**MATRIMONIAL EVENTS.**  
**MAVERICK—CHILTON.**  
[From the Baltimore Sun.]  
The spacious and beautiful Protestant Episcopal Church, known as Mount Calvary, corner of Madison avenue and Eastway streets, was crowded on Tuesday afternoon last at an early hour. A gay, more intelligent or fashionable assemblage we have rarely seen collected in Baltimore. The attraction was not novel, but it was interesting and popular, and one that never fails to enlist the sympathy and approbation of both sexes. Six o'clock P. M. had been fixed upon for the celebration of the nuptials of William H. Maverick, Esq., of San Antonio, Texas, and Miss Emily V., the beautiful and accomplished daughter of Gen. R. H. Chilton, late of Columbus, Geo. No tickets had been issued, but the high standing and popularity of the bridal party and connections, crowded the commodious building above and below at an early hour.  
The altar was brilliantly illuminated, some hundred candles blending their soft, mellow light with the scores of numerous gas jets, while floral offerings in profusion, added to the beauty of the scene and diffused a most graceful fragrance throughout the building.  
At six P. M., the merry peals of the sweet-toned bell announced the coming of the bridal party, and in a moment more, fifteen of Stewart's splendid coaches, drove to the door, and the gay party disembarked. A strip of magnificent Brussels carpet spread from the street curbing to the church vestibule, enabled the elegant bridal corte to avoid contact with the dust and dirt, and over this they proceeded to the sacred edifice.  
With the swelling tones of the magnificent organ, which rendered a popular wedding march, the gay company entered in the following order:

**How Wild Bill Died.**  
A private letter from Salina, Kansas, gives this somewhat new account of the killing of Wild Bill:—  
"You have probably read in the newspapers about the killing of William Hickox, better known as Wild Bill all through this upper country; and as it happened to be in Salina when the shooting game off, I will give you my version of it. Wild Bill was a tall, good-looking fellow, and let his hair grow way down his shoulders. Some time ago he was appointed a United States deputy-marshal for Kansas, and since he was accustomed to put on a heap of airs. Every few weeks he would take a run down to Kansas City, and air himself and his long hair at the theatres, to the great admiration of the negroes boot blacks and free-chorus men. All that was needed for him to complete his fame was for Ned Buntline to have come along and made a lion out of him in the New York illustrated papers as he did of Buffalo Bill. As for knowing the country thoroughly, I have it from old settlers that it was not so; that he knew scarcely anything about the country, with the exception of a small section around the Kansas Pacific. He obtained his reputation as a great fighting man by means of several persons, some of whom were drunk, firing at him and missing him, and he shot them of course. He had killed several men in this way in self defence, and then began to kill for the sake of killing and to keep up his name as a great fighter. He commenced holding his levees at the most prominent saloons in towns along the line, and usually had around him a staff of rogues, who acted

ed him as their leader. The man Wild Bill would be spoken of in respect along that line, for several hundred miles, without one was in the car of the K. P., moving through the country at a rapid rate. But it was over the Texas cow-boys that Wild Bill liked to ride a high horse. He held to the scriptural injunction, 'Heal thyself,' and he always was 'heeled' you bet. But he made one mistake. He killed several Texans, but he killed one Texan too many. That man had a brother, and when that brother heard of his death, he started from Texas in a hurry for he had important business in Kansas. On arriving at Salina he inquired where Mr. Hickox, United States marshal, might be found as was directed to a saloon where Wild Bill was holding one of his levees. Tying his horse at the door, the Texan went in the saloon and inquired for Mr. William Hickox. He was pointed out to him. He then walked up in front of him and asked him in his own name was Hickox, William Hickox. The answer was yes. 'You're Wild Bill,' are you? 'Yes,' said Bill, 'Then I want you,' said the Texan, and drawing a six shooter, he fired before Bill, (who was also remarkable quick for the ante, and an excellent shot,) could get his pistol up. Wild Bill fell dead with a ball through his brain. The Texan then cocked another barrel of his pistol, and standing over the corpse invited any one that did not like his style to pitch in. But nobody appeared, in the face of that six shooter, to have the slightest disposition to interfere. And so after waiting a full minute, the Texan resumed, 'My time is scarce and I must be going. I have business to look after in Texas.' And he backed toward the door, mounted his horse and rode off in the darkness. As there have been several accounts published of this affair, and as the most of them are erroneous, I thought I would write and tell you how Wild Bill passed in his checks.

The bride is a beautiful blonde of twenty-one, and for the past two winters has been the reigning belle of New Orleans, where she first met the gallant Texan who has made her his bride and companion. She was most elegantly but becomingly attired in a white corded silk, en train, and wore a full bridal veil and the usual orange wreath.  
The bridesmaids were all uniformly attired in puffed tarleton dresses and wore mother of pearl gloves, each carrying a magnificent bouquet. The two first appeared with blue ribbon sashes, and the other four wore pink sashes, with rose trimmings, looped gracefully from the shoulder. The groom, who is a splendid specimen of southern manhood, was dressed in deep black, and wore mother of pearl gloves and necktie to match. The groomsmen wore similarly attired, and each displayed a rose bud in the left lapel of his coat.  
The ushers were Mrs. Thomas P. Bagwell and J. Mason Jamieson. These gentlemen were most assiduous in their efforts seating the audience and arranging for the brilliant nuptials.  
From the church the party proceeded to the residence of Mrs. Catherine A. Rowland, No. 225 N. Fremont street, where a brilliant reception was held. The bride and groom, accompanied by a few special friends, left in the 10:40 P. M. train for Niagara and the lakes. On Thursday next they will sail from New York for Europe, where, after making the tour of the continent, which is expected to occupy a year, they will settle down in San Antonio, the home of the now happy husband.

We have good reason to believe that a petition is being circulated, on the sly, among our citizens.

In this petition the assertion is recklessly made that Gov. Davis does not represent the Republican party of Texas.

It is perhaps unnecessary, but we take the precaution, nevertheless, to warn our citizens against this piece of circulating mendacity, although the object of the originators of this document is visible on the very face of it.

It is simply the petition of a few disappointed office-seekers who have become very voracious out of sheer desperation.

The visit of the Governor to Washington has caused a rattling among the dry bones, and the Ring, of which Senator Hays is supposed to be the head center, has been thrown into a spasm of alarm, and we may say, not without reason, as their little dividends are most certainly threatened.

The principal bowlers for mercy are Plumly, editor of the consp. Salt-river Times; General Clark, who was lifted out of his seat by the last Congress, but fitted into the Galveston Post Office by "the Ring"; the mercenary statesman of the Union, Baker; also valued John Hancock, Pease and Phillips of the Austin Ring, and probably Pious Honey and Honest Bedloe to taper off on.

These tainted Republicans and damaged Bourbon Democrats have the cheek to set themselves up as authorized to speak for the Republican party. They are trembling in their shoes for fear that the custom-houses at Galveston, Brownsville and Indianola are not going to be their special booty much longer.

Hence they resort to the lowest kind of demagoguery to blacken the characters of our best Republicans, and back up their misrepresen-

mentality with the signatures of the most embittered Democratic opponents of the President.

Who has ever said that any man or set of men represent the Republican party?

In the next election the great majority of the people will represent the Republican party.

There will soon be a Convention at Dallas, that will assert in unmistakable language the opinion of the Republican party of Texas in reference to those rascals who are trying to sell the party to the Democracy.

We have paid attention to the movements of Plumly since he turned up as a performer on the political tight-rope, and are satisfied that he belongs to the meanest class of carpet-baggers. As long as they can fill their pockets they are intensely loyal, and ferociously Republican, as soon, however, as the flesh pots are beyond their reach, they roam about seeking whom they may devour, making much noise in order that they may not be forgotten. Plumly was one of the leading rail-road jobbers of the 12th Legislature, afterwards he tried to sell himself off as a Liberal Republican, and finally tried to play "the water" in "the Times" and still exhibits his ears in the Union. At present he is as harmless as a frozed-to-death rooster in a barn yard, and no fears need be entertained that the President will be deceived by any such small potatoes as Mr. Plumly and his friends.—Fris Press.

The Kerrville Affair.

The various rumors in relation to the killing at Kerrville are so conflicting that it is impossible to ar-

rive at any conclusion as to what the actual circumstances were.

One account is substantially that a band of robbers attacked the store of Mr. Schreiner, but being expected were bloodily defeated, eight killed and others besieged in a block house.

The other statement seems to indicate that the people of that vicinity made a raid on supposed robbers, killed several, and that one man, Eastwood, was taken from jail and shot.

When the affair is finally ventilated it will probably resolve itself into what is generally as "a neighborhood quarrel," like those which so frequently prevail in different parts of the State, and which have done so much to bring Texas in bad repute abroad.

There has been, and still is, a pressing demand for the location of a U. S. District Court for Western Texas at San Antonio.

If any non-resident has a private spite to gratify or wishes to layhawk or blackmail a citizen of Western Texas, he can sue him on some trivial pretext at the Federal Court at Austin and be gratified to his heart's content. In nine cases out of ten the accused will plead guilty and pay the blackmail rather than undertake the various pilgrimages in Austin that are necessary to establish his innocence.

San Antonio is the natural center of Western Texas, and we think the United States Federal Court should be established here from motives of public policy.

The following petition has been signed by nearly all our prominent citizens and speaks for itself:

To the Hon. Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled.

The undersigned, your memorialists, citizens of the State of Texas, would respectfully petition your honorable body—

There should be created by law, an additional United States Judicial District, to be called "The South-Western District of Texas," embracing and including the following counties, viz: Wichita, Archer, Young, Buchanan, Eastland, Brown, San Saba, Llano, Blanco, Comal, Guadalupe, Karnes, De Witt, Goliad, Refugio, and all other counties lying west and south of the counties aforesaid to the Rio Grande.

That the District Court for said District be established at San Antonio, Bexar County, and retaining the Court at Brownsville, in Cameron County.

Your memorialists would further petition that an additional United States District Judge and other necessary officers be appointed for said additional Judicial District.

And your memorialists represent that owing to the large extent of Territory comprising the present Western District of Texas, and the farther fact of the rapid increase of population, and the large amount of business in said Court it would be beneficial to the interests of the people residing in the counties aforesaid as well as to the people of the United States, to form said additional Judicial District, and your memorialists would earnestly ask that your petition be considered by your honorable body as early as day as practicable, and your duty bound your memorialists will ever pray.

Witness our hands and seals at San Antonio, Texas, this 10th day of July, 1873.
