The following is from a communi-  
cation in the Galveston News in re-  
ference to Western Texas:  
I fear that, as you saw our coun-  
try under such disadvantages, you  
will share the opinion of your coun-  
terpart, the Houston Age, that  
"we have nothing here but wild  
cattle, topos, (wolves,) mule-eared  
rabbits and prickly-pear thickets."  
Now, dear News, if the above are  
our characteristics, I do not object  
to them. Wild cattle are very in-  
teresting objects on the face of our  
landscape, indeed, to stock-rabbers.  
Mule-eared rabbits and wolves have  
been honored by such graphic de-  
scriptions, from the pen of Mark  
Twain and other accidental tourists,  
that I am willing to accept them as  
nationalities. If Western Texas is  
ever made an independent state, I  
would see no inappropriateness in  
a mule-eared rabbit or a cayote, on  
her armorial crest. Would it not  
appear as well as a lion, bear or  
eagle? Or if a plant should be pre-  
ferred, why would not a prickly-  
pear be as emblematic of courage as  
the renowned fleur-de-lis, or the  
thistle?  
And the New York Observer has

"Nervous readers may be pleased

poison emitted from the words of  
the still—and our plants beset  
with myriads of thorns, are para-  
doxes that have often amused me.  
If we were so amused with snakes  
as the writer in the Observer states,

tional example of the Emerald Isle,

good Saint Patrick, who has the  
credit of ridding that country of

**U. S. Troops Again Cross the Rio Grande.**

**MEXICAN PRISONERS TAKEN.**

**A Herd of Cattle Recaptured.**

**EAGLE PASS, TEXAS, June 26, 1873.**  
 Editors State Journal:  
 The following news arrived here to-day:  
 "On the 23rd instant a scout numbering 40 men of the Fourth U. S. Cavalry was ordered out from Camp Shafter, situated about 30 miles in a southeasterly direction from here, commanded by Lieut. Thurston, and guided by our "border chief," Green Van, Lieut. of the Maverick county militia men. They struck a fresh cattle trail leading to the Rio Grande, and following it up in double quick time, arrived at the river about 46 miles below here, and found the trail led through the river. They captured one of the thieves, a Mexican, who was yet on this bank of the river. Threats were communicated to those across the river that the troops would cross and kill every man in charge of the herd if they did not surrender themselves and the cattle. Immediately after a detail was ordered to cross to assist them in bringing the cattle to this side and arrest the parties in charge of the herd. They found some 225 in charge, and recaptured 80 head of beefs, stolen from the different ranches of our border settlements. Green Van and the detail guarding the prisoners, arrived about 4 o'clock this afternoon at Fort Duncan. The commanding officer, Col. W. R. Shafter, held an examination and placed the prisoners in close confinement in the guard-house at Fort Duncan, Texas, until further instructions are received.  
 Green Van, when he goes out again?"  
 The Mexican authorities of Piedras Negras fully endorse this movement, and will aid our troops, in future, in bringing to justice the murderers and cattle thieves of this section."

The military authorities here do not regard the above as a hostile crossing of the river. Those crossing the river did so to assist in bringing over the cattle on which no seizure had been paid.

**Latest News.**

**MADRID, June 26.**—The irreconcilable threaten to take up arms if the Ministry is formed exclusively of members of the Right. The authorities have prepared to repress disorders. Report of the defeat, by Gen. Cabrinette of the Carlists by Don Alfonso officially confirmed. International aid losing ground in Catalonia.  
 The Cure of Santa Cruz still holds as prisoners the Mayor of Oraton and the correspondent of the Le Esaya, and will only release on condition that France give up two Carlist officers.  
 "Senior Yastad appointed Minister of Public Works."  
 Notice was given that the government would present a bill for the immediate abolition of slavery in Cuba, and same political privileges would be granted to the colony as are enjoyed by the people of Spain. The announcement was cheered.

The Minister of Marines announced the suppression of the Admiralty as a matter of economy and discontinuance of the Mediterranean squadron.  
 MADRID, June 30.—A dispatch from the commandant of the government troops at Sevilla announces that he is compelled to withdraw his forces from that city to prevent a conflict between the soldiers and the citizens.  
 YIKINA, June 29.—A violent thunder and rain storm to-night flooded the Exhibition grounds and did much injury to the American and German. The gallery and roof of the Chicago Restaurant were blown off. The building and contents are a total loss.

**The Difficulty with that Horse.**

We had a good deal of trouble with our horse last summer. He was a hot-tailed horse, and it seemed to annoy him so much that he could not reach the bit which fastened on his bits, that it occurred to us to fasten on a kind of an artificial tail to relieve the situation, as it were. So we procured three feet of half-inch rope, unraveled about eighteen inches of it, and spliced the other end to the horse's tail. This would have enabled him to switch a fly off his nose as soon as he had acquired a little practice. But our Irishman, seeing the rope, and not understanding our motive precisely, concluded that we were trying experiments with some new kind of hitching strap to be used in the rear, and he tied the rope to the stall that night by his artificial continuation. By morning the rope was hitched to kindling-wood, and the horse was standing on three legs, with the other leg caught in the hayrack, while he showed up four of the best boards in the side of the stable in front of him. Then we got him up another rope tail, and explained the theory to our man. But the tail bothered the hester so much while carrying the horse that he tied half a rope to it to hold it still. The consequence was that the horse, in a moment of excitement, jerked the brick around and smashed the fishman's nose, and he sued us, and we spent two hundred dollars trying to settle the case. Then we bought a bunch of horse-hair, and spliced them on very neatly. When our man came he began to carry that tail, and it came off in his hand. He thought it indicated a diseased condition of the horse, and he gave him a huge dose of some kind of patent powder to improve the animal's health, and in half an hour the horse had convulsions, during which he kicked down the stable door, battered the stall into splinters, hammered four more boards out of the partition, dislocated his off hind leg, and died in frightful agony. Now we have a horse with a long tail, and when we see a peddler coming with horse medicine we send a dog out to interview him, and bombard him from the front window with a shot-gun.

The Indian Commissioners left Fort Clark on the 20th. No news has been received from them since that date.

In the District Court the Patehn Divorce case did not come off as was expected, but was continued over to next Saturday.

As editors and printers are human beings, so to speak, and liable to have 4th of July impulses, no EXPRESS will appear to-morrow.
