

WHITE AND BLACK.
The Beauregard Move.
An Effort which will Create a Sensa-
tion—Recollections of an
Earliest Meeting.

NEW ORLEANS, June 17.—The
movement towards uniting the
white and colored citizens on a broad
catholic basis, in opposition to all
bad political elements in this State,
culminated last evening at a meet-
ing in which each race was repre-
sented by some fifty or sixty of the
more prominent among them. The
matter was discussed fully in all its
bearings, and the following basis of
compromise and union was arrived
at. It was adopted without a dis-
senting voice among those present:
WHEREAS, Louisiana is now
threatened with death in every vi-
tal organ of her material and polit-
ical being; and
WHEREAS, Her dire extremity is
but the fruit of unnatural division
among the children of her soil and
of her adoption; and
WHEREAS, We have an abiding
faith that there is love enough for
Louisiana among her sons to unite
them in a manly and unselfish
struggle for her redemption; be it there-
fore
Resolved, first, That henceforth
we dedicate ourselves to the uni-
fication of our people.
Second, That by "our people" we
mean all men, of whatever race,
color or religion, who are citizens
of Louisiana and who are willing to
work for her prosperity.
Third, That we shall advocate, by
speech and pen and deed, the equal
and impartial exercise, by every
citizen of Louisiana, of every civil
and political right guaranteed by
the Constitution and laws of Loui-
siana, by the Constitution and laws
of the United States, and by the
laws of honor, brotherhood and fair
dealing.
Fourth, That we shall maintain
and advocate the right of every cit-
izen in Louisiana, and of every cit-
izen of the United States, to fre-
quent at will places of public resort,
and to travel at will on all vehicles
of public conveyance, upon terms
of public equality with any and every
citizen; and we pledge our in-
selves as far as our influence, coun-
sel and example may go, to make
this right a live and practical right;
and that there may be no misunder-
standing of our views on this point.
1. We shall recommend to the
proprietors of all public places of
licensed public resort in the State
of Louisiana, the opening of said
places to the patronage of both races
inhabiting our State.
2. And we shall further recom-
mend all railroads, steamboats,
steamships and other public con-
veyances, to pursue the same pol-
icy.
3. We shall further recommend
that banks, insurance offices and
other public corporations recognize
and concede to our colored fel-
low-citizens, where they are stockhold-
ers in such institutions, the right of
being represented in the direction
thereof.
4. We shall further recommend
that, hereafter, no distinction shall
exist among citizens of Louisiana
in any of public schools or State in-
stitutions of education or instruc-
tion, supported by the State, city
or parishes.
5. We shall also recommend that
the proprietors of foundries, factor-
ies and other industrial establish-
ments, in employing mechanics or
workmen, make no distinction be-
tween the two races.
6. We shall encourage, by every
means in our power, our colored cit-
izens in the rural districts to be-
come the proprietors of the soil, thus
enhancing the value of lands and
adding to the productions of the
State, while it will create a politi-
cal conservatism which is the off-
spring of the proprietorship; and
we furthermore recommend to all
land proprietors of our State the
policy of considering the question
of breaking up the same into small
farms in order that our colored cit-
izens and white immigrants may
become practical farmers and culti-
vators of the soil.
Fifth, That we pledge our honor
and good faith to exercise our moral
influence, both through personal
example, to bring about the rapid
removal of prejudices heretofore
existing against the colored citizens
of Louisiana, in order that they may
hereafter enjoy all the rights be-
longing to citizens of the United
States.
Sixth, That we earnestly appeal
to the press of this State to join
and co-operate with us in executing
this monument of unity, and accord
of justice, and, like ourselves, for-
ever bury beneath it all past prej-
udices on the subject of race or col-
or.
Seventh, That we deprecate and
thoroughly condemn all acts of vio-
lence, from whatsoever source, and
appeal to our people of both races
to abide by the law in all their dis-
putes, as the surest way to pre-

serve to all the blessings of life, lib-
erty and property.
Eighth, That we pledge oursel-
ves to this cultivation of a broad sen-
timent of nationality, which shall
embrace the whole country, and up-
hold the flag of the Union.
Ninth, That as an earnest of our
holy purpose, we hereby offer upon
the altar of the common good all
party ties and all prejudices of edu-
cation which may tend to hinder
the political duty of our people.
Tenth, That in view of the nu-
merical equality between the white
and colored elements of our popu-
lation, we shall advocate an equal
distribution of the offices of trust
and emolument in our State, de-
manding, as the only condition of
our suffrages, honesty, diligence
and ability; and we advocate this
not because of the offices themselves,
but simply as another earnest and
proof upon our part that the union
we desire is an equal union, and
not an illusive conjunction brought
about for the sole benefit of one or
the other of the parties to that
union.

Meeting of Hood's Brigade.
Old soldiers are very touchy and
apt to be impatient over criticism, but
we assume that, aside from the re-
gular army, we are all civilians,
and proceed to make a few reflec-
tions upon the assemblage at Bar-
ton Springs yesterday, Friday.
The Democratic press and lead-
ing politicians of the South are daily
telling the people and the world
that the South is down-trodden and
oppressed; that we are ruled by a
military despotism, at the head of
which presides Gen. Grant, the sol-
dier who received the surrender of
the leader of the Southern armies.
Every day we hear complaints of
tyranny and outrage. Yet, yester-
day, a remnant of a rebel brigade
assembled near the Capital of our
State, with the avowed object of
prepetuating their history and jus-
tifying their rebellion against the
government. They did not assem-
ble clandestinely, but openly and
after extensive notice through the
public prints; the day chosen was
the anniversary of the battle of
Gain's Farm, a day of victory for
the rebel arms. No one disturbs
this assemblage; a barracks of U. S.
troops within a mile of them;
the U. S. Government stronger and
more powerful than ever, and yet
no one even suggests that there is
any impropriety in this assembling
of a rebel brigade to celebrate the
anniversary of a rebel victory. In
what other country under the sun
could such a thing happen? And
yet these very men, who come to-
gether to fight once again their
country and the life of the Repub-
lic, will be among the grumblers to-
morrow at the Government so abso-
lutely kind and forgiving as the
count it no offence to celebrate a
rebel victory. It is because the
Government is strong and free and
magnanimous, that such meetings
are possible and harmless. The
brave men who followed the Con-
federate flag and fought their cause
out, are not the men to fear, but it
is time these men were cultivating
a love for the old flag and their
whole country, instead of being
anxious to perpetuate the recollec-
tions of their treason.
Col. Winkler, the President of
this Hood Brigade Association, in
his opening address said: "That in-
justice of the Southern cause had,
it is said, been settled by its result,
but the only thing he could see was
settled was, that superiority in force
will win." The Colonel is a very
fair and unprejudiced man; he
walked and fought through the re-
bellion as a Confederate, and his
expression can be deemed of the
most liberal type. As a record of
gallant deeds by gallant men the
history of the rebel army will re-
main in history, but as to the cause,
history will put as a struggle to
prepetuate slavery, and a causeless
rebellion. It was a rich man's fight
and a poor man's war. It is past,
and we are willing to bury all an-
imosities towards the gallant men
who wore the gray, and hope to see
them cultivating a border senti-
ment and love for the Union. Time
will cure the wounds which are
sought to be kept open. Foreigners
may look upon such celebrations as
"Hood's Brigade" as an evidence of
our national weakness, but they for-
get that we are all Americans.—
Journal.
