Letter from Governor Davis, of Texas. To the Editors of the Evening Post:

GENTLEMEN—Your paper of yesterday contains the following extract from the Washington Republic relating to the purposes of my visit to Washington:

"His transactions with the general government, particularly respecting the Indian criminals, Santa and Big Tree, have been unsatisfactory. None of the agreements made by the government on the one hand and by Governor Davis, as the representative of the state of Texas, on the other, have been executed by him.

"Governor Davis knew this, and was foolish enough to believe that he might use his control over these prisoners as a power to compel the government to accede to his demands regarding the disposition of the Federal patronage in his state.

"There are two charges made in the extract—first, that I had varied from the original conditions demanded by me as preliminary to the pardon of the Indians Santa and Big Tree; second, that I had proposed to trade the pardon of these Indians for the acquittal of certain Federal officers in Texas.

You can not, I suppose, desire a denial in stronger terms than these. I will add, however, that there never has been any other than the best of harmony between the Department of Indian Affairs and my state government.

[From the Science of Health.] Signs of Madness in Dogs. The British "Medical Journal" calls attention to the measures recommended by the Council of Hygiene of Bordeaux for the better protection of the people against the dangers of hydrophobia.

A short time, sometimes two days, after madness has seized a dog, it creates symptoms in the animal which it is indispensable to recognize.

1. There is agitation and restlessness, and the dog turns himself continually in his kennel.

2. He does not try to bite; he is gentle, even affectionate, and he eats and drinks; but gnaws the litter, the ends of curtains, the padding of cushions, the coverlets of the beds, the carpets, etc.

3. By the movement of his paws about the sides of his open mouth, one might think he was trying to free his throat of a bone.

4. His voice undergoes such a change that it is impossible not to be struck by it.

5. The dog begins to fight with other dogs; this is a decidedly characteristic sign, if the dog be generally peaceful.

6. The three symptoms last mentioned indicate an advanced period of the disease, and that the dog may become dangerous at any moment, if immediate measures are not taken.

7. It is best to chain him up at once, or, better still, to kill him.

Telegraphic. THE FIRE AT BALTIMORE. BALTIMORE, July 26.—Loss to the Central Presbyterian Church \$70,000; insurance \$60,000. Loss to the Sisters of Notre Dame and St. Alphonsus \$30,000; insured. The fire stopped at the Central Garden lager beer saloon, on Saratoga street. Building occupied by Redemptionist Fathers flooded. The English Lutheran church and parsonage and valuable library burned. The University of Maryland and the Maryland Academy of Arts burned; the former flooded; museum attached to the academy is unharmed, and most of the pictures have been removed.

RELIEF FOR BALTIMORE. AUGUSTA, Ga., July 26.—Ex-Governor Charles J. Jenkins published a card in Chronicle and Sentinel reminding the people of Georgia and the South of the relief extended to the South after the war by the ladies of the Southern Aid Association of Baltimore and calling upon them to assist in alleviating the distress of the fire-stricken people of Baltimore.

MISCELLANEOUS. PORTLAND, Me., July 26.—The fire which originated at the railroad paint shop involves a loss of \$60,000. CINCINNATI, O., July 25.—Stephen Moller, an old and highly esteemed German settler, the founder of the Cincinnati Volks-Haus, and for a time connected with the New York Staats-Zeitung, died tonight, aged 68 years.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 26.—The Republican County Convention held here today, adopted an anti-subsidy and anti-Chinese platform.

WASHINGTON, July 26.—Two deaths by cholera, and there are several other cases which it is feared will prove fatal.

ROME, July 26.—King of Italy, Victor Emmanuel, is represented as having held following language to the French minister on the occasion of his departure from Rome: "M. Fournier you may leave in all assurance that my ministry will be conservative. Tell your government that I desire to be an good terms with it. I have no taste for a Prussian alliance and there exists no treaty with the Emperor William. I only call attention of your government to the designs of the clerical party in France."

"If Marshal McMahon's government does not succeed in calming this agitation, which is communicating itself to the whole of Catholic Europe, he will oblig me to cast myself entirely into the arms of Germany, and I shall do it."

At present I represent peace between France and Germany. Do not forget this. Let war be declared against me and it will be sufficient for me to place an army corps on your frontier in order to paralyze a great part of the forces of France and cause her an invasion, loss of provinces and indemnities more terrible than those of 1870."

MADRID, July 26.—Contreras, an assuming title of commander of the land forces in the canton of Murcia, addressed a circular to the foreign powers.

The Germans released the crew of the Vigilant, fearing that the German consul and family would be shot.

BAYONNE, July 26.—The Republicans are concentrating near Pampeluna. Carlos is at Elizabad with 15,000 men, well armed. A struggle is soon expected.

MADRID, July 26.—The insurgents at Carthagena have made preparations to attack the German frigate now in that harbor, but it is believed they will not carry out the design, as their vessels are not properly supplied with either officers, men or engineers.

A dispatch from Malaga says fighting occurred in the streets of that city between the opposing Republican factions.

BAYONNE, July 26.—Heavy cannoning is now going on south of this city, on the Spanish frontier.
