The Griets of Childhood.

These bitter sorrows of child-
hood! when sorrow is all new and
strange, when hope has not yet got
wings to fly beyond the day and
weeks, and the space from summer
to summer seems measureless. "Ah,
my child, you will have real trou-
bles to fret about by-and-by," is the
consolation we have almost all of us
had administered to us in our child-
hood, and have repeated to other
children, since we have been grown
up. We have all of us sobbed em-
phatically, standing with our faces
legs above our little socks, when
we lost sight of our mother or nurse
in some strange place; but we can
no longer recall the poignancy of
that moment and weep over it, as
we do over the remembered suffer-
ings of five or ten years ago. Every
one of those keen moments has left
its trace, and lives in us still, but
such traces have bent themselves
irretrievably with the firmer tex-
ture of our youth and manhood;
and so it comes that we can look on
at the troubles of our children with
a smiling disbelief in the reality of
their pain. Is there any one who
can recover the experience of his
childhood, not merely with a memo-
ry of what he did and what hap-
pened to him, of what he liked and
disliked when he was in frock and
trousers, but with an intimate pen-
etration, a revived consciousness of
what he felt then—when it was so
long from one midsummer to the
other? what he felt when his school-
fellows shut him out of their games
because he would pitch the ball
wrong out of mere willfulness; or
on a rainy day in the holidays,
when he didn't know how to amuse
himself, and fell from idleness into
mischievous mischief into dead-
ness, and from defiance into sulki-
ness, or when his mother absolutely
refused to let him have a tailed coat
that "halt," although every other
boy of his age had gone into tails
already? Surely if we could recall
that early bitterness, and the dim
guesses, the strangely perspective-
less conception of life that gave the
bitterness its intensity, we should
not pooh-pooh the griefs of our
children. Childhood has no fore-
bodings; but then it is soothed by
no memories of outlived sorrow.

do not resemble me to any alarm-
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
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The stove and pipe have assumed a

Too much importance cannot be given to the necessity of a full representation in the Convention from the West. Our successful existence depends upon the intelligent preservation of our rights and interests under the State constitution and a distinct expression of Republican opinion upon the vital questions of State policy is desired, also of preference for executive officers of the State made elective by the constitution.

Conventions may commission proxies, but it is not desirable they should do so, when they can send one of their own body to the Convention.

Respectfully Recommended, S. G. NEWTON, Chairman Rep. Ex. Com. 29th Senatorial District.

It is to be hoped that the Republicans of this Senatorial District will be aroused to the fact that a most exciting political campaign has fairly opened and that it behooves us to be up and doing at once.

Travis county has already held a Convention, as appears as follows in the Journal of the 21st.

Republican County Convention of Travis County.

The Republican county convention which assembled in this city on the 19th inst., was one of the most harmonious and satisfactory conventions of the kind ever held in Travis county. It consisted of sixty delegates proper, four precincts sending ten each and the 2d Precinct including the city, twenty. The outside precincts sent alternates in addition to their delegates, and precinct No. 3 sent three sets of delegates, from three separate meetings, held in different portions of the Precinct all in entire harmony.

Besides the delegates a large number of spectators attended to witness the proceedings.

The business of the convention was transacted with the utmost fairness and good temper. Whatever jealousies there might have been were sent out of sight and the delegates to represent Travis county at Dallas were selected by a direct vote of the convention and without partiality to any one.

Speeches and dried programmes were instituted on our dried committee resolutions passed. It was unnecessary to mention the well-known principles and policy of the party or to judge the delegation in any way.

The issue to be met by the people of Texas is whether they will permit the system of destruction already inaugurated by the last Legislature to be carried out to the bitter end. It is superfluous here in the West to say anything in connection of the 18th Legislature. There are some among the Democrats who

are so poor as to do reverence, openly, but the men who will control the Conventions will be the identical individuals who elected the last delegation. The questions involved touch the heart and the pocket of every citizen, hence it is the duty of every good citizen to be doing his share to protect the financial honesty of the State and the exercise of the natural and civil rights of all.

We cannot understand how repudiation and lawlessness are to be suppressed except by opposing the party that does favor a disorganized state of society.

The constitution guarantees the people of Texas free schools, and the people of Texas will have free schools.

It is now regarded as settled that there will be no free schools under Democratic regime. What party therefore should those Texans favor who desire to see Texas enjoying the advantages which the citizens of all civilized countries enjoy?

It is most certainly not the Democratic party.

It is useless to imagine that the Democracy has good intentions. The last Legislature has demonstrated that Hell is paved with similar material.

The citizens of San Antonio listened to this siren song when they elected a Democratic City Administration, and after a few short months trial it is found to be the most injurious that we have ever had.

For reasons well known to everybody we want an able delegation for the West in the Republican Convention at Dallas.

Let us be up and doing, and act at once.

We cannot understand why the San Antonio Herald is so mad to write down the Thirteenth Legislature. Telegraph.

The reason is, that the people of the West will not tolerate any individual or newspaper that favors repudiation.

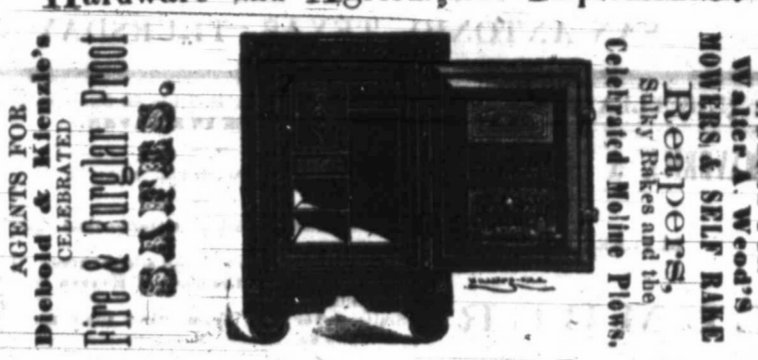

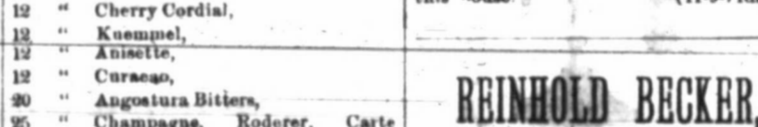

Division of Justice Precincts into Election Precincts. At a special session of the Hon. County Court of Bexar County held at the Court house of said County, in the city of San Antonio, the following division of Justice Precincts into Election Precincts was made, to-wit:

JUSTICES PRECINCT NO. 1. The four wards of the city of San Antonio are to constitute the four election precincts, and which precincts are numbered the same as the wards.

Voting place prec't. No. 1. Old Court house on Military Plaza. Voting place prec't. No. 2. New Court house on Soledad St. Voting place prec't. No. 3. N. W. corner Alamo Plaza and Main Street. Voting place prec't. No. 4. At McAllister's.

JUSTICES PRECINCT NO. 2. Divided into three election precincts viz: Election Precinct No. 2. All that territory of Justice Precinct No. 2, lying west of a line described as follows: Commencing at the head of the Calcehro Creek, thence down said creek to its junction with Com Creek, thence down to the bridge over Com Creek, thence along said bridge to the present city limits. Voting place at Nat. Lewis ranch on the Leon.

Election Precinct No. 3. All that territory comprising the following boundaries: Commencing at a point where the Fredericksburg road first crosses Leon Creek, thence up said road to the Balcones, thence up the Balcones to Barnette's place, and thence in a straight line to the place of beginning. Voting place at Leon Springs.

JUSTICES PRECINCT NO. 3. Divided into four Election Precincts. Election Precinct No. 3. All that territory comprising the following boundaries: Commencing at a point where the Fredericksburg road crosses the Cibola, thence up said creek to where the Cedar brake road crosses the same, thence along said road to the above place, thence in a straight line to a straight line to the head of the Main Martines Creek, thence down said creek to the Seguin road, thence along said road to the place of beginning. Voting place at Belmont.
