MEMOIR.

Abilene Commandery No. 27, Knights Templar.

"In Hoc Signo Vinces."

ABILENE, TEX., Jan. 28, A. D. 1903.
 Preamble and Resolutions in memory of Sir Knight Louis Henry Bradfield, member of this Commandery, who departed this life at his home in Abilene, January 21st A. D. 1903.

"Requiescat in pace."

EMINENT COMMANDER AND SIR KNIGHTS:

"We are born, we sigh and we die."

The grim and silent messenger, Death, ever on our track, has laid low our esteemed companion and frater, Sir Knight Louis Henry Bradfield in the 59th year of his pilgrimage and war fare. We could pay no ransom to reclaim him from the power and the dominion of death, and he passed its portals on Wednesday evening, January 21st, after an illness of about eight weeks, in which he displayed heroic courage battling for life. But his heart grew weaker and his body faint, and his life went out as a lighted candle in a wintry blast His devoted wife, family and friends, Masonic brethren and fraters all ministered to him to the end and at the request of the family his body was laid away with our last sad rites and with Masonic honors.

Deceased was born in Tennessee, reared in Texas; was a faithful Confederate soldier through the entire Civil war; lived and married Miss Louis Marshall, youngest daughter of Dr. Hamilton Marshall, Sept. 22nd, A. D. 1887 at Atlanta, removed to Little Rock and thence to Abilene, where he continued in the drug business about six years last preceding his departure, in comparative health until an attack of la grippe developed heart trouble and his death resulted from heart failure. His widow and two children, Ruth and Marshall, survive him.

Sir Knight Bradfield was a good

citizen, devoted husband and father and a brother companion and frater true to his obligations. His ideals were of the best and highest and he always tried to attain to do them in thought, word and deed.

He will be missed in the home, lodge and asylum; in church and the marts of trade. He was an exemplary christian and a member of the Presbyterian church. One would know from his walk and conversation he had been with Christ and learned of Him. He had a firm reliance upon God and upon the strong arm of the Lion of the tribe of Judah. His creed was faith in God, Hope in immortality and Charity for all mankind.

"The Soul the eternal Soul must reign In worlds devoid of pain and strife, Then why should mortal man complain Of death, which leads to a happier life?"

Therefore be it resolved:

First. In the death of Sir Knight Bradfield the Commandery of Texas and of Abilene have lost a faithful and true frater, ever ready to give aid to the poor, to succor the needy, clothe the naked, feed the hungry and bind up the wounds of the afflicted; and to wage war against the enemies of innocent maidens, destitute widows, helpless orphans and the Christian religion. His heart was truly expanded by Benevolence and his hand guided by Justice.

Second. While we know our frater would gladly have lived and continued to bear his part in all the duties and cares of life. Yet like Paul he would rather depart and be with Christ, which is far better. He wanted to live for his family and the good he might do, but Death had laid his icy fingers upon him, and he felt his presence and calmly and patiently accepted God's will.

Third. We tender our sympathies to the widow and children of our de-

ceased companion and commend them in our devotion to Almighty God. That He be a husband and a father to them as He hath promised. That his everlasting arms be around and underneath them, and that His spirit guard and guide them always in the paths of truth and righteousness for His name sake.

Fourth. That this preamble and these resolutions be engrossed and spread upon the minutes and that copies duly signed under the hand of the Eminent Commander and Seal of the Commandery and Attested by the Recorder, be presented to the widow and children of our deceased frater, and tendered the city press for publication.

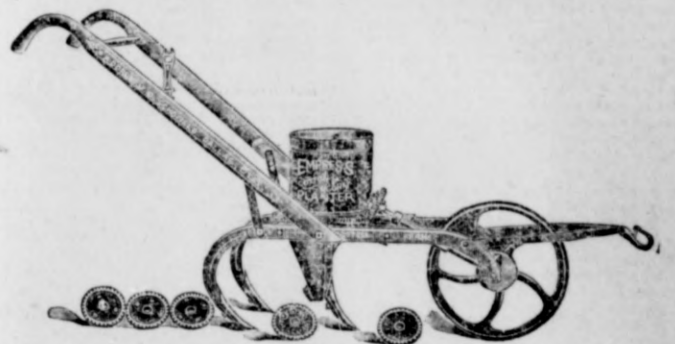

Some express the fear that the United States will yet have war with Germany over the Venezuela question. Such fears are groundless, at least it appears so to me. The German Emperor has a love for the Monroe doctrine and he only wants to find out just how far he can go without coming to blows with your Uncle Samuel. Emperor William is a bold, fearless ruler, but by no means a fool. A war with the United States would be France's opportunity to regain Alsace and Lorraine and no one doubts that she would mix in such a melee in a jiffy and no one knows this better than the German Emperor. Some say: "Suppose England assists Germany." Yes suppose she would, but she won't. There is Russia watching England and here is Canada right near us. India is coveted by the Muscovite, and a war between England and Germany on one side and the United States and France on the other would bring Russia in on the side of the side of the United States. Austria might join England and Germany so might Italy and Spain, but such a war would wreck every throne in Europe. England would lose her colonies. Germany would be smashed and the American and Muscovite, two peoples as different as they possibly can be, would rule the world. These are some of the possibilities that would grow out of a war between Germany and the United States. For this reason there will be no war. Should England refuse to aid Germany the end would come quicker and more disastrous for Germany. There is no reason why England should join the enemies of Uncle Sam, but many why she should not. The best reason is it is to her interest to be friendly with Uncle Sam and this is the best guarantee that there will be no serious trouble.
