(From the Galveston News.) An Important Decision.

We copy the following from the Northwestern Real Estate Journal, published at Dubuque, Iowa. As the decision was rendered by the United States Circuit Court, in similar cases, the same rulings will apply to Texas, and hence the decision assumes importance to us.

"An important decision was recently rendered by the United States Circuit Court at Des Moines. The case was that of an action brought to recover certain lands in Grundy county, and which was brought before Judge Love at the May term.

The plaintiff's counsel moved for a new trial, but was refused. He then appealed from the decision of Judge Love, and applied to the court in full bench to set aside the judgment and grant a new trial.

After the case had been argued before Judges Dillon and Love, the court rendered its decision, fully sustaining the opinion of the court given on the trial, and holding that a plaintiff could not commence an action to set aside a tax title without first paying the taxes; also that the tendering of taxes after suit is commenced would avail nothing.

"The court further decided that a fraudulent tax title was not void, but likely to be rendered so, and if the tax title purchaser sells the title to a third person, who buys it without a knowledge of the fraudulent sale, he is a bona fide purchaser and his title will be protected in preference to that of the original owner.

CONGRESS has passed a bill abolishing the franking privilege, and it will no doubt be signed by the President.

AFTER considerable opposition it appears that the Legislative Committee investigating the Educational Department have been required by resolution to hold open sessions, and to allow the Superintendent to appear in person, or by counsel, and to send for persons and papers.

The Mail Service

In Texas is in a great degree subject to the whims of contractors who carry the mails in coaches, and, also, look for additional profits by carrying passengers.

Recently the horse disease has furnished some of these contractors with an excuse for an almost complete stoppage of the mail service as required by their contracts.

How this matter is arranged at Washington we may conjecture, but it is impossible for us to know.

There are, however, contractors, who have "come to time" rain or shine, in spite of the epizootic, and they deserve mention.

MR. KUCHELER, Commissioner of the General Land Office of Texas, estimates that the total amount of all our public lands, and all outstanding, railroad and other certificates or claims authorized by law is \$8,812,624.

Not only this, but we are informed that, chiefly through the exertions of Major Kittle, there has been a considerable increase of mail service throughout Western Texas, not only in the establishment of new lines, but in the more frequent transmission of mails.

Our readers will recollect that we have heretofore urged upon the postal department the necessity of such increased facilities, and we congratulate Major Kittle and the public upon the success of his efforts towards procuring it.

The Commission Constitutional Amendment reported back the joint resolution ratifying the constitutional amendment agreed to by the people at the recent election, respecting the disposal of the public lands, recommended its passage.

It is a record of great historical interest, and contains the military operations of the Army of the Ohio in Tennessee and Kentucky during the dark days of 1862 and 1863.
