### Women as Road-Carriers in

Vicenna.

I have before alluded to the fact that women perform the hardest kind of laboring work in Germany, but was not prepared for the sights I have witnessed to-day, in Vicenna. In America, mixing mortar and carrying the hod is considered the such hard work that few white men can be found willing to undertake it at the present day. An immense building near our hotel, occupying a whole block, is in course of erection, on which not less than 400 persons are employed, fully 100 of whom are women. All the hard laboring work is done by women, such as making and carrying mortar in buckets on their heads to the workmen handling the brick. They are not allowed a moment's leisure, several overseers being on guard to keep them constantly in motion. We found the same proportion of women at work on all the new buildings, and there must be many thousands of them to-day doing this species of laboring work in Vicenna. They are both young, middle-aged and old, but all seem to be strong and healthy. At dinner time they swarm into the shop to purchase a piece of brown bread and fat bacon and a mug of beer, and eat their dinners sitting on the curbstones. Their wages is one florin, or 48 cts. per day, and I am assured by a gentleman resident here that most of them sleep about the buildings on shavings, or in barns or sheds, having no homes. Amidst all the splendor and wealth of this great city, with its millions of inhabitants, there is, perhaps, no more destitution, want, and suffering than in the cities of America. Still we frequently some of our countrymen praising and preferring the governments of Europe. Whilst viewing this scene, the emperor and empress, with his staff and outriders, glittering in gold and precious stones, dashed along the Ring-strasse, on the way to the palace, whilst a short distance off stand the royal stables, a magnificent structure, covering at least four blocks of ground, as large as Franklin square, the meanest animal of which is better cared for than those.—Cor. Baltimore American.

A Wildcat Undertakes to Carry off a Child, Whips a Whole Family and Escapes.

We learn that an unusual and very exciting contest took place at the ranch of Lamou Felix, on the Mera creek, about fourteen miles from this place, one morning last week. It seems that Mr. Felix, shortly after getting up in the morning, went out to feed his stock, and that soon after he was startled by the cries of his wife and family. Running to the house he found a large wildcat had seized his youngest child, an infant, by the back of the neck, and was making off with it. After a severe struggle he succeeded in rescuing it, the cat making its escape. Something after the excitement had subsided, an Indian boy, about 18 years old, went out to bring in some horses that had been strayed out over night some distance from the house. He had been gone but a few minutes, when the family was again aroused by the cries of the boy, who came rushing toward the house yelling like a madman, with the identical cat that had caused the first disturbance firmly seated upon his back, with its teeth embedded in the back of his neck. Another desperate battle ensued, which resulted in favor of the cat, which successfully cleaned out the whole Felix family, killed their two dogs, and retreated in good order to the house of E. M. Howe, under which he ensconced himself, defying all efforts to dislodge him until night, when it escaped unscathed. The wounds received by the Indian boy were quite severe, and the good people, fearing the cat was mad, thought it best to scarily the wounds, which they did by heating a crowbar, the only implement about the premises that would answer the purpose. We understand that, considering the ordeal of scratching, biting and singeing the boy passed through, he is doing remarkable well, and will be all right again in a few days.
