CONGRESSIONAL SUMMARY.
In view of the fact that the 43rd
Congress will terminate in six weeks
there is a general desire manifested,
both in the Senate and the House,
to economize time and hurry up the
business by close application to
legitimate legislation.

IN THE SENATE.
On Monday, the Indian appropriation
bill was under consideration,
and the question as to whether
there is or not a Teton Sioux tribe
on the United States Territory was
again discussed. Government has
been making yearly appropriations
for such a tribe, and now the statement
is advanced that the Teton
Sioux are a myth. It comes from
parties anxious to implicate certain
Indian Agents in frauds upon the
Government. But the Interior
Department is in possession of evi-
dence which has been communicated
to Congress, and which is con-
sidered amply satisfactory to justify
the past and future appropriations
for their relief. Congress, however,
wishes the Secretary of the Interior
to disprove the charges, if he can.

Yesterday Mr. Buckingham presented
an important bill providing
for an Amendment to the National
Currency and Banking Act. The
bill provides for free banking; pro-
hibits direct or indirect payments of
interest on deposits; allows United
States bonds to bear interest
to be counted, as well as lawful
money, in the reserves, and compels
the banks to redeem their circulating
notes either in coin or in legal
tenders or in United States bonds,
at par, with accrued interest, at the
option of the holder.

It also provides that United
States legal tenders in sums of one
thousand dollars may be redeemed
with coin or with United States
currency bonds bearing a coin in-
terest of 3 per cent, and the prin-
cipal of Army United States bonds
bearing coin interest shall, on de-
mand by the holder, be paid by the
United States Treasurer in legal-
tender notes, and the interest in
coin.

All bonds issued under the pro-
vision of this Act are to be free
from State and municipal taxation.
The last section requires the Secre-
tary of the Treasury to issue
herein described, and legal tender
notes of denominations not less
than \$1 and \$5 respectively, and to
make all regulations necessary to
execute the provisions of this act.
The bill was referred to the Judicial
Committee.

Mr. Thurman presented resolu-
tions, which were adopted, directing
the Committee on Privileges and
elections to enquire into the
conduct in Louisiana and Arkansas.
Senator Morton, Carpenter, Logan,
Alcorn, Hill, Anthony and Fran-
kell composed the committee. They
will immediately enter upon the
duties assigned them. The Com-
mittee will not go to the scene of
the difficulties but will send a com-
mission of responsible and capable
men who will be empowered to take
the sworn testimony of witnesses.
Any witness refusing to testify will
be summoned to Washington. It is
probable that the bill will be re-
ported to the House in a few days.

IN THE HOUSE.
Yesterday the Credit Mobilier
bill was reported and made the
special order for Tuesday next.
The Speaker laid before the House
a number of executive commis-
sions, which were referred to ap-
propriate committees. Among these
were commissions from the
Secretary of the Interior relating to
Indian affairs; from the Secretary
of War with reference to the com-
missioner for the establishment of a
depot for military supplies at San
Antonio, Texas; and from the
Interior, relating to the sale of
land in the Territory of New Mexico.

THE CREDIT MOBILIER SENSATION.
The previous decision of the
House to conduct the Credit Mobilier
investigation, by the committee ap-
pointed for the purpose, with closed
doors, created dissatisfaction, and
the newspaper reports, while the
facts were being fabricated re-
ported to suit the views of the
readers. On Monday the House
considered the bill, and the com-
mittee reported, and the bill was
passed.

be a most fertile soil, and in all
cases where the soil has become thin
it will improve in volume.

This is a strange country. The obtuseness with which it refuses to become bankrupt in a striking illustration of the unreasonableness of the Anglo-Saxon race.
