Financial Condition of the State. We give below a carefully compiled statement of the financial condition of the State, made from up from reports and statements on file in the Executive Department, showing the total amount of assets and liabilities of the State on the 31st of May, A. D. 1873:

Cash on hand July 17, 1872, undistributed at this date, May 31, 1873, being part of the amount found in Treasury when vacated by G. W. Honey, \$8,324.70 specie, \$68,732.85 currency. State revenue account, balance on hand May 31, 1873, \$27 specie, \$9,398.28 currency.

Available school fund, balance on hand May 31, 1873, \$46,809.08 specie, \$329,045.25 currency. Permanent school fund, balance in specie and currency, \$21,732.79 specie, \$669.25 currency. Bonds—\$12,000 available school fund in 10 per cent. Bazos county bonds.

County road and bridge tax, \$11,521.31 currency. County road and bridge and district school tax, \$25,717.41 currency. Tax titles, \$395.59 currency. Audited State debt account, \$9 currency. \$235.59 currency. Assessors' fees, \$1 currency. Settlement of estates, \$30,304 currency.

Cash in Treasury unexpended on requisitions, \$4610.29 currency. Cash in hands of Farmer's Loan and Trust Company, coupon account, \$15,089.92 currency. Cash in hands of Farmers' Loan and Trust Company, bond account, \$1831.34 currency. Accrued interest due the State on above bonds, \$100,000 specie. Total, \$201,449.41 specie, \$487,026.86 currency.

Three hundred and fifty seven per cent. frontier defence bonds of \$1000 each, principal and interest payable in gold, issued under act approved August 5, 1870, \$350,000 specie. Three months' interest on the above, \$6,125. specie. Two hundred and fifty seven ten per cent. deficiency revenue bonds of \$1000 each, principal and interest payable in currency, issued under act approved May 19, 1871, \$257,000 currency.
