Rain Continues To Saturate Area

Colliseum Opening Planned For July 4th

Civic Facility To House Many Public Activities

The following report is an indepth resume by Bailey County Judge Glenn Williams, pertaining to the construction of the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum.

For the past several years Bailey County has had very active and progressive 4-H and F.F.A. Programs, along with other community orienated activities. And for several years there has been an obvious need for some type of public facility to accomodate those activities.

This was brought more clearly into focus because of the need for adequate facilities to hold livestock shows. The showing of calves, swine and sheep, in this area had grown to such proportions that it attracted state wide attention. In face many high honors, including State Championships, have been won by Bailey County young people and their livestock. And awards won in other projects have been equally as impressive.

Those activites, coupled with the need for more room, better places to hold livestock shows, and other similar events, gave rise to the idea of building a "show barn". But the question instantly arose, "why build an expensive structure that would be used only once or twice a year?" Especially when there is a need for a place to hold conventions, equipment shows, youth and recreational activities, family reunions, banquets, etc. "why not", it was asked, "build a facility of sufficient size and flexibility to needs?" Thus, at the grass roots, people began to talk, to compare ideas, to blend and direct them toward one common objective-so that slowly but surely the movement crystaliz-

As a result, in the Spring of 1973 a County wide meeting was

held at the high school to discuss the possibilities for such a facility. More than 200 people participated in the meeting. At that time it was decided to construct an AGRICUL-TURAL AND CIVIC CENTER, and a committee was chosen, with membership from all parts of the County, to formulate plans and lead the effort to get it done. Design of Kitchen: Stan Black, Robin Taylor and Linda Mullin. Perhaps there were others whose names are not available at this time, but who made substantial contributions toward

it's development.

Those people met many times over a period of two or three years, they developed plans and ultimately went to the Commissioner's Court and recommended the employment of an architect to design it, and the calling of a bond election to finance it. Joint meetings were held between the Commissioner's Court, the City Council, Chamber of Commerce, and other groups. Efforts were made to secure federal or state funding to help finance it, but no funding was available. So it was finally decided that it should be a County Project, to be built by the County, placed on the county tax rolls, and supervised

by the Commissioner's Court.

However at about that time a critical situation developed regarding the local hospital, so this project was temporarily set aside until that problem was resolved, which was approximately two years.

It was reactivated in 1976 and additional planning went into it. Early in 1977 the Commissioner's Court voted to build a large, versatile facility, capable of serving practically all the community needs-livestock shows, equipment shows, county fairs, banquets, conventions, youth activities, civic clubs, family reunions and other activities of almost every

increases on the inputs of production, Texas Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupka declared.

The Dalhart grain farmer and cattle producer responded to the Wednesday announcement of a sharp rise in the latest cost of living index with increased costs of food, particularly beef, being singled out as the main culprit.

Chaloupka acknowledged the sharp rise in beef prices and defended them as being "very necessary" because "the cattle industry has suffered a four-tofive-year disaster."

He expressed doubt that the producer is realizing the full benefit of the retail price increase, commenting that proessors and distributors price increases "whenever there is an opportunity," producing what he termed "a wratchet effect" with a total price rise of "more than what we think might be

He said Farm Bureau would protest any move to relax limitations on beef imports to slow the price rise. "We don't need to

beat the cattlemen down any longer; they have had their share of problems for a period of years," he declared.

"We can no longer produce in America with inflation like it is at prices we have received in

the past," he emphasized, noting that the costs of production items "are accelerated primarily because of excessive labor increases." If farmers and

Except for limited cotton losses from weekend hail and flooding in isolated areas south, west and north of Muleshoe, rainfall was beneficial to farmers throughout the county. Rains Monday and Tuesday night were almost completely free of hail or wind damage.

Airlines Sets May Record

Southwest Airlines passenger traffic soared to an all time high in May, 1978, topping all previous Southwest boarding records. During May, 1978, Southwest flew 90.6 million revenue passesger miles, up 90 percent over May, 1977 when Southwest flew 47.7 million revenue passenger miles. Passengers carried soared to 307,317 versus 175,004 passengers carried during May, 1977, an increase of 76 percent.

In commenting on Southwest's increased passenger traffic Herman Farr, Southwest Treasurer, stated that the May traffic increases suggest that summer vacation travel has already begun to build.

Southwest announced that it has reached an agreement with Boeing Airplane Company for the purchase of an additional Advanced Boeing 737-200 twinget aircraft. This aircraft is scheduled for delivery in Feb., 1980 and will bring to 16 the number of Boeing 737-200 jet

aircraft in Southwest's fleet.

To its current fleet of 12

adding three previously purchased aircraft scheduled for

In the meantime, during 1973, and using some of the first Revenue Sharing money made available, Bailey County had purchased a 20 acre tract of land across from the Roadside Park in the northwest part of Muleshoe as a potential site for the facility. It was thought that this property would be an ideal location, having more than 450 feet of highway frontage and reaching to the county road at the back. So it was decided to locate it on that site. Shortly thereafter, Frank Donahue, with Engineering Associates of Lubbock, was employed by the Commissioner's Court for the engineering and architectural work, and Joe Smith, with First Southwest Company, for the financial services.

The final building design included a 100 X 150 clear-span arena with concrete floors. And adjacent thereto are bleachers with seating capacity of approximately 650 people, a nice carpeted meeting room capable of accomodating 200 people, a large lobby capable of serving as an alternate meeting room, and accomodating as many as 100 people, kitchen facilities, concession stand, animal washes, and another room capable of being used as a three-bay fire station. It also will have two nice offices and lots of storage room. The entire structure contains approximately 26,000 square feet. There will be parking area for approximately 500 vehicles. Streets, parking areas, and other grounds around the facility will be paved.

Bids for construction were received April 29, 1977. The contract was awarded May 12, 1977 to Pharr Construction Incorporated and King Builders, both of Lubbock, who bid jointly. The total price was \$348,368, and work was to have begun May 22, 1977.

However there has been long and almost unreasonable interruptions, in the construction procedures so that the completion date has been delayed by at least six months. It is now expected that it will be completed and ready for occupancy July 1, 1978. The grand opening, with dedication ceremonies, are being planned for July 4, 1978. The July 4 activities will be held in it.

The total cost of the facility, including land site, construction cost, professional services, paving and work done by the County, will be about \$475,000. Of that amount approximately \$225,000 will have been paid in cash from the Bailey County Revenue Sharing Funds, and the remaining \$250,000 by the issuance of certificates of obligation. These certificates will be retired over a period of 15 years or less. They bear 6 percent interest, and were purchased by the local banks. They have 30 day call dates, so they can be paid off any time funds are available. At the present time a .07 cent tax is being levied to pay them and that fund is already building a surplus. So it is expected that they will be retired long before their due

The major concern now, is that is be properly operated and cared for, that it may be preserved and enjoyed for years to come. 
