And now I look beyond the evening star, Beyond the changing splendors of the day, Knowing the pain He sends more precious far. More beautiful than they. Memoranda on Cholera. The appearance of cholera at different points on the Mississippi and Ohio river, and at one or two points in the interior of Tennessee, has caused considerable alarm. The American Public Health Association, comprising eminent practitioners in all the larger cities of the country, through its executive committee, have caused circulars to be printed and circulated throughout the length and breadth of the land, giving directions as to the most available means for arresting and preventing the prevalence of the disease. While we do not regard Galveston as in any danger from the disease, it is always the part of prudence to be on the safe side, particularly when the same means used for preventing cholera will be equally efficacious in every other form of disease. As the circular alluded to well says, "the best way to prevent both pestilence and panic, is to know and prepare for the danger." The circular declares as a primary preventive, that purification and disinfection, before any case of disease appears in a community, is essential to the preservation of general health, and that thorough sanitary duties should be enforced in every household. There is no room for doubt as to the fact that cholera is propagated by local causes, and that to remove the cause is to prevent the approach of the disease. In 1866 the cholera was brought to this city by soldiers from Governor's Island, and it for some time existed in a fatal form in the barracks, but only some fifteen persons died from the disease from among our citizens, though the existing conditions were favorable for its spread. In the opinion of eminent medical men cholera is not regarded as ever likely to assume an epidemic form on this island, but whether because, as has been held by learned physicians, cistern water is exclusively used for drinking purposes, or from some atmospheric influence, can not, as yet, be accurately determined. The fact only is known that on former visitations of the scourge, its effects were less fatal here than in localities in the interior, which are usually regarded as more salubrious than the coast. We copy from the circular of the American Public Health Association: "SANITARY CLEANING. The local conditions that might promote the outbreaks and propagation of cholera are: neglected privies, filth-sodden grounds, foul cellars, and filthy or badly drained surroundings of dwellings; foul and obstructed house drains; decaying and putrescent materials, whether animal or vegetable; unventilated, damp, and uncleaned dwellings and apartments. "These localizing causes of cholera should be promptly and very thoroughly removed before a case of the disease appears in the town or district; and if any sources of putrescence, or of excessive moisture remain, these should be controlled by the proper cleansing, drying and disinfection. "Thorough scavenging and surface drainage, with the application, at the same time, of quick-lime and coal tar or crude carbolic acid;

whitewashing with fresh quick-lime; the cleansing and thorough drying and ventilation of cellars, basements, chambers and closets; and daily care to cleanse, flush, ventilate and purify the sources of defilement about all inhabited premises, will afford almost complete protection if suitable care is taken of. "PERSONAL HEALTH. "The security of personal health requires pure drinking-water, fresh and substantial food, temperance, and the needed rest and bathing of the body. "DISINFECTANT AND DISINFECTANTS. "The principles relating to disinfection as a means of destroying the propagating or infectious cause of cholera, and arresting putrefaction, are readily understood and may be so explained to any family that the household may insure its own immunity against the introduction and spread of the disease. "RULES AND METHODS OF DISINFECTANT. "For Privies, Water Closets, Drains and Sewers.—Eight or ten pounds of sulphate of iron (copperas) dissolved in five or six gallons of water, with half a pint of crude carbolic acid added to the solution and briskly stirred, makes the cheapest disinfecting fluid for common use. It can be procured in every town and by any family, and if the carbolic acid is not at hand, the solution of copperas may be used without it. "To prevent privies and water-closets from becoming infected or offensive, pour a pint of this strong solution into every water-closet pan or privy-pit once or twice a day. "To disinfect masses of filth, privy-vaults, sewers and drains, gradually pour in this solution until it reaches and disinfects all the foul material. "For the chamber-vessels used by the sick, and for the disinfection of ground upon which any excremental matter has been cast away, use the solution of copperas and carbolic acid; and for disinfecting extensive masses or surfaces of putrescent material, and for drains, sewers and ditches, this disinfecting fluid may be used, or the 'dead oil' of coal-tar, or coal-tar itself; coal-tar may be used as a paint upon the walls of cellars, stables and open drains. "Quick-lime is useful as an absorbent and dryer upon foul water and in damp places; and whitewashing with it should be practiced in common tenements, factories, basements, closets and garrets. "To disinfect the clothing or bedding soiled in any manner by excremental matters from the sick, throw them into a solution made up as follows: 1 lb of sulphate of zinc to 6 or 8 gallons of water, to which add 2 or 3 ounces of pure and strong carbolic acid—such articles to remain therein at least half an hour; then immediately place them in boiling water, and continue boiling. If the acid is not at hand, then use the solution of zinc in water. The same disinfecting solution is excellent for bed-pans and chamber-vessels, and for soiled floors or bedded surfaces. "Apartments, bedding and upholstery that have been used by the sick with cholera or diarrhea, should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected. PRINCIPLES AND DUTIES TO BE OBSERVED. "1. That thorough cleanliness, domestic and civic, and an abundant supply of pure water are essential means of preventing cholera in any household when the disease is near. "2. That general cleansing, scavenging and disinfection should be attended to in every city and town before cholera makes its appearance; and that whenever it does appear, that house and the exposed premises should be kept constantly disinfected. "3. That, whatever differences of opinion there may be respecting the epidemic phenomena of different periods, the paramount importance of thorough cleanliness and disinfection is to be kept in mind; and that, in the words of the chief medical officer of Great Britain: 'It appears to be characteristic of cholera, not only of the disease in its developed and alarming form, but equally of the slightest diarrhoea which the epidemic can produce, that all matters which the patient discharges from his stomach and bowels are infective; that the patient's power of infecting other persons is represented almost or quite exclusively by those discharges; that they are comparatively non-infective at the moment they are discharged, but afterward, when undergoing decomposition, acquire their maximum infective power; and that if they be cast away without previous disinfection, they impart their own infective quality to the excremental matters which they mingle in filth-sodden earth, or in depositories and conduits of filth,

Latest News.

LEAMINGTON, Mass., July 11. - A fire broke out in Burdett's block. Two hundred finished and unfinished frames were destroyed. Loss \$150,000.

NEW HAVEN, July 11. - Father McKenna, a Catholic priest at New Milford, was drowned while bathing.

CINCINNATI, July 11. - Five cases of cholera yesterday.

In the Jewish Conference a resolution was adopted requesting the co-operation of all Jew congregations in the United States to secure a more perfect union so the establishment of the Jewish theological institute and other interests of Jewish religion may be promoted by the laws adopted by the Conference. They adjourned to meet in Cleveland the second Tuesday in July next.

George Bell, a negro, was found murdered near Chucklurek, in the same county, yesterday. He had been shot five times. No clue to the murderer.

What's in the Wind.

The visit of Governor Davis to Washington and New York seems to excite considerable interest, and the manner of reasons and explanations are given therefore. We would consider the ostensible reasons given by himself and published, were sufficient without attributing others and unworthy ones to him. In all his official intercourse with the Democratic Legislature, we have seen no instance of chicanery or deceit; when differing from them in his views of State policy, he has honestly, openly and sturdily opposed them, but in regard to the ensuing election, every word from his lips and every document from his pen has exhibited him in full accord with the Democratic party - that a general election in December was advisable, necessary and constitutional, and that the present House of Representatives expires in December, 1873. We may justly consider Gov. Davis deficient in taste and refinement, emphatically a radical, and opposed to the success of the Democracy, but there has been nothing in his conduct which permits us to infer that, after his honorable and candid expression of opinion in regard to the next general election, he will secretly, and in an underhand manner, join in any conspiracy to defeat such election. The statements published in many of our party papers, under the caption with which we commenced this article, attributing to Governor Davis such mean and deceitful conduct, are unjust, ungenerous, and calculated to reflect upon our own party. - Herald & Pioneer.
