--in the view of some at the meeting-though this remains a threat as yet.

Mr. Carter's popularity slide stems from the public perception of him as a man who wants to spend too much money, which could wreck the

budget, dollar and the country's economic stability. They see him weak in bowing to unions, to domestic and social demands from the jobless, shiftless and minorities, a President who talks about voluntary restraint but whose timidity in the coal strike finally produced a thirty per cent wage hike in that industry.

What the President needs even more than new advisers and a tougher attitude with administration officials, however, is a change in direction. If he follows the advice of his new Federal Reserve Board Chairman, William Miller, he will reduce his proposed deficit by cutting tax reductions. That would probably be the most shrewd political and economic move open to Mr. Carter today.

Panama Canal Mistake?

WASHINGTON-America's decision to relinquish control of the Panama Canal could not come at a worse time for the conduct of our foreign affairs.

It represents a sharp departure for a country known for its resolve in world affairs and will no doubt be met with delight by those who have been testing our mettle on other fronts.

In and of itself, the Panama Canal decision represents a serious foreign policy mistake. The Canal is a vital commercial and naval waterway, important to our economic well-being and to that of the world. Its national security importance to this country is above dispute.

Provisions added to the treaty which proponents argue will guarantee our right to keep the Canal open and operational are only so many words. The instability of the Panamanian government offers little assurance of the Canal's future operation should fragile political conditions there take a turn for the worse.

Moreover, the adverse impact of the decision to relinquish control was well-documented before the Senate Armed Services Committee: direct and indirect costs to the U.S. Treasury could well exceed \$1 billion. The absolute minimum cost to the taxpayers will exceed \$750

Necessary payments to the Panamanians from Canal revenues will require substantial toll increases, particularly as inflation raises the cost of operating and maintaining the Canal. Toll increases will raise the cost of goods shipped, causing higher prices in the United States, and diminishing the economic attractiveness of Canal passage.

This in turn will have a detrimental impact on the economy of those ports handling ships which use the Canal. The loss could cost thousands of jobs in Gulf

The Senate gave little or no consideration to these arguments, made over and over again by those of us who believed such facts had critical bearing on ratifi-

The real importance of the Canal decision, however, will be the impression it leaves both on our allies and on our potential adversaries. Far from representing an example of good faith in dealing with smaller countries, the decision to relinquish control may be interpreted as an example of wavering foreign policy, an uncertainty of purpose the American government can ill-afford to

The United States has always operated the Canal to the benefit of all maritime nations in an even-handed fashion. Besides throwing into question continued international access to the isthmus waterway, our action relinquishing control most likely will be perceived as a retreat from necessary tough decisions in foreign policy.

In the Horn of Africa, at the SALT negotiating table in Geneva, in the Middle East, the eyes of the world are trained on decisions required of the United States.

For that matter, so are those of a lot of concerned





Meat Import Legislation Is Proposed

The Senate Finance Committee Wednesday approved by a vote of 13-1 Senator Lloyd Bensten's legislation to clamp down on

meat imports.
The Bentsen Beef Import Bill would impose reasonable quotas on the amount of beef which can be imported into the United States

"My bill will reverse the boom and bust cycle in the cattle industry by allowing increased imports during periods of high prices and reducing imports at times when the U.S. cattleman is unable to get a fair price for his price," Senator Bentsen "This counter cyclical control

of imports will add stability to the cattle market and assure the U.S. consumer high quality beef at reasonable prices." This legislation would replace the 'pro cyclical" 1964 Meat Import Quota Act, which allows imports to increase at the same time domestic producers are liquidating their cow herds. Senator Bentsen addresssed

the serious problem facing cattlemen and feedlot operators who have gone bankrupt the last several years during periods of rising beef imports and high domestic supply. "Even a small increase in

imports can have a very negative effect on cattelmen during periods of overproduction. This is particularly true for smaller cattlemen. A countercyclical formula would be particularly beneficial to smaller, familyowned farms and ranches. which are less able to withstand the upswings and downswings of the cattle cycle than larger corporated operations with ready access to financial markets. Many cattlemen have been caught in a cost-price squeeze and have been victimized by serious drought. This has led to bankruptcy for smaller ranchers," Bentsen

"Added stability in the cattle sector would provide an economic climate to encourge investment in cost-reducing technology, improvements in productivity, better breeding stock, pasture improvements, better machinery and equipment, and better veterinary programs."

The Bentsen Beef Import Bill is a consensus hill designed to stabilize the cattle market to the benefit of both consumers and

We must reduce the historical cyclical fluctuations in cattle production and prices. A countercyclical formula will

stabilize profits to ranchers at levels that are reasonable for consumers. In particular, this approach will help moderate beef prices for the American housewife during times of domestic beef shortages, Senator Bentsen said.

Without a doubt, America's favorite vegetable is the tomato. With spring looking like it might have finally arrived, no doubt many gardeners will begin ourneying to garden centers to buy tomato plants.

Tomatoes are not easy to grow in Texas--they require long periods of mild weather, emperatures above 65 degrees at night and below 90 degrees during the day in order to set fruit. Most areas of Texas do not have many days like that in a row, and tomatoes fade with hot weather. As a general rule the smaller fruited varieties will produce over a long period of time during hot weather than will big-fruited varieties like Beef Steak and Ponderosa.

Since variety selection is importnat in growing tomatoes, here are some of the varieties to look for when shopping for tomato transplants: Almost all the small-fruited types like Cherry and Porter will do well and bear over a long period of time, but when you get into the larger-fruited forms you need to look for varieties like Spring Giant, Bigset, Bonus, Terrific, Better Boy and Early Girl.

Take along a note pad and write down the names of the varieties you but. Also note where the varieties are planted in the garden because one of the most frustrating things is to have great success with one tomato plant out of eight varieties and not be able to remember which it was. A small plot plan showing the location of each variety will save a lot of haeadaches next year.

There are many secrets to successful tomato growing. Few plants are pruned these days, but if you stake your plants you may want to prune out the suckers that grow in the leaf axles and shoot for larger fruit, although total production will be

The best way to grow tomatoes is in wire cages made of reinforcing wire. A five-foot section bent into a cylinder and pushed down over the tomato plants is ideal support. The only drawback is that the wire also makes a good perch for mockingbirds which like to poke holes in tomatoes--but they'll do that, perch or not. Other hints include using gallons cans with holes punched in the bottom and sides which are inserted in the soil one foot on either side of the plant, leaving about one-inch of the can sticking up. The can serves as a reservoir to put water and nutrients into the soil

Now is the time to make some definite plans for beautifying your yard and garden. If you don't, no one will do it for you.

row. Simply cut holes for the tomato plants and for the cans, eliminating weed problems at the same time. These are precautions, though, that need to be taken with black plastic mulch as temperatures

get hotter. Either take it up,

colored straw mulch or take latex paint mixed one-to-five with water and spray the black plastic white. Otherwise it will absorb too much heat and bake the plant roots.



Wenmohs said that public participation is a built-in feature of the Resources Conservation Act, and suggestions from interested groups or individuals are welcome at any time.
